Social Security Benefits Announced For Briscoe County

Mothers and children in the 26-county Texas Panhandle are receiving \$69,582 of the \$233,563 in monthly social security insurance payments in the Panhandle in December, 1953, John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security office announced today.

The largest group of beneficiaries under the social security insurance program, however, continues to be retired workers, Sanderson said. In December, 2,879 such beneficiaries in the Panhandle received \$130,734, not including payments to wives and children of such workers. There was an increase of more than 27% over the number of all beneficiaries in this area compared with December, 1952.

Many people think of old-age and survivors insurance as a program for retired workers and their dependents exclusively. As these figures indicate, however, survivors benefits are an important part of the program too. In total, 6,153 persons in the Panhandle area received payments amounting to \$233,563 in the month of December, Sanderson said.

In Briscoe County in the month of December, 59 persons received a total of \$2,134 in old-age and survivors insurance payments.

In Russia, however, you would be exposed to a continuous blare of propoganda, to the effect that the leaders of the country were providing you with best life, while those hateful capitalists and imperialists in America were keeping their poor people down!

As long as there is advertising in America, there will be freedom in America; as long as America lives under the free enterprise system, there will be peace and prosperity in America.

Maybe you have never looked on advertising as a defender of your freedom. But it is. You see, advertising is the expression of a free man. It can only exist in a country where men are permitted to express themselves and their ideas freely.

The next time you pick up your newspaper and read the ads, which to many readers are just as significant and interesting as the editorial parts of the paper, you are witnessing the current expression of one of the tenets of America's founding fathers—freedom of speech.

As long as he tells the truth about his goods, any American business man can say anything about them that he likes.

It is no small thing to know that in a world, half of which is living in the slavery called Communism, that you have the freedom of choice which the ads in your newspaper give you.

As you read these ads, as you study the different goods and ideas which are being advertised, be grateful, first that the men who founded this country granted you freedom, and that those who came later fought to perpetuate it. And be grateful you are not in Russia, for if you were, you wouldn't be reading the ads!

—And to think—some merchants in America still try to operate with out taking advantage of this privilege.

Highway Statistics For Briscoe County

Austin, Texas, — During the last five years, 19,40 miles of roads have been built in Briscoe county. It was Texas greatest period of road construction history, Highway Department files show.

The breakdown by counties as well as state totals prepared by the department showed that \$802,986.91 was spent in the county for maintenance of present roads and for the gigantic construction program.

Meanwhile in Austin Governor Shivers cited the impressive figures "as evidence that the state's construction program is giving Texas motorists the best roads that engineering can provide."

The report showed that 14,926.10 miles of roads added to the state highway systems over the period covered cost \$575,158,577.22, more money spent for construction than in any other comparable period.

Figures also showed that Farm-to-Market roads came in for a lion's share of the total. The roads were named a priority because they give farmers needed routes to markets and access to towns surrounding rural areas, a highway official said.

Shivers, who said he was very proud of the excellent way Texas roads have been moved in the last half-decade, listed dollars and time saved as two prime benefits to Texas motorists.

"State drivers have been able to save countless hours and money through good roads that provide the ultimate in safety and design," he remarked.

He also pledged that he "would do everything in my power" to continue the present rapid pace of road - building and maintenance.

"A road system worthy of its name must provide its motorists with swift, safe routes," he said.

The "Waiting List" of applicants for enlistment in the Navy has been practically eliminated due to the recent quota increase, it was announced today by Chief C. A. Bunton, Navy recruiter.

He said, "The Navy has drastically increased its requirements for new recruits during the fiscal year 1955 because of the less-than-expected reenlistment rates."

"For the past year and a half," the recruiter said, "navy applicants have had to wait several months before they were able to enlist. With the quota doubled this month and further increases expected during the coming fiscal year, most applicants and particularly those making top qualifying scores, can be enlisted without waiting beyond the processing period."

The recruiter advises all prospective applicants coming to Amarillo to have in their possession a certified copy of a birth certificate.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I have a Korean GI term insurance policy — the kind that doesn't pay dividends. Would it be possible for me to convert it to a permanent form of insurance?

A — No. Under the law, non-participating term insurance policies issued to Korean veterans may not be converted to permanent plans.

Q — I am a disabled World War II veteran, and I'd like to take vocational rehabilitation training under Public Law 16. If I'm eligible to train, would I be allowed to take a four-year law course?

A — No. The law would allow you to take only a course that you could complete by July 25, 1956, the date the Public Law 16 training program comes to an end. You would have to enroll for a course that you could finish in two years or less.

Q — I am a World War II veteran taking GI Bill training at night. I have a job that normally doesn't require me to travel, but I found out that I'm going to have to take a three-week business trip, and therefore interrupt my training. Will I be permitted to resume my GI Bill training when I get back? Or is this the kind of interruption that's not allowable?

A — You will be permitted to resume your GI Bill training when you return from your trip. VA considers such a temporary interruption as one caused by a "valid reason," so long as it doesn't last for more than four months. If it did last longer, you would be required to show VA that you couldn't possibly

have resumed your training earlier.

Q — Does the August 20, 1954 deadline for starting Korean GI Bill training apply to all Korean veterans?

A — No. The August 20 cut-off date applies only to veterans separated from service before August 20, 1952. Veterans sep-

arated after that date have two years from separation to begin Korean GI Bill training.

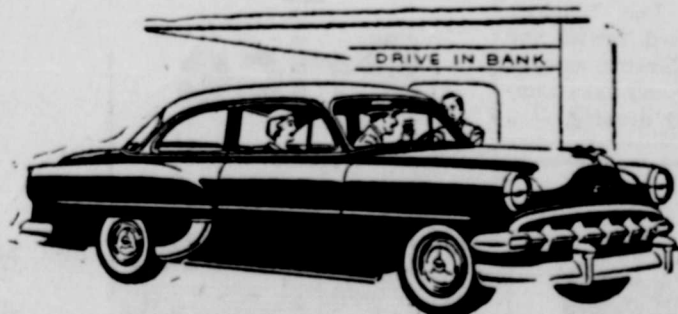

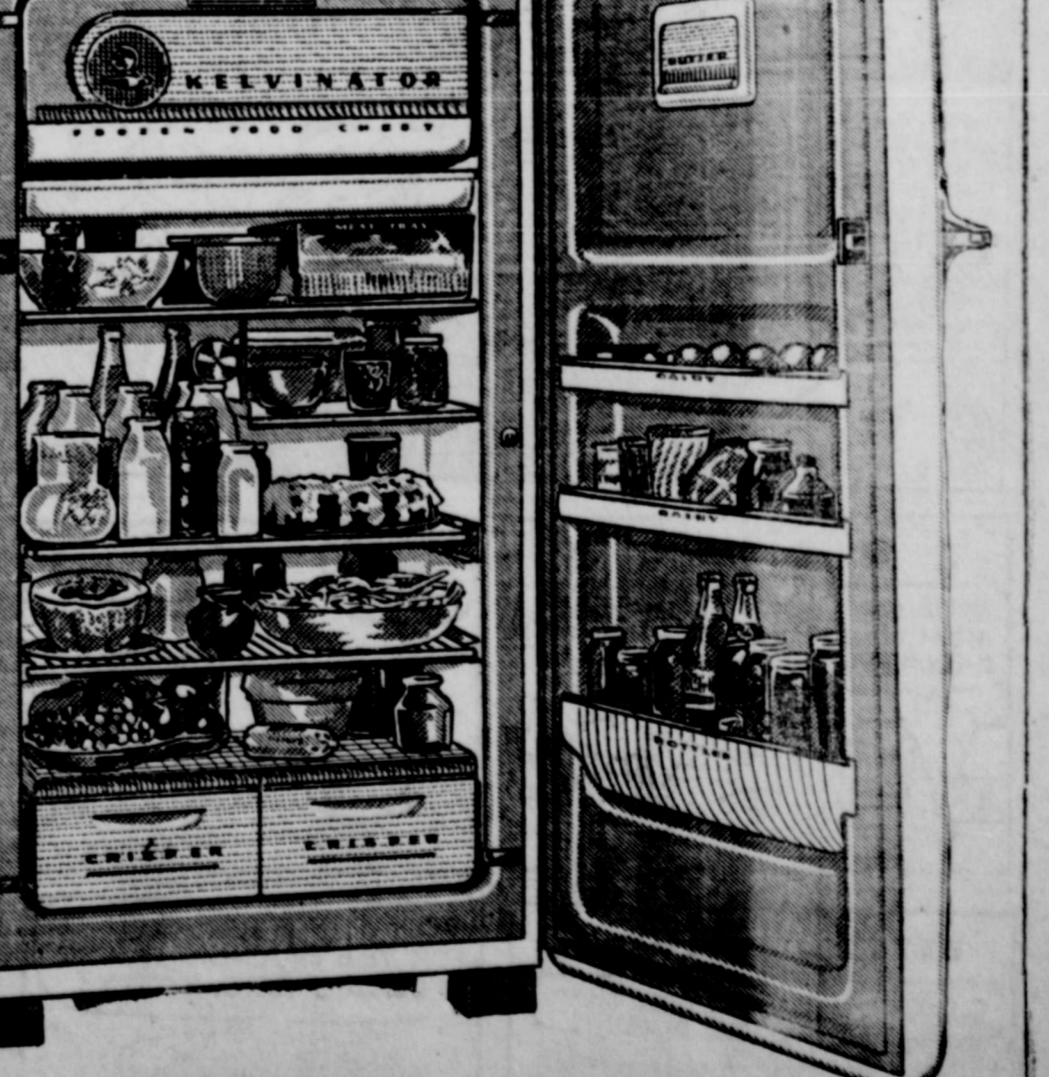

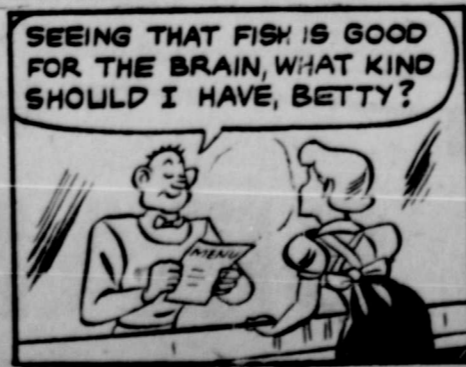
