

Mayor pro-tem resigns

The Muleshoe City Council accepted a letter of resignation from the mayor pro-tem and city councilman of District #2, A.V. Wood, during a meeting on Tuesday. The resignation took affect on Jan. 14.

Wood has served seven terms on the city council and was chosen mayor pro-tem in 1993 by the city council, to

Claunch, Wheeler claim top prizes in the steer show

Familiar faces returned to the top in the market steer division of the Bailey County Junior Livestock Show, held Jan. 14 at the Bailey County Coliseum.

Jacen Claunch and Jeffrey Wheeler, both of Muleshoe, walked away with the show's top prizes for the second year in a row; reversing the order of the 1994 competition.

Claunch's champion Exotic Cross was chosen the Grand Champion by judge Bert Williams of Spearman, the Agricultural Extention agent for Hansford County. Wheeler's reserve champion Exotic Cross followed as the Reserve Grand Champion.

Last year's show saw Wheeler exhibit the Grand Champion and Claunch show the Reserve Grand Champion.

There were 48 steers, five dairy heifers and three beef heifers in the show.

Claunch is awarded **Jimmie Dale Black Award**

Jacen Claunch, son of Jim Pat and Susie Claunch, won the annual Jimmy Dale Black Memorial Showmanship Award during the Bailey County Junior Livestock Show Jan. 13-14.

Representing the steer showmen in the contest, Claunch earned the approval of showmanship judge Storm Gerhart, a retired vocational agriculture teacher from Grady, NM.

Kennedy, Hahn win top barrow awards

Leaner, lighter packages were the preference of judge Dirk Aaron of San Antonio during the Junior Market Swine Division of the annual Bailey County Junior Livestock Show, held Jan. 13-14 at the Bailey County Coliseum.

Ky Kennedy's 198-pound Cross barrow was chosen by Aaron as the Grand Champion, while a 176-pound Duroc exhibited by Kyle Hahn was judged the Reserve Grand Champion.

Aaron, the Bexar County Extension agent, selected the trimmer pigs on fairly consistent basis. Even in the cases in which a champion or reserve champion came from the heavyweight class, most were among the lightest in their respective class.

Aaron broke the mold in the Chester class however, where Bryce Embry's 215-pounder was the champion. Johnathan Bennett had the reserve champion at 165.

In the gilt division, Kimberly Griswold had the champion with her 175-pound entry that came from the lightest weight class. Aaron stepped up for the reserve champion, choosing Ben Angeley's 222pound heavyweight as the reserve champion.


The Hampshire breed saw both top prizes come from the. Tooley had the reserve champion at 180.

In his letter of resignation, Wood cited a major reason for his resignation was due to a change in his lifestyle and lack of time. Wood is reportedly commuting to Farwell, where he is considering moving.

Upon accepting Wood's resignation, the council discussed whether or not to appoint a replacement. Under the Texas Election Code, someone may be appointed to fulfill the remainder of Wood's term, which expires in May, and must then seek election to that office thereafter.

However, since there, are only exec months left on Wood's term and the next

scheduled election cannot be held until May, the council may not appoint semebody. Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr said that a decision will be made by the next city council meeting whether or not to name an appointee.

City councilmen Tom Bonds and Juan Chavez both said they would like to see somebody appointed to fulfill the remainder of Wood's term.

In addition to serving as mayor pro-tem and city councilman, Wood also represented the city council by serving on the Bailey County Appraisal District Board. The city council must now also appoint another city councilman to fill Wood's seat on that board.

City council discusses annexation of airport

The Muleshoe City Coun-

cil discussed an annexation schedule of the Muleshoe Municipal Airport during a meeting Tuesday. The proposed annexation of the airport, which is located on Highway 84, east of Muleshoe, will give the city jurisdiction over that property and will give the city authority to develop that area.

Dave Marr, Muleshoe city manager, said that a public hearing would be held, which is routine, prior to the annexation being approved by the council.

The annexation will include the airport itself and a small strip of land on the right side of the airport.

In other business Tuesday, the council authorized the city manager to work with a negotiator and with Wes-Tex Feedyard, Inc., in order that

Marr reported to the board that the city expects to receive about the same amout of funding to seal coat roads this year as last year. 





Mr. Knox had been a resi-". dent of Sudan since 1947. moving there from Jacksboro. He owned and operated the Knox Texaco service station for many years.





Property By April 14th

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

IP You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1994. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1995.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1995 renditions is April 14. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 14 deadline.



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




Farm Bureau donates to Lazbuddie **Volunteer Fire** Department

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber -- not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisa!, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1995 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already received agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail





West Texas A & M to offer new class

CANYON – West Texas A&M University will offer a new course in conservation biology from 11 a.m. - 12:15 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays during the spring semester

"Conservation biology is a relatively new field of inquiry that is expanding in both scope and significance especially at the national and international levels.," Dr. Kathleen Blair, assistant professor of biology, said. "It is somewhat of a synthesis between theoretical ecology and wildlife management."

According to Blair, the course will address such issues as conservation values and ethics, patterns and processes in biodiversity, conservation genetics, demographics, community ecology, habitat fragmentation, conservation management, ecological restoration, ecology, politics, economics, finding common ground and

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"Conservation biology is the root of many state natural heritage programs and federal and international policy decisions," Blair said. "Many jobs within state and federal land management programs require employees to follow ecological management plans."

Blair said this course will better prepare graduates to enter into state and federal programs and would be beneficial to those working in the field who are required to follow ecosystem Management plans.

According to Blair, one example of ecosystem management is the desire of Yellowstone National Park biologists to reintroduce wolves into the ecosystem of the park. "Without the top predators,

the system will not function properly," Blair said. "Whereas most biologists understand this, it is also important for them to understand how to communi-

cate this with the public."


Prerequisites for the course include an ecology or wildlife management course or Blair's approval. Students can register for the course under BIQL 5450 or BIOL 450.
