## Silverton Owls Will Battle Happy Cowboys Friday

The Silverton Owls will journey to Happy, Friday night, Sept. 24, for the third game of the 1954 season. Both Silverton and Happy have one win and one defeat for this year. Happy won from Bovina last Friday night by a score of 27 to 13, and lost to Canyon the week before by a score of 40 to 0. Silverton won from Kress in their first game 33 to 0 and were defeated by Dimmitt by a score of 31 to 0.

Silverton coaches were rejoicing this week over the return of James May to left guard. This will be the first game for May this season due to an injury received during vacation.

The Happy Cowboys will be the third 2-A team for Silverton this year. Happy has been rated to finish second to Dimmitt in district 2-A. The Cowboys are made up mostly of Junior boys who gained experience their Freshman and Sophomore years. Happy won only three of their 10 games last season. The Owls defeated the Cowboys here last year by a score of 33 to 9.

Jamie Allison 160 lb. end who was injured in the Dimmitt game was still out of school this week, recovering from breaking four ribs. Jimmy Don Wilson has been shifted from the backfield to the end position.

Silverton's probably starting lineup against Happy will be: Jimmy Don Wilson, right end; Bob Barrett, right tackle; Jimmy Whitfill, right guard; Keith Whitfield, center; James May, left guard; Robert Hill, left tackle; C. L. Dunn, left end; Brad Wilson, quarter back; Sid Marshall, left half; Doyle Tiffin, full back; Don Ledbetter, right half.

The Silverton Owls will meet Price College here October 1, and will open their conference play here with Lakeview on October 8. We hope there will be a good number of supporters at Happy Friday night. Let's back the Owls.

### Lubbock Fair Opens Monday September 27

Briscoe County will play an important part in the 37th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair which opens in Lubbock on Monday, Sept. 27, and continues through Saturday, Oct. 2.

In the Agriculture Department, Briscoe County will have a county-wide exhibit of some of the outstanding crops of this area. County Agent Robert M. Ledbetter is in charge of the display.

All high school bands in the county have been invited to participate in the colorful Parade of Bands which will be held at 10 a. m. Monday in downtown Lubbock as the official opening of the Fair. Several dozen bands from throughout the area will be competing for \$600 in cash prizes.

Monday will also be School Day for the entire area. All school students will be admitted to the Fair grounds without charge.

This year's Fair will have an ultra-modern appearance with the gala opening of three huge new buildings. The largest structure on the grounds is the new 5, 500-seat Fair Park Coliseum which will be opened with a Grand Old Opry show direct from WSM, Nashville, Tenn., featuring Webb Pierce, the Wilburn Brothers and the Wondering Boys. Extra attractions will be the Madox Brothers and Rose, Slim Whitman and the Star Dusters. Shows will begin daily at 2:30 p. m.

Larger Agriculture and Women's Buildings will allow additional exhibit space for those two departments. A special farm implement show, the largest in West Texas, has been arranged along new walkways and a second midway which have been constructed during the last year.

Among the special entertainment features of this year's Fair will be five daily free puppet shows by the Lessell Marionettes, twice daily aerial acts by the Sensational Ortons and the Flying Romans, and nightly free fireworks displays. The Bill Hames Carnival shows will again be presented.

Fair officials are expecting all attendance records to fall during the week.

### Couple Die In Plane Crash

Amarillo — A Texas couple identified as Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kline Burson of Liberty, was killed Saturday when their private plane crashed in the Blue Mountains, 19 miles northeast of Hamburg, Pa., according to a news release received here.

Kline was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bland Burson, prominent ranchers of the Channing community.

Police at Hamburg said the plane had taken off from Harrisburg, Pa., but its destination was not determined immediately. Kline's parents were reported enroute to Liberty and were not available to give any information on the accident.

The news report said Pvt. Albert Schmutzler of the Hamburg state police barracks said residents near the scene saw the plane circle overhead in apparent distress before plunging into a wooded section with a loud crash. Removal of the bodies from the wreckage was delayed for several hours because of the denseness of the crash scene.

Surviving in addition to the parents is one brother, Ned Burson of Canyon. One other brother, Vance Burson, was killed in a plane crash some time ago.

Kline Burson, was born and grew up in Silverton and was a graduate of Silverton High School. His father Bland Burson, who lived here for many years, is a son of Mrs. Euna Burson and a brother of Troy, True and Tony Burson of Silverton. Gordon Alexander of Silverton, is a brother to Mrs. Bland Burson. Funeral services were to be held at Liberty, Texas yesterday. Many of the local relatives attended. Interment was also at Liberty.

**Veteran's Questions And Answers**

**Q** — I was seriously disabled in a train wreck while traveling, under orders, to an induction center. Even though I never entered military service, would I still be entitled to VA compensation payments for my disability?

**A** — Yes. Under a recent law, your disability is considered to have occurred in active military service, provided it was not the result of your own misconduct.

**Q** — Since I am rated as 60 percent disabled, I am receiving extra compensation pay because I have a family. I understand that my basic compensation check will go up five percent October 1. Will the extra pay for my family also increase on that date?

**A** — No. The law did not provide for five percent increase in the extra payments made to veterans for dependents. Only your basic compensation will be increased.

**Q** — I expect to get out of service within the next few weeks. What is my deadline for starting Korean GI Bill training?

**A** — Your deadline for starting Korean GI Bill training will be three years from the date of your separation from the armed forces.

**Q** — Is it necessary to apply for the five percent increase in compensation payments, recently voted by Congress?

**A** — No. The five percent increase will be made automatically. It will be included in checks mailed at the end of October. It goes in effect October 1.

**Social Security Information**

Have you at one time or another, been told by the Social Security Administration that you as a survivor were not entitled to Social Security Benefits because the deceased did not have enough quarters of coverage? If so, John R. Sanderson manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office has an important message for you. You should inquire again.

Prior to the Social Security Act Amendments signed on September 1, 1954, all wage earners that died before September 1, 1950 were required to have a certain number of quarters of coverage, depending upon their age and the date of their death. NOW, monthly benefits can be paid to age 65 widows, minor children and dependent parents IF the deceased wage earner had only 6 quarters of coverage. Only a year and a half of covered work will entitle the survivors to monthly benefits BEGINNING Sept. of this year.

This new provision does not

apply to the Lump Sum Death Payment, but only to the monthly benefits to survivors. Those that will be entitled to monthly benefits, will include widows over the age of 65, widows with children of the deceased wage earner under the age of 18 in their care, children, under age 18, and dependent parents.

If you are included in the above group, be sure to inquire as to your entitlement. If you know of anyone that would be included in the above group, be sure and have them call or write to the Social Security Office at Amarillo, Texas.

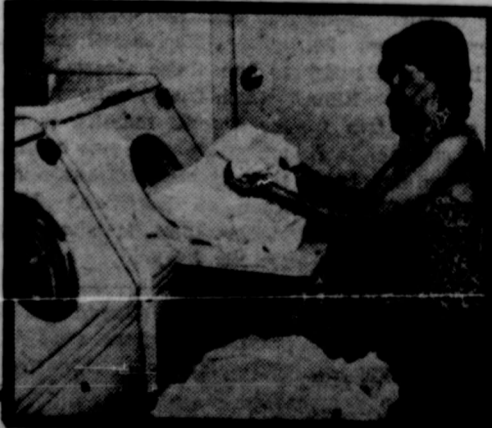

### Boy Scout Council To Build Camp

The South Plains Boy Scout Council has an 80-acre tract of land 10 miles northeast of Silverton in Briscoe County awaiting development — awaiting the funds to pay for the development.

The tract is known as Camp Haynes, given to the 20 county South Plains Council in 1942 by the late John Haynes in memory of his mother. The camp is located in a huge canyon area, beautiful because of the roughness of the terrain and because of the contrasting coloring of trees and rocks. The Little Red River runs through the canyon and the Scout Council has a fine dam which has created an excellent water area for fishing and boating.

The camp will serve the boys of the Council as an advanced short term, overnight and weekend camping area. The plans for development call for three developed Troop campsites, each capable of handling 36 Scouts and Leaders at a time.

But the development will depend on the success of the annual campaign for operating funds in the 20-county area in October and November. The total construction cost is estimated conservatively at \$7,000 at the campsite. This figure will be included in the Council's campaign for its regular operating budget this fall. Total campaign goal, according to Joe T. Salom, President of the South Plains Council, is \$100,000.

W. R. Sewell of Lubbock is Chairman of the Council's Finance Committee; and Ray Mowery of Texas Tech is Chairman of the overall operating and capital development part of the entire program.

Each of the three developed Troop campsites will include a Troop Cabin 12 by 14 feet with cement floor, provisions for cooking and small meetings. The Troop Cabins will be built in a rustic style out of quarter logs, which will blend with the rugged environment.

An adirondack shelter 9 by 14 feet for winter camping purposes will be included on each Troop campsite. They will have concrete floors and will be constructed with quarter logs. Fireplaces for cooking and reflector heating will be on the open side of the shelter.

Troop washing and bathing and toilet facilities will be erected on each Troop campsite. The Troops will add, later on, flag poles and Council fire rings.

A large spring under a big cottonwood tree northeast of the dam has been boxed in cement. Water will be piped to an overhead storage tank to be chlorinated for drinking purposes. Pipes then will carry water to each Troop campsite. Water from the springs will also be diverted through pipe to the new concrete swimming pool. The swimming pool will be 20 by 50 feet with water flowing through

it continuously. A four-foot walk completely around the apron of cement will form a pool. A two-rail cement fence will surround the wall thus enclosing the pool.

A 10 by 10 foot-bath house for dressing and showering will be located on one corner of the pool at the shallow end. The bath house will be of concrete block construction. The depth will range from 3 to 7 feet. An 8-inch drain will provide the necessary drainage so that the floor and sides can be cleaned regularly.

An outdoor shelter 16 by 32 feet will provide an assembling area in case of a rain or for larger gathering and demonstrations. It will have a concrete floor and pitched roof supported by five poles on each side. Provisions will also be made for an up-to-date rifle range with 8 shooting stands and a field archery course.

The Farm Bureau got Congress to write in an Amendment to that law letting the Farm Bureau sell Farm Surplus products to other countries and take their money for it. This method

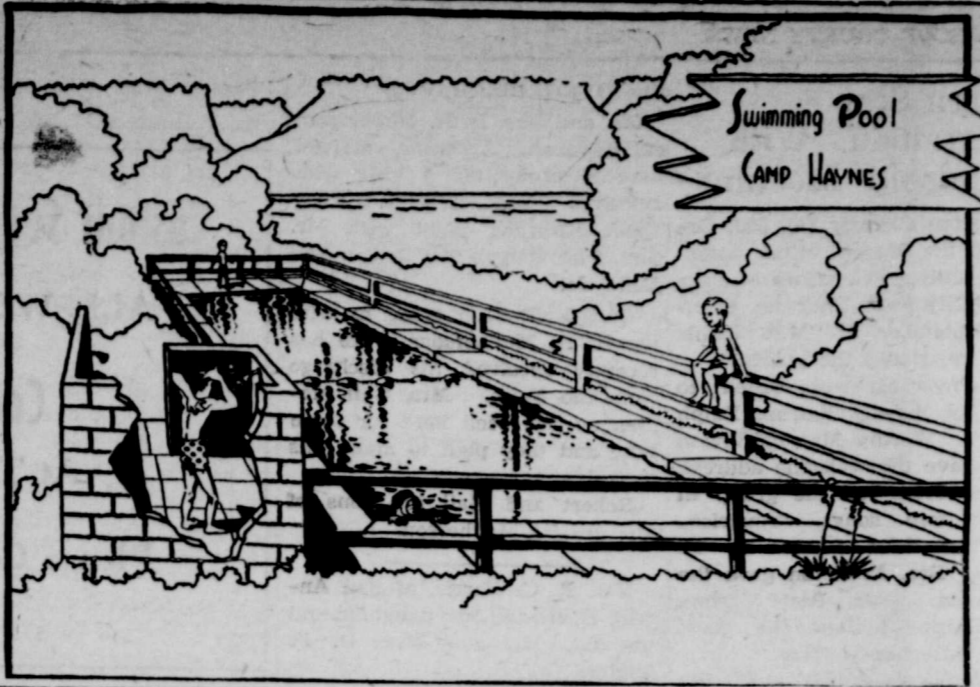
worked out satisfactorily until the Farm Bureau is disposing of much farm products in this manner.

We had good intentions those "many years ago" to have a get together every five years. Now we have waited too long to start looks like, probably wouldn't even recognize each other! There are many whom I have not seen since graduation night, with college and the war, many were separated never to return. Jobs opened up for them in Alaska, New York and in-between. ### Results of Polio Drive In County

Kenneth Sharp, County Drive Chairman, for 1954 Emergency Polio Fund Campaign, announces that the campaign has closed. All over the nation Polio Funds have reached a new low, due to two major causes. One has been the extensive research on a preventive antitoxin, with the results being Gamma Globulin. The second being that more cases required assistance this year.

During the recent campaign Mr. Sharp reported an income from all sources to be \$224.09 in Silverton District and \$154.31 in the Quitaque District.

The regular annual Polio drive in January netted something over \$1300.00. All polio drives are divided three ways equally between county, state and national funds. The county funds are used to aid local cases, state funds are for counties who have depleted their local funds to draw from. The National funds are for research.

Briscoe county has assisted with four cases this year. One from Silverton and two from Quitaque. Assistance was given another polio victim from the Silverton area, a patient at Scottish Rites Hospital in Dallas.

By November the funds of Briscoe County will be depleted, according to the estimation of Hugh Nance, Treasurer. There has been one patient from Quitaque, which \$896.00 for hospital care was paid last week and an estimated \$1440.00 will be needed for hospital care through November 20, estimated date of dis-

missal. The other two patients who were stricken with the malady this year have been released. The assistance to one was \$331.00 to the other \$230.00. Assistance to the patient recuperating was \$155.00.

According to Claude Witten, administrator of Plainview Hospital and Clinic Foundation over 100 polio patients have been admitted this year. He said approximately one half have been county chapter cases. He also said newspapers should urge people to carry Polio insurance.

Also we have recently received a press release from Lederer Laboratories as follows: Gamma Globulin, for the prevention of paralytic polio, measles and infectious hepatitis, will be available on doctors' prescriptions through regular medical supply

last year's supply.

"Gamma Globulin is the only proved weapon now available to physicians for prophylaxis against paralytic poliomyelitis."

Since gamma globulin is extracted from human blood, the supply will always be limited.

Not to be confused with the polio vaccine now undergoing trial in this country, gamma globulin may perhaps be described as a grab bag of temporary immunity. It is that part of human blood which prevents an individual from catching some infectious disease twice.

Collection and distribution of gamma globulin is an organized way for the immune to lend their immunity to individuals who have no antibodies of their own. As long as the borrowed antibodies remain in the blood, they will prevent or reduce the severity of an attack of the disease against which they were after five to eight weeks, the borrowed antibodies pass out of originally manufactured. But the blood. The main use of gamma globulin then is to safeguard against an epidemic or a threatened exposure in the immediate future.
