Hancock Rites Held In Hobbs, New Mexico Saturday

Funeral services for P. L. Hancock, pioneer Lea County oilfield contractor who died Wednesday, May 13 in a Lubbock hospital were held in Hobbs, New Mexico on Saturday May 15 at 2 p. m. in the First Christian Church.

Mr. Hancock was born in Palmer, Texas, on August 20, 1886. He spent his early life in that area. He moved to Briscoe County at Silvertown, Texas, in 1908. He ran a store here, until 1928. He became identified with the petroleum industry in the early days of oil in West Texas and moved to Pyote in 1928 to become a teaming and dirt contractor.

Later he moved with the industry to Wink, then to Jal and to Hobbs in 1930, living there until his death. Until his retirement about 12 years ago. Mr. Hancock remained active as an oilfield contractor and in civic and political development in the county.

He was a member of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, the Knights of Pythias and the Methodist Church.

Survivors are two sons, L. B. Hancock of Lubbock and Pete Hancock of Goldwaite, Texas; four daughters, Mrs. Zeph Ferguson of Clovis, New Mexico, Mrs. James Rhoderick of Quitaque, Texas, Mrs. Jess Harwell of Hobbs, New Mexico, and Mrs. Earl Osborn of Logan, New Mexico. One sister, Mrs. Sallie Everett of Palmer, one brother, W. L. Hancock of Waxahachie, Texas, 16 grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren.

The Rev. Harry T. Porter, pastor of the First Christian Church, officiated at the funeral services. Pallbearers were grandsons of Mr. Hancock.

Burial was in Prairie Haven Cemetery in Hobbs, N. M. where his wife was buried four years ago.

Estate Planning Problems Discussed

Many legal problems arise in deciding how to distribute a person's estate after his death. Naturally, large estates present more difficulty, but even the smallest of estates may cause trouble for the heirs if proper arrangements are not made prior to death of the owner.

Where larger estates are concerned, the question of estate taxes is often the greatest problem. Expert help is required to make proper decisions. A lawyer can be of considerable assistance in advising a client how to bequeath his estate so as to take care of his loved ones and at the same time to effect maximum savings in estate taxes.

To illustrate, suppose John Doe and his wife have amassed community property worth \$200,000. John wants his wife to be well taken care of during her lifetime. To save an attorney's fee he writes his own will leaving everything to his wife. He dies soon thereafter and his wife dies six years later. The federal estate taxes on his one-half of the \$200,000 estate amount to \$4,800.

When the wife dies her estate is worth her original one-half of \$200,000 (\$100,000) plus the estate she inherited from her husband, \$95,200. The federal estate tax on her estate, enhanced by what her husband had left her, is \$31,200. If instead of leaving the property to his wife he had left her the income from it for life (the remainder to go to their children upon her death), her taxable estate would have been only \$100,000. The federal estate tax thereon would have been \$4,800.

There would have been a tax saving of \$26,000 (\$31,200 less \$4,800, the tax on her \$100,000 estate). Yet the wife, during her lifetime, would have been well provided for. She would have had \$100,000 (her half of the community (\$100,000 less estate tax thereon of \$4,800).

Many a man has worked hard and lived frugally all his life in an attempt to provide for his loved ones long corridors of security stretching far into the future but has cheated them of the full benefits of his efforts by failing to plan properly. Perhaps he has failed to make a will. Maybe he has undertaken to write his own will with the result that it fails to take into account contingencies that did not occur to him, or he has

prepared a will that is so artlessly drawn that those he loved most become involved in bitter lawsuits. Such legal controversies over estates are wasteful and often leave scars that rankle for years.

The drafting of a will involves the making of decisions requiring special judgement which can be obtained only by years of training and study. Only the practicing lawyer can avoid the enumerable pitfalls and advise the course best suited for each individual.

SCIENCE and your Health MOTION SICKNESS By Science Features.

To millions of sensitive travellers, life on the bounding main means just one thing: seasickness. And these same unlucky travellers will often be subject to other forms of motion sickness such as air and road sickness.

The symptoms of motion sickness—and it is actually quite a serious condition—are well-known to most of us. The stomach begins to churn like the sea itself, the face becomes pale and breaks out in a cold sweat, there is dizziness and often nausea and vomiting.

These unpleasant sensations result from the stimulation, by constantly repeated motion, of certain of the body's sense organs. In the past few years science has developed several drugs in the hope of counteracting this stimulation in queasy travellers.

The most recent, and apparently the most effective, of these drugs is one called Bonamine. Tested by the Army, Navy and Air Force, Bonamine proved to give 24-hour protection against air and seasickness with just one tablet, in contrast to the repeated dosages necessary in other such drugs.

Army doctors gave Bonamine to 115 soldiers on a troopship crossing the Atlantic and found that it protected against motion sickness in 109 of the cases. When 302 paratroopers were given the drug 97.4 percent suffered no symptoms of air sickness.

Bigger Loans, Easier Terms Now in Works

Home-owners will have an opportunity to borrow up to \$3,000 for periods as long as five years if legislation now before Congress to liberalize Title I property improvement loans is enacted.

Under the present Federal Housing Administration Title I program, repayment of a loan can be spread over a three-year period. The maximum that now can be borrowed is \$2,500.

The FHA does not actually lend money to home-owners; that's done by banks and other private lending institutions. What the FHA does is insure repayments. Cost of this type of loan to the home-owner is \$5 per \$100 per year.

Title I loans cover cost of material and application. For example, a properly owner who wishes to reroof his house may borrow a sum sufficient to cover both the cost of asphalt shingles and their application.

Borrowing under the Title I program has become increasingly popular. Last year, for the first time in the agency's 20-year history, loans insured exceeded \$1,000,000,000. The 1953 total was \$1,334,287,124.

From the inception of the Title I program until October 1953, the FHA had insured loans totalling \$7,209,614,263. Losses, or "bad debts" are only 1 percent of loans insured, and the FHA's income from insurance premiums and interest has been adequate to cover this small loss as well as the salaries of agency personnel and other operating expenses. The agency has completely repaid all money advanced by the government in setting up the various FHA insurance programs.

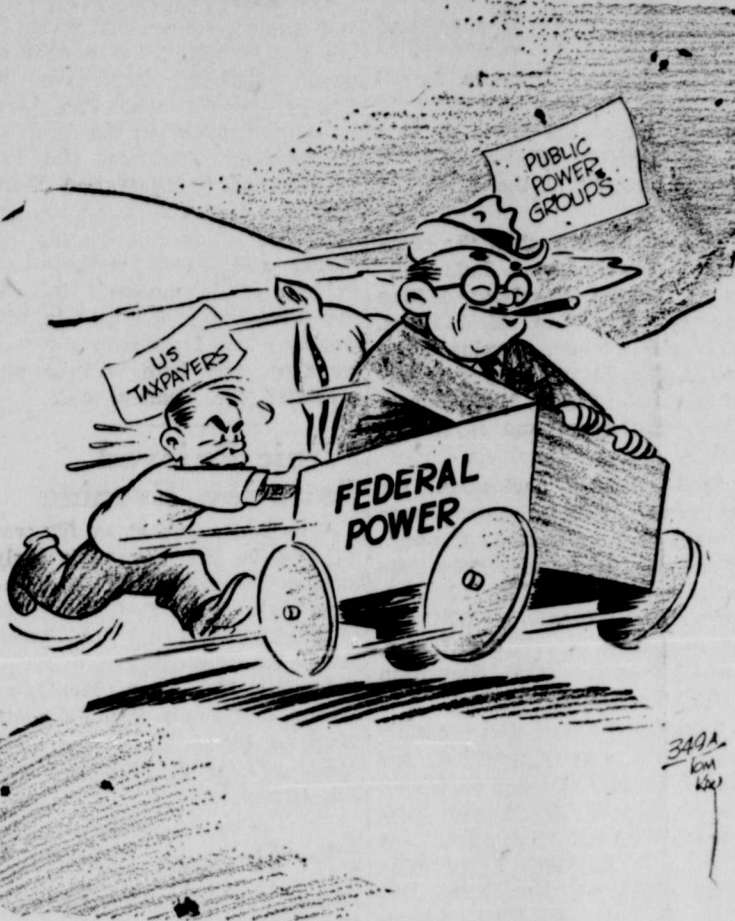

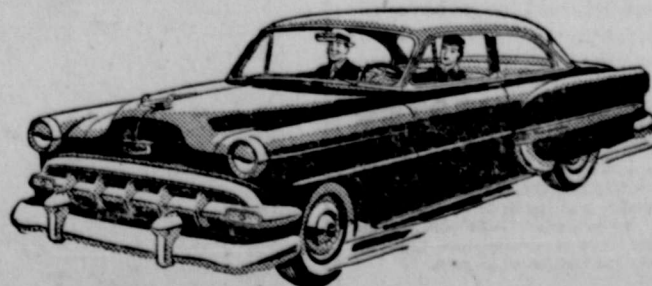

Fred Rowell Has Severe Burns

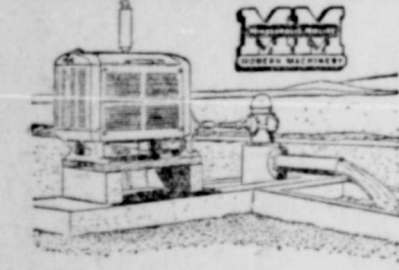

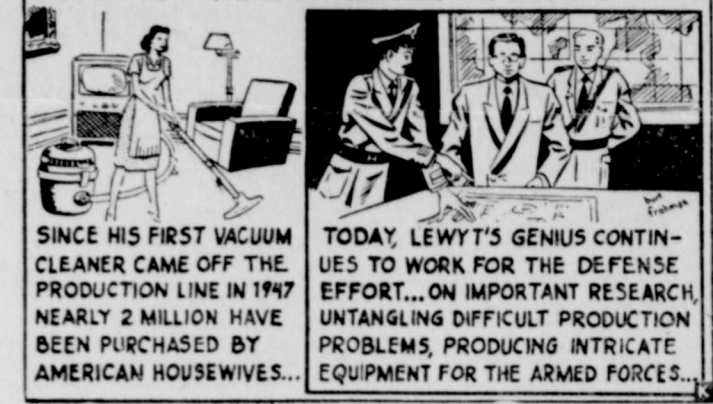

Marshall Formby Visited Many Points In Texas

Marshall Formby, newest appointee on the State Highway Commission, said this week that he hoped to take it a little easier in his travelling. Formby has just completed visiting all of the 25 district highway engineer offices in the state. His travels took him to every area and most of the counties in the state.

Formby, who is a Plainview attorney, is also owner of Radio Station KPAN at Hereford and co-owner of KFLD at Floydada. He is a former judge of Dickens County and former state senator. "The best part about being on the Highway Commission," the Plainview attorney said, "is the fact that you get to see Texas and to meet the Texas people. Everywhere I have gone I have found that the people have confidence in the Highway Department and I find they are glad to give us more financial support to build more of the needed roads over the entire state."

What was supposed to be a part-time job has almost turned into a full-time job for the newest member of the Commission. He said, however, that now that he has visited in all areas of the state that he hopes to be able to spend more time in the practice of law and looking after his radio interests. "He is hopeful that the highway job will require not more than one-half of his time."

Formby said it was impossible to ride over all of the 50,000 miles of Texas paved roads, but he has made a good start at it during the first 14 months of his six-year term.

Texas Highway Department Report

The Texas Highway Patrol, District No. 5, have provided the following report that gives us many statistics: The number of persons killed in rural accidents investigated by Texas Highway patrolmen in the Amarillo District during April, 1954 were 3, the number of persons injured were 41 and the estimated property damage was \$57,485.

On state and federal highways there were 63 accidents, Farm to Market Roads, 9; County Roads, 8; and Small Towns (under 2,500 population), 0.

The principal violation as causative factors were speeding, driving while drinking, failure to grant right of way, wrong side of road-not in passing, and following too closely.

The statistics prove that the principal violations causing accidents in March were: speeding, driving while drinking, wrong side-not in passing, careless or reckless driving, and failure to grant right of way.

In April 1953 six were killed, 53 injured, and \$58,400.00 was the estimated property damage. Last month there were 2 killed, 53 injured and \$61,529.00 property damage. This year there has been 11 killed, 199 injured, and the estimated property damage was \$278,624.00.

In carrying out their basic duties, the 28 patrolmen of the Amarillo District No. 5, composed of 26 panhandle counties, performed the following activities during the month of April 1954.

The number of accidents investigated — 80.

The total number of traffic arrests — 412.

D W I arrests 35.

Speeding arrests 223.

The total number of warning for hazardous violations 1295.

Hours worked during the day 3,819, during the night 2,319.

The number of miles traveled were 68,352.
