### Pastor's - Layman's Conference Jan. 31 At Wayland College

Plainview, Dec. — The 31st session of Pastor's and Layman's Conference, which meets annually on the campus of Wayland College, will convene on Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 with Dr. Forrest Fezoz, Dallas, Dr. Jesse Northcutt, Fort Worth, and Dr. P. D. O'Brien, Big Springs, as the featured speakers.

Rev. Jones W. Weathers, pastor of First Baptist Church, Brownfield, is president of the group. C. J. Humphrey, Amarillo, is vice-president and J. L. Harden, Wayland business manager, is secretary-treasurer.

Around the theme "The Adequate Gospel" the two day program has been planned. The first session begins at 10 a. m., Monday, with Dean Bryan Robinson of Wayland bringing the welcome address prior to Dr. Northcutt's first lecture on "Study in Romans". He is on the faculty of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. "The Preacher and Preaching" will be Dr. O'Brien's title for each of the six sessions. He is pastor of First Baptist Church, Big Springs, and well known throughout the Panhandle Plains area.

Dr. Fezoz, the Texas Baptist executive secretary, speaks at the 11:40, 3:40 and 8:40 periods both days. He has been a popular speaker and preacher for the Plains Baptist Assembly near Floydada on many occasions.

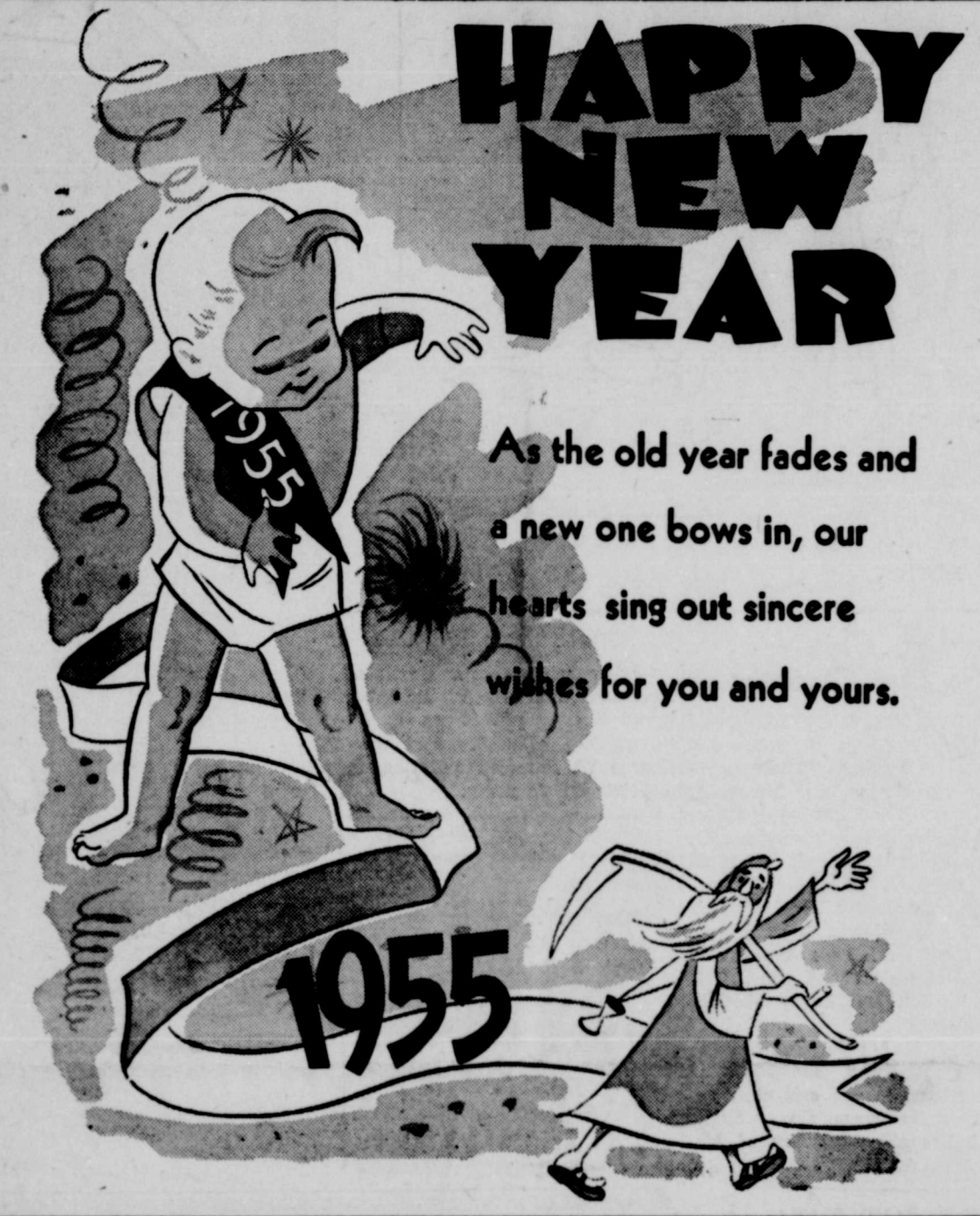
### 60th WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

### Loans Extended To Briscoe Farmers By F.H.A. For 1955

Designation of Briscoe County as an area where eligible farmers can obtain emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration has been extended by the U. S. Department until December 31, 1955, Ralph E. Griffiths, County Supervisor said today.

Applications are made at the Farmers Home Administration county office. The office for Briscoe County is located in the building with the ASC, SCS and County Agent's office in Silvertown. In applying for assistance a farmer must certify that because of substantial losses from the adverse weather conditions, or due to economic factors, he is unable to get from local private or cooperative sources the necessary financing to continue his normal operations.

Eligibility of applicants is determined by the Farmers Home Administration county committee. These loans may be made for the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, and for other essentials farm and home operating expenses. Emergency loans may not be made to pay existing debts. Ordinarily, emergency loans to meet current operating and living expenses are expected to be repaid out of the year's income. Amounts advanced for crop production purposes are repayable when the income from the sale of the crops produced with the loans is received. No loan is made unless it appears that an applicant has reasonable prospects for success.

The government obtains the best security obtainable for each loan made, including a first lien on all crops to be produced with the loan.

Emergency loans cannot be used to refinance existing debts.

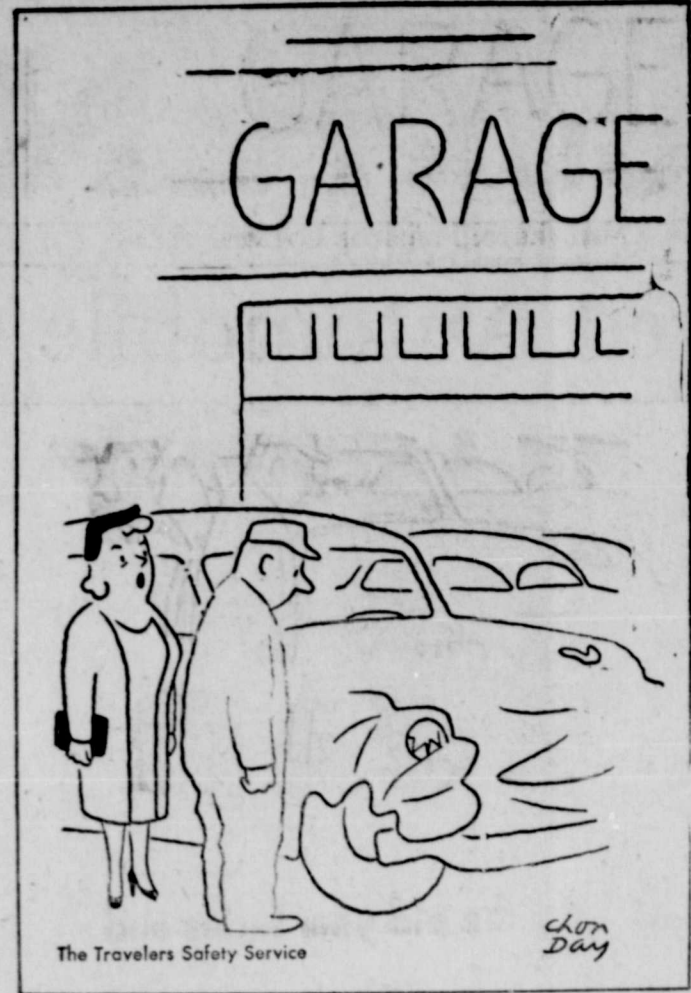

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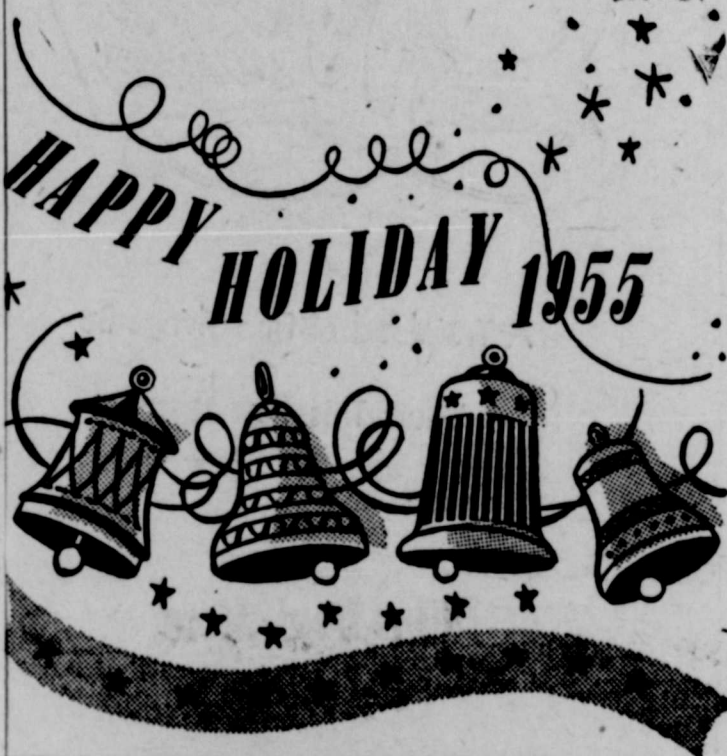

**Veterans Questions And Answers**

**Q** — I am the widow of a World War I veteran, receiving death pension payments. I recently received the proceeds of a fire insurance policy, to cover damage of a fire to my house. Does the fire insurance money count as income, for VA pension purposes?

**A** — No. Proceeds of a fire insurance policy are not considered in computing your yearly income for VA pension purposes.

**Q** — Can a veteran who lives in one State obtain a GI loan for the purchase of property in another State?

**A** — Yes, it is possible. However, you may find that lenders generally confine their lending operations to certain areas.

**Q** — I have a term National Service Life Insurance policy. Premiums were placed under waiver when I returned to active duty. I understand that the waiver will continue for 120 days after my separation from service. May I cut short that 120-day period? I would like to pick up my term policy and then convert it to a permanent plan of insurance, taking advantage of a lower premium rate because of my birth date.

**A** — Yes. You may resume your term policy at any time after your separation, without waiting for the 120-day period to expire. Of course, once you resume payments you may convert to a permanent plan.

**Q** — How would my entitlement be used up, in case I decide to take flight training under the Korean GI Bill?

**A** — Your entitlement would be used up at the rate of one day for each \$1.25 paid to you as your GI training allowance.

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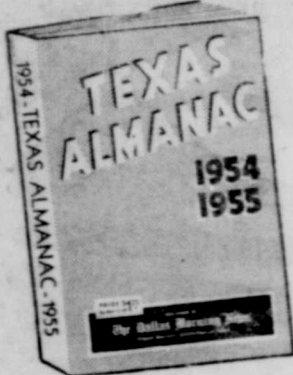

**Famous Producer  
Rodeo Broncs  
Today Tougher**

Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 30 — The bucking horses of yesterday are tougher than the horses of the rodeos today?

Vernie Elliott (who has produced all the rodeos at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show but two since 1923) casts his vote for present-day horses.

Of course, it is only one man's opinion — but this man has had more opportunity than anyone else to know. For he was champion rider away back in 1908, then became a producer and has presented the greatest rodeos in the nation — Cheyenne, Kansas City, Denver, Fort Worth and others. He and Beutler are associated in the presentation of the '55 rodeo here.

"It is true that you had more horses to pick from in the old days before the automobile, the truck and the tractor came into the picture," Elliott concedes.

"But the horses today work in rodeos and with greater experience, they are smarter. They learn more tricks."

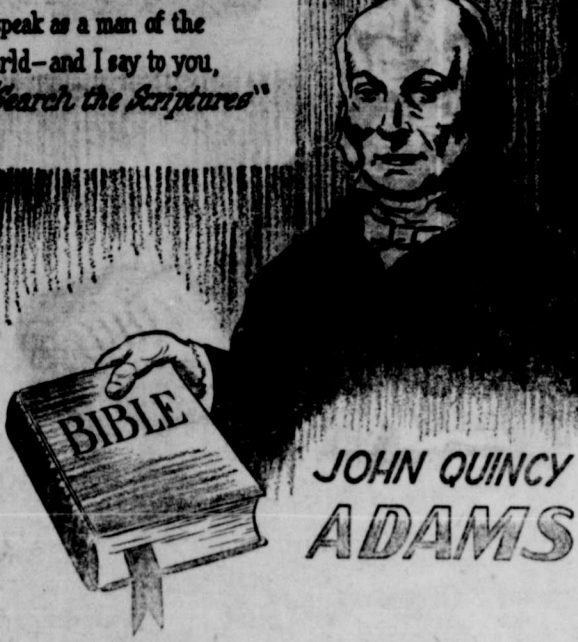
The contestants of today also are superior to the old-time contestants, Elliott believes, because earlier days, the riders and horses were actually cowboys who came in from the ranch to take part in a few rodeos each year, but the contestants today are really athletes who are busy practicing almost the year around.

## Protection Against Major Illness

The newest development in health insurance — and one whose potential for good is enormous — is found in policies covering catastrophic, or major, illnesses which involve long periods of treatment and heavy costs.

C. Arthur Williams Jr., of the University of Minnesota's School of Business Administration, tells the story in the November issue of Medical Economics. In a single year, the number of Americans with policies of this nature has doubled, reaching a total of some 1,500,000. As Mr. Williams says, "That's a pretty impressive total — when you consider that such coverage was just a dream before 1946, and still only a budding infant in 1951."

As of a late count, 31 insurance companies were offering the protection and six more were contemplating it. The policies are written on a deductible basis, like automobile collision coverage. Maximum benefits are high — \$5,000 to \$7,500 in most cases. The rates are moderate. coverage is still in an experimental phase. But most of the insurance executives queried by Mr. Williams are optimistic as to the future. More and more people will obtain the policies, they think — and the policies' provisions will be liberalized whenever possible.

Here's more proof that we can solve our medical problems — and solve them through voluntary action, in the fashion of a free people.
