## Wheat Referendum To Be Voted On June 25th

### Briscoe County Quota 54,506 Acres

The referendum to determine whether or not the marketing quota program will be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop will be held June 25.

Roy Mayfield, Chairman of the Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, advises that arrangements for holding the referendum are now being made. Polling places will be established in convenient locations in the county, and wheat growers will be notified where they may vote. Farm allotments were based on a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres, the same as this year, and a county allotment of 54,506.

Chairman Mayfield explains that if the vote is favorable, the program will be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop, and price support for the crop in the commercial wheat area — depending on the supply situation — will probably be between 75 and 82 percent of parity. The support level will be announced by the Secretary of Agriculture before the referendum. A farmer who exceeds his farm wheat allotment or 15 acres, whichever is larger, will be subject to a marketing penalty equal to 45 percent of parity on the excess production.

If the vote is unfavorable, the support will be 50 percent of parity. In either case, only the wheat from farms where the wheat acreage allotments is not exceeded will be eligible for price support.

Chairman Mayfield points out that at least two-thirds of those farmers voting must favor the quotas if the program is to be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop. If more than one-third vote "no," the wheat marketing

quota program will not be in operation for the 1956 crop.

In a similar referendum held a year ago, the national vote was close, 208,823 for and 76,023 against — a favorable vote of 73.3 percent compared with the necessary 66-2 thirds percent. In Texas, the vote was 10,856 for and 1,299 against; and in Briscoe County, 117 for and 25 against.

Mr. Mayfield made it clear that wheat acreage allotments are not a point at issue; the wheat allotments will continue in effect no matter how the vote goes in the referendum. The law requires that wheat allotments may be dispensed with only in time of emergency.

Farm allotments for the 1956 wheat crop, based on a state acreage allotment of 4,227,136 acres, have already been mailed to farmers. In general, each farm on which a wheat crop was grown in any of the years 1953, 1954, or 1955 was assigned an acreage allotment. For a farm on which wheat will be seeded in 1956 for the first time since July 1, 1952, the farmer must make a special application for a "new farm" allotment.

Marketing quotas are directed by law to be proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture in years when the total supply of wheat exceeds to normal supply by more than 20 percent. The supply for 1956-57 is estimated at 1.86 billion bushels — 66 percent more than the normal supply, and enough to meet current needs for domestic use and exports for the next 2 years.

## Bids on School Building Considered Too High

### 4 Companies Submit Bids

Sealed proposals were received and opened last Thursday afternoon at 2:00 p. m. in the office of the superintendent of Silvertown public schools for the construction of an elementary school building gym and shop, authorized some time ago by the Silvertown Independent School District. Four companies submitted proposals, ranging from \$208,600.00 to \$233,300.00, with from 180 to 300 days to complete.

At this time no bids have been accepted by the board, since they feel these bids are too high. They had anticipated that the gymnasium and shop and elementary building would cost anywhere from \$150,000 to \$165,000. Some ten days or more will be required before a decision on these bids will have been made.

## John B. Lanham Passed Away After Long Illness

### Funeral Services Held Friday

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Friday afternoon at the First Baptist Church for John Benton Lanham, a resident of Briscoe County for 64 years. Mr. Lanham died at his home at 11:00 p. m. June 8, after a long illness.

John Benton Lanham was born on June 13, 1869, in Hunt County, Texas, son of John C. Lanham and Josephine Jones Lanham.

Mr. Lanham came to Briscoe County in 1891, and began working on the F. Ranch, which was located south of the present town of Quitaque. In 1891 he filed on a section of land for a homestead, which is now the home of the E. A. Birdwells. In the spring of 1894 he went with a trail herd owned by the XIT (or syndicate cattle co.) through Montana, on to the border of Canada.

Rev. G. A. Elrod officiated at the funeral service, assisted by Rev. N. D. Nettleton, and Rev. C. R. Hankins. Pall Bearers were: Jeff Roberts, Oas Chitty, Dean Allard, George Sealey, Roy Mayfield, and Charlie Mallow. Interment was in the Silvertown Cemetery.

With his death, went the last member of the party present at the official recognition of Briscoe as a county.

He has been a member of the Primitive Baptist Church since 1902.

He is survived by his wife, the former Minnie Elizabeth McMinn, whom he married on October 16, 1895, and six children, Richard Lanham of Quitaque; Lenton and John Lanham of Silvertown; Mrs. Ethel Lea and Willie Mae Schnable of Roswell, New Mexico; and Josephine Mallow of Silvertown; three sisters, Julia Spoon of Cisco; Bettie McMinn of Abilene and Jodie Phelps of Fort Worth. Thirteen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren also survive.

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## "WITH ALL MY WORLDLY GOODS"

June is traditionally the month for weddings, and many couples will be taking marriage vows within the next few weeks. But, while a certain symbolic transfer of "worldly goods" is often associated with the wedding ceremony, under Texas law, the act of marrying another does not give you the authorization to take control of his property.

Generally speaking, each spouse has the right to control and dispose of his or her own separate

property. The separate property of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired by either after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Aside from the ordinary community estate, there is a class of property known as the wife's "special community," which includes all the income from her separate real property, and probably the interest on bonds or

notes, and dividends on stocks owned in her separate right. While the husband may have similar assets, the law accords them no particular distinction from ordinary community property.

Although the history of the matter is somewhat confusing, it appears that under present day law the husband has control of ordinary community property; but control of the wife's special community property is reserved to her.

Certain restrictions are imposed upon both husband and wife in exercising such control. For instance, the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defraud the wife, nor can he sell the home-stead without her signature and acknowledgement. And the wife's sale or mortgage of her separate real estate, stock or bonds is not valid unless her husband joins with her in the transaction — he must sign and execute the necessary legal papers along with her.

There are laws exempting the wife's separate and special community property from liability for debts incurred by the husband. Such liability is restricted to his separate property and the ordinary community property.

On the other hand, debts incurred by the wife in obtaining necessities for herself or the children bind all property belonging to either party, including the husband's separate property. For other debts which she has power to incur, only her separate and special community property are liable.

All of these distinctions emphasize the advisability of keeping proper records. By doing so the various classes of community and separate property owned by a married couple will always be easily distinguishable. Each category will then receive the special protection afforded to it by our laws.

Applications for Savings and Loan Examiner will be accepted until October 31, 1955, but persons who wish to receive early consideration should apply not later than July 6, 1955. Persons interested in Transportation Specialist positions must file their applications not later than July 26, 1955.

### Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I have just been discharged from the armed forces with a disability. I have applied to V. A. for service-connected compensation. If and when I am placed on the rolls, I intend to get a permanent GI insurance policy available to disabled Korean veterans. But in the meantime, I would like to be covered with insurance. Is there anything I can do now?

A — Yes. You may obtain the special Korean GI term insurance available to all Korean veterans, if you act within 120 days following your discharge.

Then, after VA rules that your disability is service-connected, you may apply for the permanent insurance. Meanwhile, you will have been covered by the special term policy.

Q — I have been out of service for a year. I am planning to apply to VA for disability compensation. Since the armed forces have my medical records, will I be required to take a physical examination?

A — You will be required to take a VA physical examination. VA may waive the examination, under some circumstances, only for veterans who apply for compensation within six months after their separation from service.

Q — I am a "double duty" veteran with service in World War II and since Korea. I am in training under the World War II GI Bill. I would like to switch to the Korean GI Bill, but I notice that my three-year-discharge starting deadline for Korean GI training has passed. Is it too late to switch?

A — No. Even though your Korean GI Bill starting deadline has passed, you still may be permitted to switch to that training law. You may make the change either at the end of any regular enrollment period or at the time your World War II GI entitlement is exhausted.

Q — Is it possible for a veteran who lives in one State to get a GI loan to buy a home in another State?

A — Yes, it is possible. However, lenders generally confine their lending operations to certain specific areas. You should check your lender.

### Windmill From Near Lockney Placed In Texas Tech Museum

An old sentinel of the plains — a wooden Eclipse windmill — has been installed as a permanent exhibit in the South Plains Gallery of the Museum at Texas Tech.

Location of the Eclipse this past month near Lockney followed a somewhat desperate appeal over a Floydada radio station by Mrs. Roscoe Wilson, chairman of the Museum's collection committee.

Museum staff members had been seeking an old-style windmill to round out the South Plains Gallery for more than two years.

The windmill's importance in the development of this territory cannot be over-emphasized, according to Dr. W. C. Holden, Museum director. "With little surface water, man could not use the fertile grasslands until a means was found for getting the subterranean water to the surface. The windmill provided that means."

Of particular interest in the Museum's model are the types of woods that went into its construction, Dr. Holden said. The vane is made of cypress, while the framework is spruce. The cross arms are white oak, the sucker rod is native ash, and the 4x4 pieces are of long leaf pine. The wooden Eclipse mill patented in 1867, was widely used on the South Plains until about 1920 when it was superseded by the faster-running ball-bearing geared steel mills.


