They Go Together

IT WOULD be difficult to deny that children and pets really belong together. They're a perfect combination. And especially so when it comes to picture taking.

The picture of the little girl and lovebird which illustrates today's column makes that very clear. Combining them often makes amateur snapshots possible that otherwise would require more elaborate equipment than most of us use. Birds are not the world's easiest subjects for photography. It would have been much harder to get a good picture of the lovebird by itself than to snap this.

As in the case of a boy with his dog, the little girl and the bird compliment each other. Each adds something to the picture of the other. The presence of the pet in the picture gives the child something on which to center his or her attention. Consequently, there's little in the way of camera consciousness and a good, natural expression will be the result.

The child in the picture also oftentimes serves as an "anchor" for the pet. Animals don't always understand the importance of staying within a prescribed area to have their picture taken. They've been known to take off in a hurry for another corner just as their owner was ready to snap a picture.

In picturing the child and his pet, try for a nice neutral background such as the one in the picture above. That makes both of your subjects stand out nicely. There is nothing to confuse the story your picture is telling or to take the viewer's attention away from the child and the pet.

These two subjects go together so very well that it would be highly worthwhile, and fun, besides, to work out a series of pictures, to tell a complete story of the child and the pet.

State and national issues affecting farmers and ranchers will be discussed, according to Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau. In addition to county leaders urging attendance at the sessions, Hammond called their attention to the fact that the Texas Legislature would be meeting next month with several vital issues to be decided by the lawmakers.

There will be an intensive effort to increase the funds provided for road building, which will involve a new source of revenue," Hammond stated. Some of the proposals to raise additional revenue will be an increased tax on gasoline, establishment of the tractor gas fund, a tax on natural gas, state sales tax, or a state income tax. As for national farm issues, the state farm organization lead-

er said that the problem of diverted acres is one of the most serious problems facing agriculture.

J. J. Steele Enjoying Briscoe County News

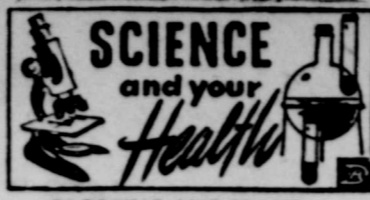

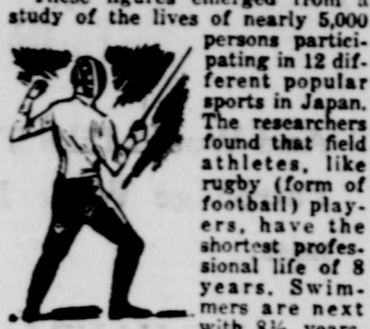

SPORTING LIFE SPANS
By Science Features

The fencer, who can count on over 52 years of participation, has the longest active life in his sport of any athlete. Jockeys stay in the saddle an estimated 22 years, the baseball player keeps going for some 18 seasons while the table tennis player lasts for 16 years.



These figures emerged from a study of the lives of nearly 5,000 persons participating in 12 different popular sports in Japan. The researchers found that field athletes, like rugby (form of football) players, have the shortest professional life of 8 years. Swimmers are next with 8 1/2 years.

In view of the increasing importance placed on sports, said the Canadian Medical Association Journal, publishers of the survey, the medical profession has taken some notice of the sportman in relation to health. This, however, is one of the few studies published about the life span and health of the athlete.

The researchers examined the reasons why athletes retire, finding that decline in physical fitness cuts off the careers of most wrestlers and jockeys but is unimportant in retiring tennis players and fencers. Actual disease forced the retirement of 20 per cent of Japanese athletes, the survey showed, with tuberculosis striking nearly one of every 10 in the group.

Injuries were the most important factor in stopping cyclists (22 per cent) and football players (10 per cent). Wrestlers were not affected by the injury factor very much, a finding which suggests, according to the Journal, that Japanese wrestling is a lot less brutal than the variety shown on American TV screens.
