Second Polio Injections Will Be Given Friday

Dr. N. L. Powers has received word from Plainview that a plane could be flown to Austin this week to pick up the second supply of Salk vaccine and return the vaccine to Plainview by Wednesday or Thursday. Since it is possible to notify the parents of the first and second grade children who received the first injection through the school, all parents of these children are urged to take note of this announcement.

The second injection will be given in the Briscoe County hospital Building as before from 10 a. m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 p. m. to 3:00 p. m. This is the only day it will be given.

This medicine is being furnished through the National Polio Foundation in cooperation with the State Health Department, and the amount of medicine available will be less than previously, all over the state. Dr. Powers has been instructed that those who are sick or on vacation and who miss the second injection will have to obtain injections from their family physician when their supplies come in.

Weeping Love Grass On Northcutt's Land Doing Well

The grass seed is not harvested the first year, but it looks like Mr. Northcutt may be able to graze this grass some this year. During an ordinary crop year it will harvest from 50 lb. to 100 lbs. per acre. Mr. Robinson has spent several years working with grass seeds. He plants and harvests the seeds on land he contracts to plant. There is a good market for these seeds, according to Mr. Robinson. This is a new money crop for Briscoe County, and one, more land owners might benefit from looking into.

Advice On Garden Insects, Discussed By Ledbetter

Briscoe County gardeners have had quite a boon to their garden prospects this year with the fine rains of May and June. Many have been disappointed that insects have done severe damage to some of the vegetables. All garden insects can be controlled very easily with the fine insecticides that we have now.

Squash bugs in particular have played havoc with lots of the squash. Sabadilla dust or Lindane spray will do a good job of controlling these bugs. Sabadilla should be applied every week all summer for continuous squash production. It is not toxic to humans.

Lindane is probably the best all around insecticide for garden pests. It will kill aphids or plant lice as well as all other garden insects. It should be washed off the vegetables before use. Lindane may be used safely on all cucurbits such as cucumbers, squash, and all melons. DDT and BHC should not be used on these vegetables. Chlordane will control grasshoppers.

Curly Top in tomatoes can be largely prevented by weekly sprays of DDT or Lindane. Curly top is caused by a virus carried by the beet leafhopper.

County Extension Agent Ledbetter said that he has a new bulletin for controlling all garden insects and may be had by coming to the Extension Service Office.

in the prayer of dedication.

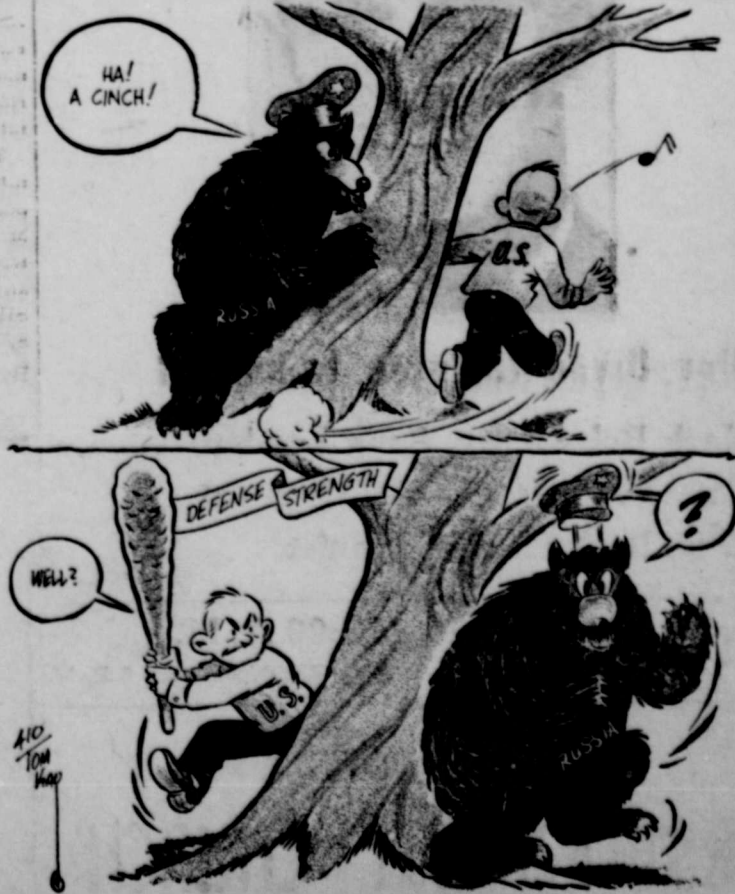
