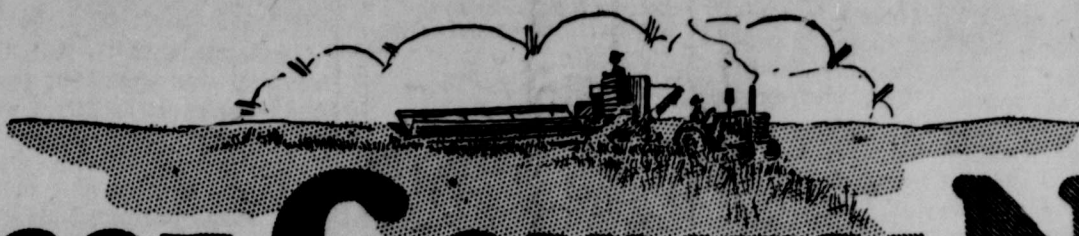

Clyde Wright Prominent Briscoe County Citizen Passed Away February 24

Clyde Davis Wright, an eminent Texas citizen, passed away Thursday evening at six o'clock in his home in Silvertown. He had been in failing health for several months.

He was known over the entire Synod of Texas of the Presbyterian Church as a layman devoted to the church. He had been a member of the Presbyterian Church since he was twelve years of age, was an elder for many years, and recently was moderator of the Presbytery of Amarillo. At the time of his death he was a member of the General Council of the Presbytery of Amarillo.

He was president of the Cap Rock Regional Bar Association.

Wright was county attorney for Briscoe County, city attorney for Silvertown and Quitaque, and represented the Burlington Railroad for this branch. He was counsel for the Selective Service Board of Briscoe County.

He belonged to the Masonic Lodge and was past worshipful master and chaplain at the present time. He was past worthy patron of the Order of Eastern Star.

Just before the funeral services the Wright family was presented with the emblem of the Masonic Lodge, in recognition of his fifty years as a member of the Lodge. There would have been a special evening program devoted to this presentation, and Judge Wright had been so anxious to be able to attend this service.

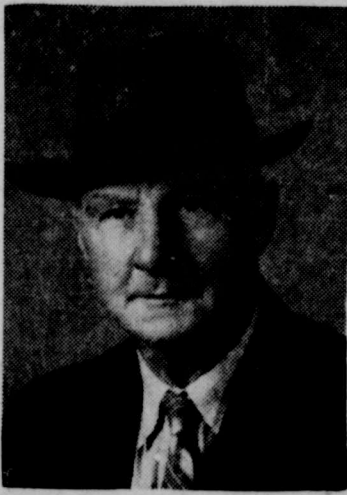
He served on the local Boy Scout Council and was an assistant Boy Scout master. He was county chairman of the Red Cross, serving that organization in that capacity for several years during the last war.

An honor he appreciated was the appointment to the position of Special Assistant Attorney General of Texas' Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

Mr. Wright was county attorney and county judge in both Deaf Smith and Briscoe counties. He was a member of the first graduating class of Clarendon College where he was captain of the football team and played in the first intercollegiate football game in the Panhandle.

Mr. Wright studied law with the firm of Smith and Ware and in the University of Texas. As judge of the juvenile court, he always gave boys tried before him the suspended sentence and kept watch over them while they were on probation. Everyone of his many boys made good honest citizens.

He patched up more troubles

between members of families and communities than he put through the courts.

In December, 1915, he moved his family from Hereford, Texas, to Seattle, Washington, to accept a position in the law department of the West Coast Traffic and Shipping Bureau.

In October 1921 he returned to Texas on personal business, and was requested to stay, to run for County Judge and was elected. He poured his energies into improving the conditions of schools, roads, and all departments of the county; and fought hard for weeks in Austin to secure the approval of the Governor for Independent School Districts and other progressive moves.

Mr. Wright was born January 19, 1879. He married Miss Leila Gregg of Hereford in 1910. He is survived by his wife, two children, Mrs. Harold Ownby, of Phoenix, Arizona and Jack Wright of Raleigh, N. C. An older sister living in Dallas and four grandchildren also survive him.

Funeral services were held Sunday, February 27 at 2 P. M. in the Silvertown Baptist Church. Rev. N. D. Neddleton, assisted by Rev. C. R. Hankins, Rev. G. A. Elrod, and Earl Cantwell, conducted the funeral services. Burial was in the Hereford Cemetery later in the day.

A large group of friends and relatives attended the services.

Shirley Elms Ranks As Belly Crocker Homemaker Of Tomorrow Revealed Today

Miss Shirley Elms, a senior in the local high school, and already the recipient of many honors, has been announced as winner of the Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow in Silvertown High School.

She received this rank by rating the highest score in a written examination which tested the homemaking knowledge and attitudes of the senior girls in the graduating class. Shirley will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of all-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She will also be awarded a golden award pin, cook book for herself and the school at assembly this morning in the High School Auditorium.

The national winner in this search conducted among 187,000 young women in 8,000 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be named April 21 at an American table fete in Philadelphia.

General Mills is the sponsor of this program designed to assist schools in building in young women a deeper appreciation and understanding of the American home and the personal qualities necessary to successful homemaking.

A scholarship of \$1,500 will be awarded each state winner, and she will receive a trip with her school advisor to Washington D. C.

South Plains Jr. Fat Stock Show to Feature Princess

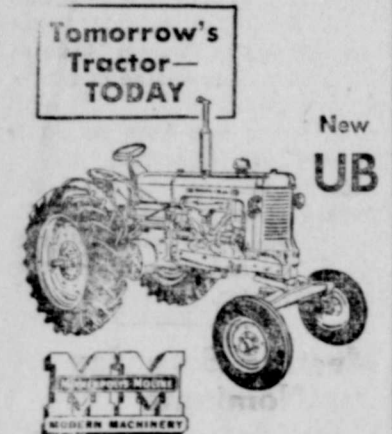

Walter Rogers To The People Of The 18th District

This letter is being written during the heated debate on the tax bill that provides for a one year extension of the existing corporate normal rate and certain excise tax rates and PROVIDES A \$20.00 DEDUCTION FOR EACH INDIVIDUAL AND DEPENDENT ON INCOME TAXES AFTER JANUARY 1, 1956. This simply means that if you are single and owe a tax bill of \$100.00 for the year 1956, you will be allowed to deduct \$20.00 from that, leaving a balance owed by you of \$80.00. If you are married and have two children, you will be allowed to deduct \$80.00 from your tax bill. If your tax bill is less than \$20.00 times the personal exemptions that you will claim (yourself, your wife and your children), then you will owe no taxes at all. This method of relief was chosen because it would bring tax relief to those in the low income groups who so badly need every cent they can get their hands on to provide the necessities of life for themselves and their family. The same identical relief would be granted to those in the higher income brackets, but they would not receive more relief than the little man, as many of them did last year.

The tax relief bill that received so much publicity last year was designed to bring primary and effective benefits to a very few people. For instance, the tax concessions that brought relief to those owning stocks in corporations would affect only 43 per cent of the people of this country for the simple reason that all the corporate stocks of this country are owned by that small percentage of the population. You will recall that many of us tried to force an amendment to the 1954 tax bill that would bring relief to the low income groups. We were defeated in this attempt by a very few votes. We were again this year up against the same group who want to bring tax relief to the few and let the many continue to bear their burdens. No one begrudges tax relief to anyone, whether he is rich or poor, but it seems to me that there should be at least some degree of fairness in the tax relief approach. I can never subscribe to the policy that tax relief for a privileged few is statesmanship, but

that tax relief for the little man with a low income is fiscal irresponsibility.

CONGRESSIONAL PRAYER ROOM

Shortly after I came to Congress, a move was started to provide a prayer room for Members of Congress. This movement has borne fruit and there is presently available the solitude, the quiet, and the peace of a room where a Member of Congress can go and commune with his maker. No doubt, this room will be a great source of strength and courage for the men who are called upon daily to make the decisions that determine the fate of this great nation. If the decisions that are made are the result of a communion with God, we need never fear for the fate of this nation or our people.

How To Prevent Deafness

AUSTIN, March 3 — Most of us take our hearing for granted. It probably has never occurred to us what a change it would make in our lives if we were suddenly deprived of it. We seldom think of the numerous sounds we hear during the day, sounds which keep us in close touch with the world about us. For those who can't hear, or who have difficulty hearing, it's almost like living in a different world, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

There are many children, more than a million it's estimated, who live in this other world. They have either been born deaf or have lost much, or maybe all, of their hearing since birth. Being somewhat cut off from the world, the deaf child is frustrated because he can't communicate his feelings and needs to others. A sense of inferiority and hostility is frequently the result.

Most hearing loss in children is the result of repeated colds and infections in the ears, nose, and throat. Such infections can cause what we know as conduction deafness. If such infections are not treated early, a child's hearing may receive permanent damage. Hearing loss may follow measles, scarlet fever, influenza, or meningitis. These may result in what is referred to as nerve deafness.

Enlarged adenoids, the result of infections, account for many cases of partial loss of hearing. The overgrown adenoids block up the little tubes that lead from the throat to the ears. These tubes must be open and clear

for good hearing. For these children, curing infection isn't enough. Their adenoids may have to be removed. Otherwise, they may suffer permanent hearing loss.

Not all children with a hearing loss can regain it. A serious infection such as meningitis, can completely destroy the patient's hearing ability. As soon as deafness is suspected the child should be taken to an ear specialist for a complete examination.

Andy Rogers Introduced Milk Bill In Senate

Austin, Feb. 25 — A bill introduced this week by Senator Andy Rogers of Childress would require that milk shipped into Texas by out-of-state producers be "fresh, sanitary, and able to meet Texas health standards."

The 30th District lawmaker introduced a second bill, S. B. 232, that would permit cities to set requirements for butter fat in milk up to 4 per cent. Present law provides for a minimum 3.75 percent butter fat.

The main purpose of Senate Bill 233, Rogers said, is to protect the health and welfare of Texas consumers by requiring that each container of milk — railroad tank car or pint bottle — be labelled plainly with the date of the milk's production. A secondary result of passage would be to "give the Texas producer an even break with those who ship their milk surpluses into the state in competition with home producers," he said.

"This bill would enable the State Health Officers to register and license into-state shippers and let our own consumers know how much time has elapsed since the milk left the dairy," Sen. Rogers said. "Too many times, Texas consumers have been victimized by old milk shipped in during the winter shortage period to which has been added all kinds of chemicals designed to slow the natural aging process."

"It is not my purpose to erect any sort of state trade barrier," he said, "but only to insure that all milk products consumed by Texans are up to Texas standards."

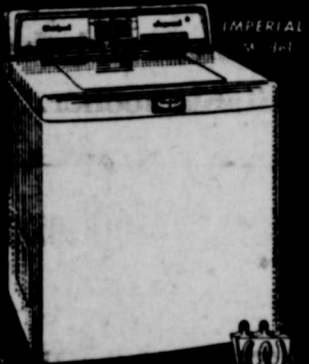

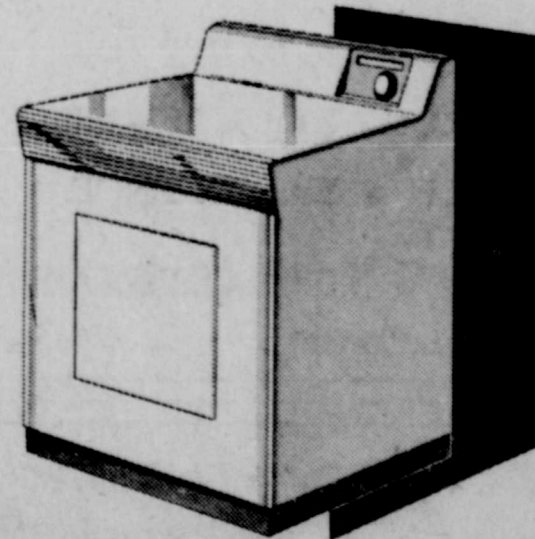

Texas Public School Week Set For March 7-12

Texas Public School Week has been set, by proclamation by governor Allen Shivers, as March 7 through 12. This is the fifth year of the occasion. The Governor of Texas, in January, 1951, officially designated the first week in March, 1951, as Public School Week in Texas, and asked that citizens throughout the state visit their public school, learn more about their organizations and operation, and get better acquainted with their school administrators and teachers.

The objective has been to acquaint all our people with programs and accomplishments of our public educational system, and a slogan of "Texas Public Schools — Democracy in Action."

It has been pointed out that: Our forefathers in their wisdom, recognizing the importance of education in the function and operation of a democracy, established the public school to make education available to all. The people of Texas declared, by the expressed terms of the State Constitution, "a general diffusion of knowledge be essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools." The 1854 School Law provided for the first Public School System in Texas. As the years passed our laws were strengthened to make sure that all children of a school age shared in this opportunity for public education. Today the importance of education is not a debatable subject. Our job is to see that children of this generation get the best possible education we can give them. By visiting the schools and familiarizing ourselves with the problems of teachers, we become more competent to safeguard and advance the institution that is so American — the public school.

The Silverton Schools are extending an invitation to the public to visit them during the week and become better acquainted with the personnel and the school system. The week will end on March 12 the same date the qualified voters will be voting on a bond issue which would enable the school to proceed with the building of needed additions to their physical plant.

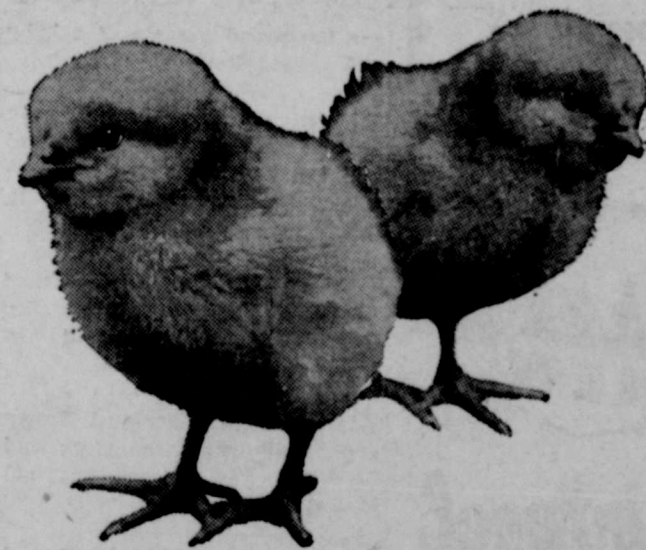

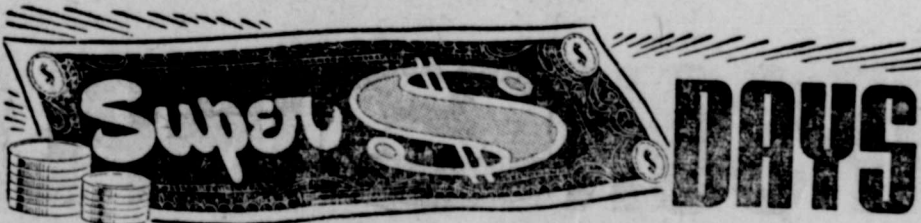

All dogs within the City Limits of Silverton must have a license by March 15, 1955. Starting March 16, 1955 all dogs without license will be picked up and put in the City Pond and kept for three days. If they are not claimed within those three days, they then will be disposed of. Mayor, City of Silverton, Texas

NOTICE TO ALL LIVESTOCK OR FOWL OWNERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF SILVERTON, TEXAS

There has been several complaints within the past few weeks about, cows, horses, hogs and fowls, within the City Limits. The City Council had a call meeting Tuesday morning and discussed the Ordinance pertaining to livestock and fowls within the City Limits. After some discussion the Council came to an agreement to the Ordinance as described below.

BE IT ORDNED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SILVERTON, TEXAS SECTION 1. That Ordinance No. 14, pertaining to livestock, be amended as follows to-wit:

Pertaining to Cows: 1. A person may keep one (1) milk cow within the City Limits, provided he sprays the pen at least twice a month with a disinfectant and fly killer during the summer months.

2. A 4-H boy may keep a Club calf within the City Limits, provided he spray the pen at least twice a month with a disinfect-

ant and fly killer during the summer months.

3. Under no circumstances will anyone be permitted to have cows or calves, other than stated above, within the City Limits in a pen feeding them for any length of time.

Pertaining to Sheep:

1. A 4-H boy may keep a club lamb within City Limits.

2. Under no circumstances will anyone, other than stated above, be permitted to keep sheep within the City Limits.

Pertaining to Horses:

1. A person may keep one (1) saddle horse within the City Limits, provided he sprays the pen at least twice a month with a disinfectant and fly killer during the summer months.

2. Under no circumstances will anyone, other than stated above, be permitted to keep horses within the City Limits.

Pertaining to Hogs:

1. Under no circumstances will anyone be permitted to keep hogs or pigs within the City Limits.

Pertaining to Fowls:

1. A person may keep chickens or any other type of fowl within the City Limits, provided they are kept in a pen at all times.

This Ordinance passed on the 1st day of March, 1955.
