

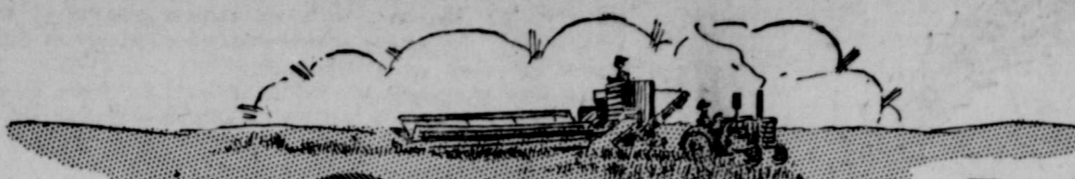

Monthly Accident Report Of Amarillo District

J. W. Blackwell, of the Texas Highway Patrol of the Amarillo district, reports that 10 persons were killed and 52 injured in traffic accidents during the month of November, property loss was valued at \$64,554. Fifty-seven accidents occurred on state and federal highways, 11 on farm to market roads, 25 on country roads and five in towns under 2,500 population.

The chief causes for the accidents were speeding, driving while drinking, illegal passing, failure to yield right of way, illegal turns.

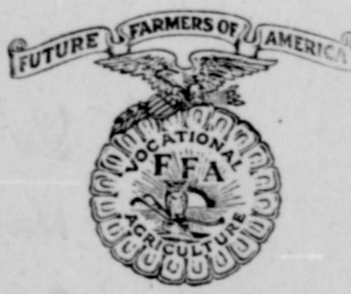
HERE FROM CALIFORNIA

We'd be up early though on Christmas morning and put the last minute touches on the food we were going to take, and as early as possible we'd rush off down to granny's. I didn't have many cousins at that time, so that meant we got mere presents and attention from the aunts and uncles. Those who hadn't delivered their presents the day before would bring them when they came to granny's.

The only sad part about those dinners was that everybody ate at the big table — by turns of course — and the kids turn usually came with the ones who were serving. And it seemed

like eternity. In the afternoon we'd play in the piles of fallen leaves under the big liveoaks, crack nuts, chat with the folks, play games, and eat some more. If there was any way of finagling at all, we kids would see to it that they all came to our house, or we went to somebody's house and enjoyed the festivities some more. Then we'd have roman candles and sparklers.

These are happy memories. The folks are getting together again this Christmas. Not at granny's, but at an aunt's, and how I long to enjoy the kin-folk get-together again. And you can be sure that if it is at all possible, I'll be there.

Merry Christmas to all of you, and I hope you too can be at your favorite granny's for Christmas dinner.

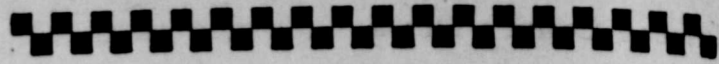

Reflecting the fear of starvation, peasant families in various parts of the world baked a special New Year's cake which they dashed against the door; member of the household hastened to pick up a piece and eat it, prayerful that neither hunger nor want should enter the house during the year.

The head of the family, with his eyes closed, opened the family Bible and indicated a passage with his finger; the text, solemnly read and interpreted was indicative of the luck—good or bad—that was in store for them.

In some villages, the superstition was taken so seriously that a dark-haired man was hired to be the first-footer. Going from house to house, he would be the first person to cross the threshold, thus preserving the good fortune of the community.

Anglo-Saxons, believing that something might happen when the New Year occurred often climbed upon the roof on New Year's eve so as to have a good view of any such event.

We moderns make as much noise as possible, presumably because our primitive ancestors believed that noise would keep evil influences at a distance.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I am attending school under the World War II GI Bill. I am planning to switch to a different school, although my course will be the same. How much time will I have to resume my training in my new school?

A — You will be required to resume your training within 30 days after you leave the old school, or on the first date stu-

dents are admitted to the course in the new school — whatever comes later.

Q — I am a disabled veteran attending law school under Public Law 16. After I finish my classroom work, would I be allowed to take a bar review course, also under Public Law 16?

A — Yes. Review courses are permitted under Public Law 16, but they must be bona fied review courses and not merely a repetition of the course previously taken.

Q — I have GI endowment insurance policy from World War II. After the endowment matures, how will I receive the money?

A — You will have a choice. You may elect to receive pay-

ment either in a lump sum or in a specified number of monthly installments.

Q — I served in the WAC during World War II, and have been holding a GI insurance policy ever since. I expect to get married next month. Does VA want proof of my marriage — such as a photostat of the marriage certificate — in order to change the name on my policy?

A — No, it's not necessary. All over your signature, requesting you need do is write a letter, that your name be changed in VA's records.

Q — May a veteran take Korean GI training in a school outside the United States?

A — Yes, provided he enrolls in a VA-approved course in an accredited college or university.

Q — I am taking flight training under the Korean GI Bill. Because of bad weather, I did not receive any instruction at all last month. Will I get my VA allowance all the same?

A — No. Flight trainees do not receive GI allowances for any month during which they received no instruction.

Q — I am planning to take a carpentry course under the Korean GI Bill. It is being offered by a school that requires a predominance of shop work. How many hours a week would I have to go to be considered a full-time student?

A — Full-time training in a trade course requiring shop practice is at least 30 hours a week for at least five days a week, with no more than two and one-half hours of rest periods each week.

Q — I was separated from service in May, 1952. What is my deadline for starting training under the Korean GI Bill?

A — Your deadline comes in May, 1955 — exactly three years from the date of your separation from active service.

New Year in France Day Par Excellence

January 1, la jour de la bonne annee, is the day par excellence in France.

On January 1, 1954 the Veterans Administration reported 5470 service connected cases of TB on their case registers. On the basis of their hospital records, VA officials said this would represent approximately 60 per cent of the active tuberculosis among the 1,000,000 Texas veterans.

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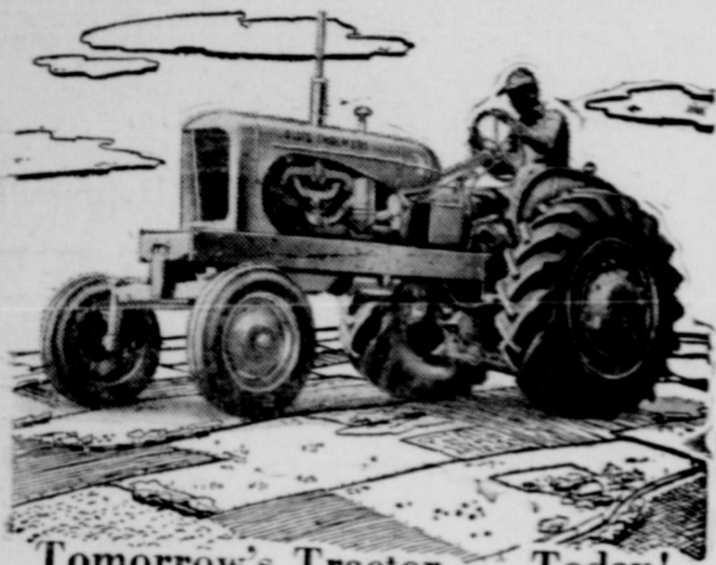
