The Teachers and County Agents will come into Silvertion the 4th of July and spend the night in the High School Gymnasium. Mr. M. G. Moreland, Superintendent of the Silvertion Schools, offered the use of these facilities.

These range schools offer County Agents and Ag. Teacher the opportunity to study actual range conditions so they may be of better service to the people they serve.

All ranchers and cattlemen of Briscoe County are urged to go with the School. They will leave the Courthouse at 9:00 A. M., July the 5th. Some good management practices will be observed and discussed.

### June Rainfall Total 5.39 in.

Thus far in June the total rainfall amounts to 5.39 inches. 3.29 inches fell Monday night in an all night thunderstorm. An electrical storm accompanied the heavy rainfall, little or no hail accompanied the downpour.

The total rainfall for the year has reached 12.06 inches. In 1954 the total for the year was 12.70.

Reports from southwest and south indicate that as much as six inches fell in the Monday night's storm. The Quitaque area received four and five inches. Red River was full from bank to bank Tuesday evening late. Several washed out bridges in the Clarendon-Memphis area make traveling impossible in some instances, at this writing. Several farm-to-market roads are reported impassable, due to four or five feet of water covering low places. The farm crops are having a hard time getting started, but it is hoped that despite the late start, the moisture will make the difference, and good crops will be harvested "come fall".

When these farmers get wiped out by hail or water, just as soon as possible, they are out again replanting. Surely their faith and diligence will be rewarded.

The Texas Highway Department has recently begun the construction of a new Highway Maintenance Warehouse located on the property of the Department at the Y in Silvertion. The building will be 40 x 120 ft. and will be used for storage and office space. Manley Woods, who is local maintenance formen, will maintain offices in the new building.

A construction crew is here constructing the concrete portion of the building. This crew will also do the curbing and gutter work on the broadening of highway 86 through Silvertion. A contract for constructing the maintenance building has been let and materials to be used in the building are arriving.

Ernest Lloyd Company of Fort Worth has a contract to re-top 9 miles of paving beginning three miles east of Silvertion on Highway 86 to run to the canyon on the Quitaque cap. This firm also has contracted to do the work on the widening of the highway through Silvertion.

Amarillo district has started survey for a most likely route to cross the canyons leading to Claude. A survey has started from San Jacinto north to the Briscoe County line, under the supervision of O. B. Johnson, resident engineer of Quitaque. It appears to be a certainty that the paving will be done through the canyons, joining Briscoe and Armstrong counties, making a shorter route to the north plains.
