

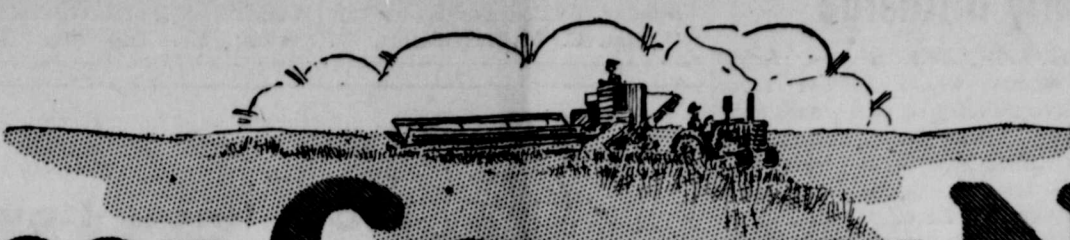

Silverton Owls Will End Season In Battle With Turkey Turks

SILVERTON OWLS

The Silverton Owls will meet the Turkey Turks here Friday night in the last game of the Owls of the 1954 season.

The game will be played on the local field at 8:00 p. m. The Turks defeated the Owls last year 14 to 7 in the conference title game. The Turks who were rated by some of the scribes early in the season to repeat their winning of district, have not fared so well in conference play. They have won two conference games and lost three. The Owls have won 4 conference games and lost 1. Silverton can win second in the conference Friday night by defeating the Turks. If Turkey should win Silverton will be tied in second spot with Quitaque.

The Turks however are reported to have a strong team. They tied Bovina in a non-conference game and Bovina went on to win their district. The Turks as 1953 district champs, lost nine lettermen and had 12 lettermen to return. Unbeaten in district play last year they lost to Stinnett, 18-12 in bi-district.

Friday night coach, Buddy Travis, is expecting to start the same boys he has for the last 3 or 4 games. John Koger Funeral Services Held Wednesday

The funeral services for John Koger, who was found dead near his home Monday, was held at Lockney Wednesday. Mr. Koger was found within a few minutes, after he had fallen from a wagon, by L. B. Garvin, Jr., who farms the place where Mr. Koger lived.

The funeral services were held at the Carter Funeral Chapel in Lockney at 3:00 p. m. yesterday afternoon. Interment was in the Lockney Cemetery beside his mother. Mr. Koger, who was a bachelor, had lived in the Silverton vicinity for many years, estimated by old timers as 50 years or more. Mr. Koger was survived by two sisters, Mrs. Pope and Mrs. Neaves, who live at Lockney, and a brother who lives at Clayton, New Mexico. He was 85 years of age, and lived on Mrs. Ben Garvin's farm south of Silverton, on the Floydada highway. He had been in feeble health for several years, and had been sick much of the time recently.

L. B. had seen Mr. Koger leave the house in his wagon some few minutes before he found the overturned wagon and Mr. Koger, although he did not see the accident. Mr. Koger was dead when L. B. arrived. It was not known whether the team ran, after Mr. Koger fell from the wagon, or had started running and threw him off.

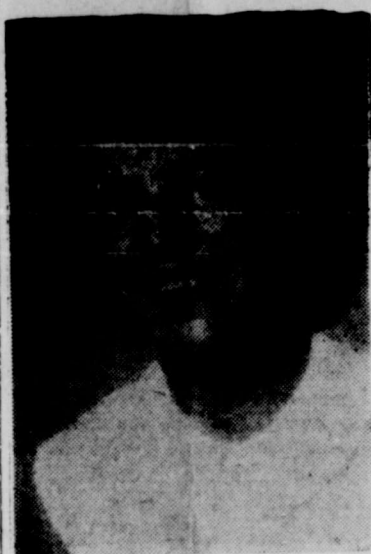
Silverton Girls Defeated Quitaque In Season Opener

Early Discharge

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Army personnel whose release from active military service would normally take place during the Christmas-New Year period will, with some exceptions, be separated between December 13 and 17 in order that they may spend the holidays at home, the Department of the Army has advised Fourth Army headquarters.

Officers and enlisted men who returned from overseas and are scheduled for separation during the holiday season period will be separated as soon after arrival as possible. To preclude overseas returnees from reporting for reassignment during the Christmas holiday period, leave for this period has been authorized.

The release policy applies only to personnel scheduled for separation during the December 13 to 17 period who are in the continental United States or its territories. Early departure from overseas stations to meet provisions of the policy is not authorized.

Exceptions to the policy are officers being released from active duty for purpose of reenlistment and retirement, who will continue to be processed in accordance with instructions issued in each case; non-regular Medical Corps, Dental Corps and Veterinary Corps officers who have not completed 21 months' active duty prior to release; enlisted personnel of Reserve components desiring to complete Reserve obligations, who may be retained until expiration of their terms of service; enlisted personnel inducted or enlisted under provisions of the Universal Military Training and Service Act, as amended, who are eligible for release prior to completing two years' active military service, but who must complete 21 months' active duty.

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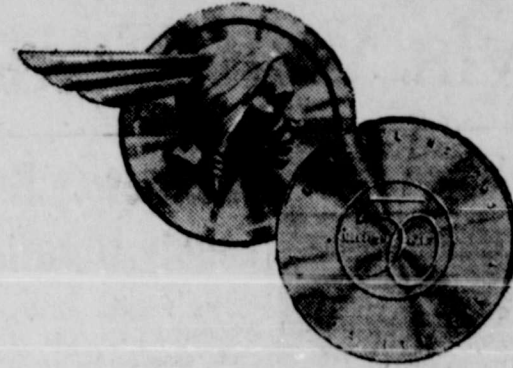

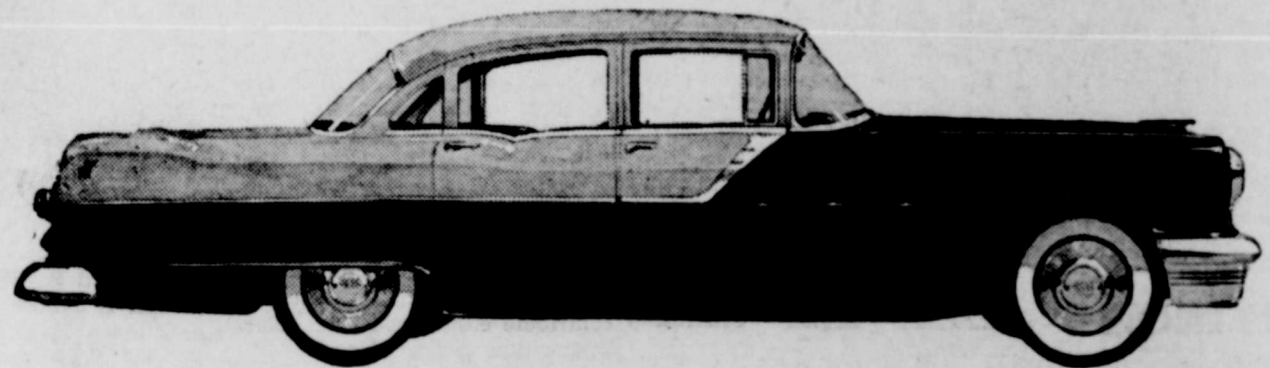

Asphalt Roofing, Wood Windows 'Engineered' for Modern Home

"Engineered" materials are one of the biggest advances in home construction since World War II. Although new, factory-made materials might be smaller, thinner, or lighter in weight than some older materials, they work as well or better and frequently are less expensive. Technological processes have given them all the qualities they require for the function they serve.

New heating equipment is an example. The bulky old furnace has been replaced by heaters that are compact and clean in operation. The small size of a modern heating plant enables it to be installed in a first-floor utility room, accounting for much of the feasibility of basementless house design.

Roofing material is another ex-

ample. Most homes being built today are roofed with asphalt shingles, a man-made fire-resistant material. Asphalt shingles also possess the necessary qualities of "weathering ability," durability, and the quality—new to roofing—of built-in color. Colorful roofing led the trend to colorful exterior materials in general.

Some "engineered" materials are simply older "natural" ones that have been greatly improved. An instance of this kind is the ponderosa pine window unit, in which the sash and the frame are made expressly for each other, resulting in less air infiltration and smoother operation. Formerly, the sash and the frame were separate items, and a window had to be assembled from pieces on the job.

Social Security For Farmers Explained

The 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act now bring Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance to most farm families. These amendments go into effect January 1, 1955 and make two main changes concerning farm people. These major changes will be explained below.

COVERAGE OF FARM EMPLOYEES
If you hire farm help on your farm, or if you do farm work for other farmers, the following changes are important to you:

1. Whether farm work is covered for social security purposes, starting January 1, 1955, depends on the amount of cash wages earned, not on the number of days worked. Any employee paid \$100 or more in cash wages for farm work during a calendar year is covered for social security purposes.
2. If you are a farm worker and have earned this social security coverage, be sure to show your social security card to your employer. If you are the employer, be sure to demand that you see the worker's card so you can copy his name directly from the card. You must have this

information when the social security tax return is made, and only by copying the name and number directly from the card can you be sure you have this information accurately.
3. Cash wages of less than \$100 in a year are not covered for social security purposes and will not be reported.
If you operate your own or a rented farm, the following changes are important to you:
1. If your net profits are as much as \$400 in 1955, you will make a social security report on these profits early in 1956 when you file your 1955 income tax return.
2. Even if your net profits are less than \$400 in a year you may, on a voluntary basis, report for social security purposes up to 1/2 of your gross income before expenses, not to exceed \$900.
3. This voluntary coverage applies only if you have net profits of less than \$400 — coverage is compulsory if your net profits are as much as \$400.

PURPOSE OF FEDERAL OLD-AGE AND SURVIVORS INSURANCE
1. To pay retirement insurance to covered employees after reaching age 65, and in some cases to the wife or child of such person.
2. To pay survivors insurance, in monthly payments, to the survivors of deceased workers.

HOW THE PROGRAM IS FINANCED
1. For employees, the tax rate is 2 per cent of the cash wages paid, with the employer paying a matching tax of 2 per cent.
2. For the self-employed farm operator, the tax rate is 3 per cent of net profits up to a maximum of \$4200 per year.

DON'T WALK YOURSELF TO DEATH

The Texas Safety Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety is cooperating with the National Safety Council in sponsoring a pedestrian safety program in Texas this month.

These groups are not trying to discourage people from walking. They are trying to encourage people to walk safely.

Not only the oldsters need to watch their step in traffic. He has a set of rules for all walkers. They are:

1. Cross streets at corners only.
2. Never walk into the street from between parked cars.
3. Obey traffic signs and signals — cross on Green or Walk only.
4. Wait on the sidewalk — not in the street — for the Green or Walk or for a gap in traffic if the corner has no traffic signal.
5. Cross streets in crosswalks — don't cross intersections diagonally.
6. Look LEFT and then RIGHT for traffic while crossing. Watch sharply for turning cars. (Be especially careful at one-way streets to check the direction of approaching traffic.)
7. After getting off a bus or streetcar, don't go around it, front or rear. Wait until it leaves before crossing.
8. Don't cross streets when in unfit physical condition. Get glasses if your vision is poor.
9. At night when walking on poorly lighted streets or country roads, carry something white. Don't rely on drivers seeing you.
10. Walk on Left facing traffic where there are no sidewalks.

Geiger Counters For Rent At Pala Duro Park

"Pala Duro Canyon State Park is the best spot in the Texas Panhandle to prospect for uranium, and we've made it possible for anyone to take a chance at today's biggest bonanza", Pete Cowart, park manager says.

He refers to the newly-opened concession to rent Geiger counters. This, he thinks, gives Panhandle residents an opportunity to experiment with a Geiger counter, have fun, and maybe find uranium without having to travel great distances or invest in expensive equipment.

"Anyone who finds a deposit of ore that assays as much as 20 per cent uranium per pound is eligible for the \$10,000 reward given by the Atomic Energy Commission," Cowart says.

Cowart says the AEC lists three types of sedimentary rocks as most likely to contain uranium, and all three types are found in Pala Duro Canyon.

This is the first time Geiger counters have been rented in a Texas state park. Cowart thinks it is the first time in the nation that the atomic-age devices have been used as a recreational attraction.

It has been rumored that prospectors were busy in the canyons in Briscoe county hunting for uranium.

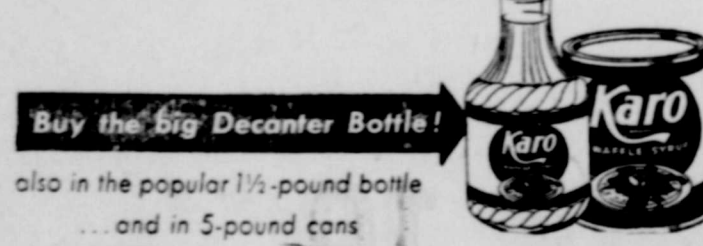
