## V.F.W. Amateur Rodeo Begins Here Friday Night

Entries are coming in right along now for the Third Annual VFW Rodeo, to be held at the Silverton Rodeo grounds May 28, 29 and 30.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Norris Stephens of Silverton. Stephens gathers stock for rodeo performances and furnishes them for rodeos all over the country. He has the best stock this year that he has ever had rodeo men say.

Walter Brannon is in charge of the parade which will get under way at 10:00 A. M. Saturday. Brannon stated that several riding and horseman's clubs will be here for the parade, including the Sheriff's Possee from Plainview, riders from the Roping Club at Tulia, Sheriff's Possee from Floydada, Silverton Horseman's Club. Bands will be here from Lockney and Kress. Floats have been entered from Tulia and Quitaque, and seven women's clubs of Silverton have indicated their entry. The Vacation Bible Schools of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist Churches will be represented by a float. There will also be floats entered by the scouts and business firms. It sounds like we will have an outstanding parade.

First, Second and Third prizes will be given in three divisions of the parade. Prizes are being furnished by Silverton business firms.

The rodeo will be held regardless of weather conditions. There will be two go-rounds with prize money each go round. Calf roping will carry a \$100.00 prize, Double Mugging, \$100.00, Bare Back Riding \$100.00, Saddle Bronc Riding \$100.00, Brahma Bull Riding \$100.00, Ladies Barrel Race \$50.00.

Entrance fee charged for each go-round. Ropers \$7.50, Riders Bareback and Bull \$5.00, Saddle \$5.00, Ladies \$5.00. Wild Mare Race entrance fee is \$5.00. All entrance fees must be in by 2 o'clock Friday, May 28th. Mail checks to Box 516, Silverton, Texas, or phone Farris Martin at 2081 at the Harvest Queen Grain Company.

A \$225.00 saddle will be given for the best average in roping event. A silver belt buckle to all-round rider, silver belt buckle to lady sponsor. The general admission is \$100 for adults, and 50c for children.

The first performance of the rodeo will get underway at 8 p. m. Friday evening. Saturday's performances will be held at 2:30 p. m. and 8 p. m. The last performance will be held at 2:30 Sunday. Over \$500.00 in cash will be awarded at each rodeo performance.

James Bolton "Jim" Norris, a resident of Briscoe County for fifty-seven years, passed away at his home in Silverton, Thursday morning May 20, 1954. Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p. m. May 23, conducted by Earl Cantwell, Rock Creek Church of Christ Minister, with Rev. C. R. Hankins, pastor of the Methodist Church assisting.

Jim Norris was born on April 18, 1891, in Ellis County Texas. At the age of six years he moved with his parents to Briscoe County. On November 18, 1897 they settled in the Northwestern part of the county in the old Milo Community, now Vigo Park, where he met and married Miss Monetta Moore. They were married on December 24, 1913. To them were born two children, Robert and Naoma. This companion passed away on January 6, 1915.

On January 13, 1945 he was married to Anne Vardell. To this union was born a son, Mike. Mr. Norris moved from Vigo to Silverton in 1933, where he was residing at the time of his death. He was a member of the Vigo Park Methodist Church, uniting at the age of 15.

He is survived by his wife; his sons, Robert of Sacramento, California, and Mike of Silverton; a daughter, Mrs. Olen Yukum of Tucumcari, N. M.; Ted Vardell, United States Air Force who will soon be shipped to Europe and Joe Vardell of Silverton; four grand children, a brother, Mart, of Silverton; two sisters, Mrs. Idella Hyatt and Mrs. Eric Malone of Tulia, also survive.

## A Time to Remember

I bowed my head reverently with the rest of my classmates during the "moment of silence" in tribute to our soldier dead, then seeing Old Glory waving from the flag pole on the lawn of our Alma Mater, I stood tiptoe upon a dream and thought, "What a lucky girl you are to be born under that flag, for you can be what you will to be! You are an American."

Then a strange thing happened. The flag seemed to be a living thing with a soul. I heard the silent singing of its stars on its blue of truth, and listening, my soul caught this refrain:

"I am the symbol of America, and America is more than its hills and prairies with their herds and fields of grain; more than its pulsing cities, its mines and its mills . . . America is you and you and you . . . and God."

"I am the symbol of the homes, the churches, schools, enterprises, and the kingly commoners of America."


"I represent your heritage from the past. Look at me and hear the tramping of soldier-feet in the immortal march for freedom; feel within your hearts the 'Spirit of '76'; see the footprints in the snow at Valley Forge; the great, gaunt commoner on his knees in prayer, and the crimson stain, spreading, that meant life was ebbing from his great heart; see the crosses above our youth, martyrs to freedom in recent wars. Look again and behold lilies blooming where men gave life for man; listen and hear the joyous dancing footsteps of those yet unborn."

"Behold the Open Gate, before which stand weary pilgrims: children with eyes empty of laughter; youth burdened with the weight of dead dreams; the elder ones their eyes but burned out embers, their bone-lean hands caressing gaunt throats that too long have felt the choking leash of fear. See their eyes re-light with hope as they view the green acres of democracy and reverently enter the gate of America."

Suddenly I knew: The flag is an emblem of freedom, protection, justice, honor, sacrifice, opportunity to all and love for country, fellowman and God. It is the symbol, not only of our heritage from the past but of the future. I knew that it is up to me to help America continue to mean to coming generations what it means to me today; that every right has its concomitant duty, that I must train myself to be able to choose leaders wisely and judge their performance with honesty and understanding. I must fight oppression, intolerance, injustice and keep the land free of the footprints of communism. I must guard the rights of others as jealously as I do my own, and recognize in every man a brother.

Again I looked at the flag waving serenely beneath our peaceful country sky and reverently I breathed, "How much you stand for!" Was I dreaming or did I hear, "The earth a great DEMOCRACY OF LOVE!"

These courses will be arranged to meet the needs of the women taking them. They may be two, three or four weeks long. Be present to help plan the course, you want to take to suit your convenience. There is no charge for the course.

Since Mrs. Jones has had five years of experience as County Home Demonstration Agent for Extension Service, and eleven years experience as Homemaking Supervisor for the U. S. Department of Agriculture; she will feel at home helping to solve any problem of the homemaker.

All homemakers are invited to attend one of these meetings May 31 and join your neighbor who is taking advantage of the newest thing in Home and Family Life Education.

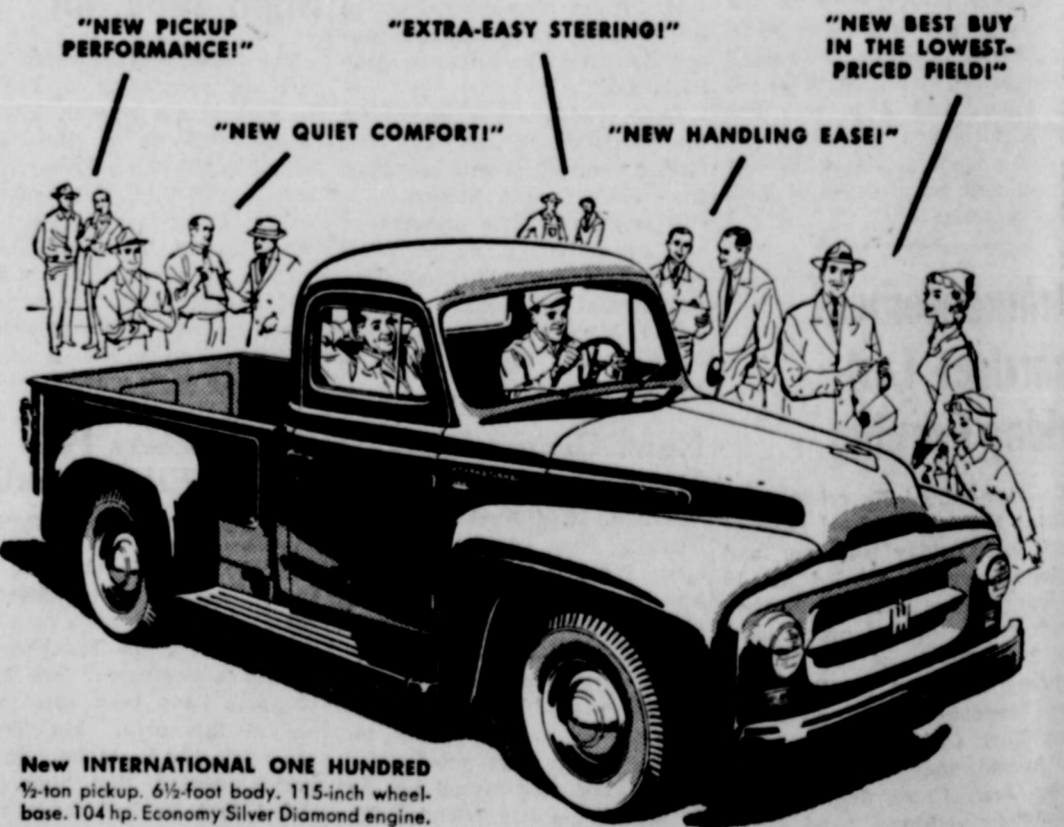

Mr. McMillan will be working toward the doctorate with a major in history and minor in government with his adviser being Dr. Carl Coke Rister, distinguished professor of history.

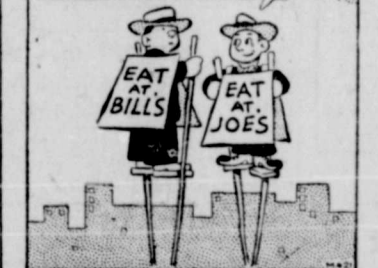
