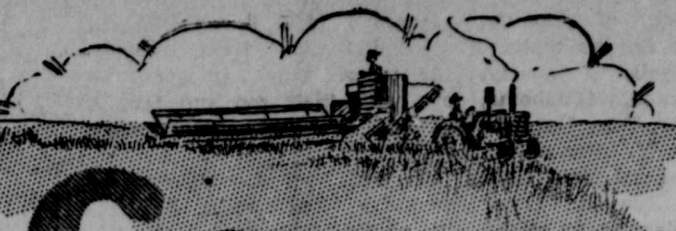

Mother Vaughn Observed 103rd. Birthday Sunday

If publicity, the admiration and praise of many people, and a 103rd birthday celebration, mean anything, Mrs. Ella J. Vaughan should be "sitting pretty" these days.

Radio stations far and near have recently carried the story of her birthday celebration which was held Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. A. Stephens. Area newspapers have carried her picture and story, and greetings have come from the pens of former president, Harry Truman, and president Eisenhower. On page A447 of the Congressional Record published January 26, 1955, Hon. Walter Rogers of Texas in the House of Representatives, wrote the following:

Mr. Rogers of Texas. Mr. Speaker, it is with distinct pride that I have the honor and pleasure of saying a much deserved tribute to one of the great ladies of our Nation. She is not one who has been publicized in the metropolitan newspaper nor one who has appeared on nationwide radio and television broadcasts. She is not one who has sought the limelight of publicity nor undertaken to find praise for the great contributions that she has made to mankind. The lady of whom I speak is truly "Mrs. America." She is Mrs. Ella J. Vaughan, of Silvertton, Briscoe County, Texas, who will on Sunday, January 30, celebrate her 103rd birthday. She first saw the light of day in Wood County, Texas, on January 30, 1852, when Millard Fillmore was the 13th President of this great country. In fact, her birthplace is only a few short miles from the birthplace of the present occupant of our White House, the Honorable Dwight D. Eisenhower. Mrs. Vaughan has lived under the administration of 22 of our 32 Presidents and has witnessed the greatest era in the advancement of civilization and in the development and progress of mankind. Her first recollection of any President was the Honorable James Buchanan. She remembers vividly the assassination of Abraham Lincoln. She is affectionately known as Grandma Vaughan to everyone who enjoys the honor of her acquaintance. Her full enjoyment of life is exemplified by the perpetual smile that greets her children and her countless friends. Certainly, we in the Panhandle of Texas are honored that her long and useful life has been spent in this area. Her fine character and unselfish devotion to her children and her country exemplify the same Christian life for which we all so diligently strive. Grandma Vaughan has been, and will always be, a fine example for all in our section of the country. America is indeed proud to extend to you sincere congratulations on the celebration of your 103d birthday and to extend to you best wishes for many more.

Grandmother Vaughan is well and spry, and was able to come into Silvertton Saturday to have her hair fixed, and to enjoy the refreshment of an ice cream cone.

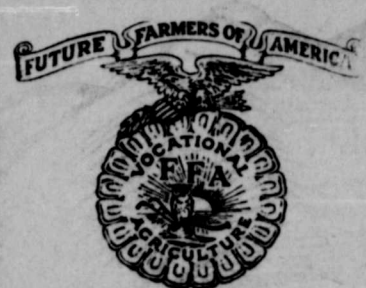

Farm and Home planning and development is now available to Briscoe County Farmers. County Extension Agent Robert M. Ledbetter attended a three day school of instruction at Plainview January 25th, 26th, and 27th. At this meeting, the Farm and Home development program was outlined for farmers that wished to have this Service.

Here are the things a farmer and his family can expect from Farm and Home Development that has had considerable play in the newspapers and farm magazines. The farmer and his family will set down a list of objectives that the family wants to do. For example the farmer might want a new plow and the wife a new washing machine. Through planning they both could achieve their desires. Through this program, all the information from the Experiment Stations will be available for the farmer if he wants it. A system of management will be put forward to obtain the maximum production with conservation on the farm. This is no new work for the Extension Service on farm management but will be the beginning of work with the whole family. A set of farm records will be kept. This program in no way will be binding or obligatory to the farmers that want this service. There will be no written agreement or anything to sign. It will be on a voluntary basis with farm families. In a nutshell it is just another way to help the farm family earn a better living and enjoy that living on the farm through planning and management. Farm families that are interested in the Farm and Home Development program should see County Agent Ledbetter for the details.

They will serve as distributors for sprinkler and irrigation systems, bulk and tractor application of butane, fertilizers, feeds and seeds, in addition to a full stock of all major lines of farm supplies. Mr. F. W. Wyatt, formerly associated with the Soil Conservation Service, will serve as assistant manager and have charge of the store.

Clay Fowler, local postmaster, reports that the United States Postoffice Department has accepted a contract for a ten year lease on a new location for the Silvertton Post Office. The accepted contract was from blue prints for a building to be constructed in the near future, with overall dimensions of 25 x 60 ft. The building is to be located approximately 70 feet west of the present post office location. It will be constructed of brick and tile, with proper lighting and cooling unit, and asphalt tile floors, and other facilities to properly carry on the work of the local post office. The person or persons who are to construct the building have not been made known to the News office, the construction date and contracting firm also are unknown. 120 days will be allowed to complete construction. The local post office became a second class post office in July, 1953. In the past few months working space has become insufficient to handle properly the mail volume at the present location. There have not been enough boxes to care for the Silvertton area for sometime. Mr. Fowler reports that the postal receipts of the Silvertton post office were \$8,950.00 in 1953, and \$9,211.70 in 1954.

Notice! To The Public

It has been brought to our attention that a lot of people are not familiar with some of the laws governing taxation. Some people are under the impression that they are to list only the items suggested by the assessor. The assessor merely makes these suggestions as an aid in making your rendition. It is the duty of the taxpayer to list all of his or her real and personal property. Personal property consists of goods and merchandise of every description, Shop equipment, cafe equipment, office equipment, automobiles, trucks, jeeps, or any other motor vehicle, trailers, irrigation pumps, tractors, and all other farming equipment, Horses, cattle, sheep, and hogs. Persons owning only an automobile are required to list same for taxation.

The law requires the taxpayer to render his property for taxation by listing the same, making oath thereto, and delivering the same to the assessor, whose duty it is to enter the said property on the tax rolls. If a property owner fails to render property to the assessor, the assessor has the authority to assess the property at what he considers to be the true and full value and place the same on the unrendered roll.

Back assessments of property which has not been assessed or rendered for taxation may be made for any previous year. Therefore, we feel that it is to the advantage of the taxpayer to know his or her duty in regard to rendering property for taxation.

We suggest that if we fail to contact you for your rendition, you should make it a point to protect your property in order to protect you against back assessments and carry your part of the tax load.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank each of you for your cooperation in the past.

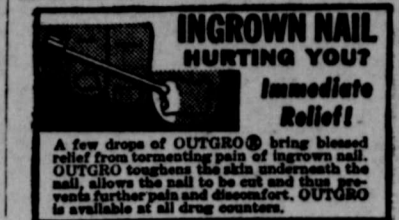

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17 Years Ago

in BRISCOE COUNTY NEWS

Issue of February 3, 1938

Fire completely destroyed the farm home occupied by the W. C. Yokum family on the R. E. Brookshier farm south of Silverton Wednesday morning about seven o'clock. The fire started when Mrs. Yokum was in the yard and is thought to have been caused by an oil stove. Furniture and house were a total loss. How To File Your 1954 Return

There have been many changes made in the 1954 law that are a distinct benefit to the individual taxpayers. You will not be in a position to obtain many of the benefits you may be entitled to unless you make a careful study of the booklet which was mailed to you with your blank income tax form. You will find it both interesting and profitable to study these instructions. Most taxpayers will be able to answer all of their tax questions from the information contained in this booklet and the articles we will publish.

WHO MUST FILE

Every citizen or resident of the United States, whether an adult or minor, who had \$600.00 (\$12-00.00 if 65 years of age or over) or more of gross income in 1954 must file an income tax return on Form 1040 or 1040A.

Most of your tax is withheld from your wages every payday or paid on Declaration of Estimated tax every quarter. However, the law requires you to file an annual return to determine whether you owe more or you should get a refund.

WHEN TO FILE

Your income tax return should be filed between January 1 and April 15, 1955, and not later than April 15, 1955. Try to avoid the last-minute rush. Those few individuals who keep books on a fiscal-year basis, must file by the fifteenth day of the fourth month after the close of their taxable years.

HOW TO PAY

Any balance of tax shown to be due in Item 13, Page 1, of your return on Form 1040 must be paid in full with your return. You may pay cash or by check or money order. Checks or money orders should be made payable to "District Director, Internal Revenue Service."

HOW TO SIGN

You have not filed a legal return unless you sign it. If you and your wife are filing a joint return, both of you must sign the return. You do not need to have your return notarized since your signature has the same legal effect as swearing to the truthfulness of your return.

WHERE TO GET FORMS AND HELP

As far as practical, the District Director mails forms directly to taxpayers. If you need additional forms, you can get them free, and also at most banks and from your District Director's office. Many employers also keep forms for the convenience of employees. The address of your District Director of Internal Revenue is 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas.

After reading the instructions, you should be able to prepare your own return, unless you have complicated problems. If you do need help, you can get it at your District Director's office.

A more detailed publication entitled, "Your Federal Income Tax" may be obtained for 25 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C.

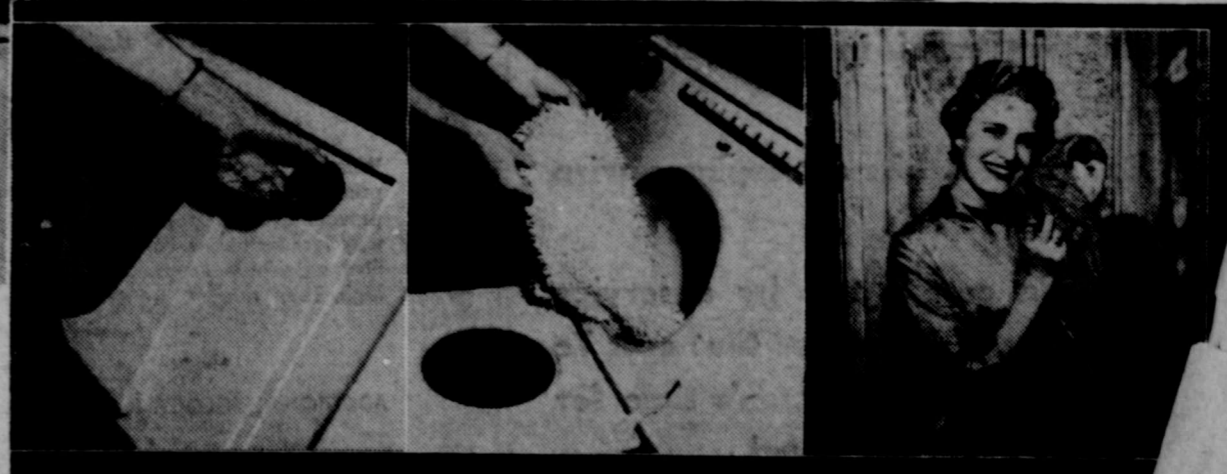

And Answers

Q — If I enter the armed forces some time before the end of January, 1955, will I be entitled to a GI loan when I get out — even though Korean veterans' benefit entitlements come to an end January 31, 1955.

A — Yes, provided you receive a separation under other than dishonorable conditions and spend at least 90 days on active duty, unless you are discharged sooner for a line-of-duty disability.

Q — Does the President's proclamation, ending Korean GI benefit entitlements on January 31, have any bearing on when a Korean veteran has to start training under the Korean GI Bill?

A — Under the law, a veteran still must begin Korean GI Bill training within three years following his separation from the armed forces. The President's proclamation did not change that provision.

Q — Has the President's proclamation set a deadline on GI loans for post-Korean veterans?

A — Yes. As a result of the proclamation, January 31, 1955, has been set as the end of the GI loan program for eligible post-Korean veterans.

Q — I have been receiving monthly income benefits, paid on account of the total disability income provision of my World War II GI insurance policy. Do these payments reduce the face value of my policy?

A — No. The disability payments you are receiving do not reduce the face value of your policy because you have been paying an extra premium for disability protection.

What makes this sword so mighty? How is this particular sword helping to win the war against polio — and how does it exemplify true democracy in action?
