School Expansion Being Studied By School Officials

A discussion of needs for additional school rooms was taken up at a call meeting of the board of trustees on Monday, January 17.

According to present estimates, Superintendent M. G. Moreland said that an additional \$120,000.00 would be the maximum bonds that the Silvertown Independent School District could issue. This would require the present tax rate to be increased to 1.50. The local school district is now operating on 1.20 with a maximum of 1.25 that has been previously voted.

This tax rate would be sufficient for the total indebtedness and would be within the amount that the state would approve. The needs have been under consideration of the board for some time and it has been found that four additional school rooms will be needed in the near future. There has been an evident need for a gym for a long time. It is almost certain that Silvertown will go into Class A classification by the 56-57 school term.

The next step is to contact a bonding company and determine the amount of the bonds that will be issued and the length of retirement, before presenting them to the public for their approval or disapproval by vote. Early this week school officials were in contact with a bonding company but has not set a date for a meeting with them.

Car Inspection Deadline Is April 15

H. C. Estes, Inspector, of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that the waiting line was shaping up now to precede the inspection deadline next April 15.

State wide auto inspections at Mid-December were running more than 200,000 behind the figure for the first two months of the 1953-54 inspection period.

Estes pointed out that members of the Department of Public Safety handled some 12,000 violations of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law during the period from April 15th to September 1, 1954.

Registration in Briscoe County for 1954 was 1861. 186 have been inspected in the first three months of this period. Now is the time to go. Go soon and avoid the rush. Auto inspection stations are Womack Auto, Simpson Chevrolet, Crass Motor, and Silvertown Motor Company.

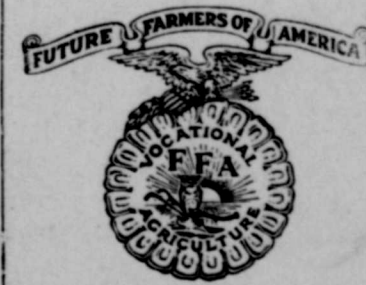

Briscoe County Junior Fat Stock Show Dates Set. At a board of directors meeting of the Briscoe County Jr. Livestock Show January 13th, the 1955 Show was set for February 25th, with the 26th, being an alternate date if the weather was bad the first day.

The Association elected officers and four new directors were elected to take the place of four retiring directors. True Burson was elected President, Robert Hill, Vice-President and Joe Mercer Sec. Treas. These officers will serve until show time next year. Directors elected to fill the expired terms of Kemp Thompson, O. R. Stark Jr., Homer Stephens, and Leroy Hamilton were Glynn Morrisson, W. E. Schott, Homer Stephens and John Lee Francis.

Nine Fatalities Reported In December

Texas Highway Patrol District No. 5 reports that 9 persons were killed in the Amarillo District during December, 62 were injured and an estimated property damage of \$73,396.00 occurred.

Seventy-eight accidents occurred on State and Federal Highways, fifteen on farm to market roads, thirteen on county roads, and 8 in towns with populations under twenty-five hundred.

A year ago the deaths were the same, but the number injured was about half, and property damage was \$59,846.00.

terracing, contour furrowing, diversion channels, drainage ditches, watercourses, outlet ponds, removing brush, and planting windbreaks. Assess- ments, paid to a soil or water conservation district are also de- ductible if the district performed work of the nature just listed.

The deduction is limited to 25 percent of the farmer's gross income from farming in any particular year. If the entire deduction is not entirely allow- able in one year, the excess may be carried over to the following year, and so on indefinitely un- til the farmer has been able to deduct the entire amount.

The deduction is allowable only for expenditures in 1954 or later years, and the farmer must elect in the first year in which he has such expenditures whether he will capitalize them as in the past or deduct them under the provisions of the new law. Once this election has been made, it cannot be changed without per- mission from the Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

Under the former law, if pay- ments were made to a farmer because of the destruction or sale of livestock due to disease, such payment was taxable in- come to the extent it exceeded the cost of the livestock. Under

Profit Is Not Guaranteed

The so-called "subsidies" which are given to certain American merchant shipping lines are en- tirely different from other govern- ment subsidies. But that fact is not generally known to the public.

This is the important point made in an article in Marine Engineering. It observes that the agreement between the govern- ment and the ship operator re- ceiving government funds boils down to: "If you will operate a ship under the American flag regularly in good times and bad, on a route the Government desig- nates as essential, the Govern- ment will pay part of the dif- ference between your high A- merican costs and the lower for- eign costs. 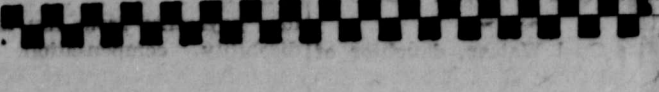

Another change which may be of considerable advantage to the farmer is the one setting up two new methods by which deprecia- tion may be computed. It is now possible to deduct greater amounts for depreciation in the first years. This change will be explained in greater detail in a subsequent article in this series.

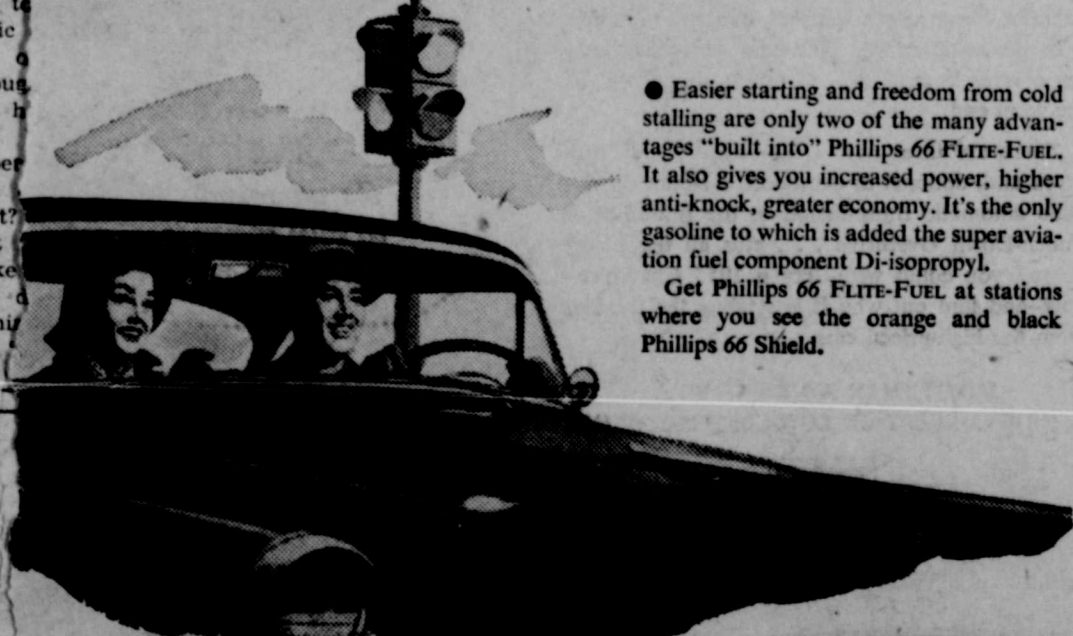

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — Previously VA had been deducting my GI insurance premium payments from my monthly disability compensation. My compensation has just been reduced, to the point where it no longer is large enough to cover my premiums. What happens now?

A — Since your compensation payments no longer are large enough to cover your GI insurance premiums, the automatic deduction plan will stop. You will have to start paying premiums yourself.

Q — I am drawing a VA pension. My wife has just gone to work part-time to supplement our income. Am I supposed to count her salary in figuring whether my annual income falls below the legal "ceiling"?

A — No. In computing your annual income, you need not include the separate income of your wife.

Q — I applied for disability compensation at VA a year and a half ago, and was turned down. I had planned to appeal, but kept putting it off. Is it too late now?

A — Yes. Any decision of a VA rating board unappealed within one year is final. But you may submit a new claim for compensation and include any additional information that you might have.

Q — I am taking a trade school course under the Korean GI Bill. It will last for two years. I know that I get 30 days of authorized absences a year. If I'm not absent my first year, can I carry those 30 days over to the second year?

A — No. Carry-overs of unused absences from one year to the next are not allowed.
