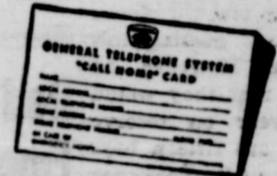

Some Hints On Machine Harvest Of Cotton Offered

COLLEGE STATION — The grade of mechanically harvested cotton can be improved or lowered by the practices used during the harvesting process says Fred C. Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

If strippers are used, Elliott advises producers to get the latest information from the local county agent on defoliation. He also suggests that weeds and especially Johnson grass be cleared from the fields before stripping is commenced. Spot oiling is suggested for this job.

When harvesting is begun, don't strip when the cotton is wet. Most gins, he adds, are equipped to do a good job if the cotton is brought to them in proper condition. One of the more important of these conditions is dryness.

He suggests the use of blowers on the strippers and wire or

slatted sides for the trailers. Make the trailer large enough so tramping will not be necessary, he advises. Growers have told him it costs from \$5 to \$15 a bale to tramp cotton on a trailer. This will soon pay for extra trailers.

When spindle type pickers are used, he again advises seeing the county agent for defoliation information. Pick the cotton only when it is dry and be sure the machine is kept clean. Don't tramp the cotton for trash is ground into the lint and lower grades will result.

In cases of custom harvesting, he suggests that a small piece of blackboard be placed on the side of the trailer. It will carry the number of the trailer; the producer's name; weight loaded; number of the trailer; the pounds needed to make the desired weight bale and finally the name of picker operator. This information is valuable to the ginner as well as the producer.

For those who must put cotton on the ground and load later are advised that plans for a tractor loader (No. 378) are available from the local county agent. Finally, says Elliott, don't overlook any practice which will save or make money, the cost-price squeeze which is growing even tighter on the agricultural producer can best be met with more efficient operation.

SAFETY, a crop to be harvested on every farm and in every home, is receiving special attention from more than one-half million 4-H Club members taking part in the 1955 National 4-H Safety Program.

As a part of their 4-H Club work, members in all 48 states are correcting hazards such as those seen in the above drawing. They are attempting to reduce the Nation's annual farm toll of 14,500 lives, 1,250,000 injuries, and an economic loss of about a billion dollars.

4-H'ers, working as individuals or in groups through their local clubs, conduct surveys to locate hazards, then correct the unsafe conditions. They give demonstrations on hundreds of topics pertaining to farm, home and highway safety. Members present talks before group meetings and over radio and television; put displays in store windows; and build booths at fairs.

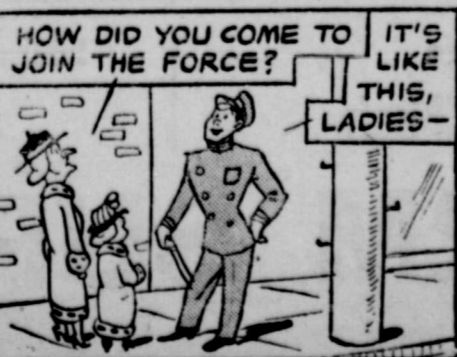

Traffic Law Observance Urged

With the death-laden Labor Day weekend just behind us and the usual series of football weekends coming up, the thoughts of many Texans are turning toward traffic safety. There can be no doubt but that a better acquaintance among drivers with the "rules of the road" and other traffic safety regulations could greatly reduce the death toll of our highways.

To obtain correct and authoritative information about driving is a simple matter. A letter or postcard to the Department of Public Safety, Driver's License Division, Austin, Texas, will bring an official publication, the "Texas Driving Handbook", to anyone who requests it.

Aside from consideration of personal safety, proper driving habits and observance of traffic laws will help prevent financial loss. This is true in spite of the fact that most people now carry liability insurance as a protection under the Texas "Drivers Responsibility Act." Jury verdicts in personal injury cases tend to go higher and higher, and the likelihood of suffering an adverse judgment for an amount in excess of the limits of your liability policy is ever present.

Fault, or liability, is determined by applying the law to the particular facts of an accident. In Texas the law is in several forms — the statutes as enacted by the Legislature, the ordinances

of each city and town, and the court decisions in cases similar to the one to be decided.

A negligent or intentional act is necessary in order to impose legal liability for damages. Where both parties to an accident are negligent, the court will very likely say that both are at fault, and that each must pay for his own damages.

Two of the most important legal rules pertaining to accidents are those having to do with "proper look-out" and "proper control". Driving in a lawful manner and complying with all ordinary traffic rules is not always sufficient. In addition, the driver is expected by law to be alert to all that is happening around him.

If an accident should occur and the driver has not been alert — has failed to keep a proper look-out — he may be charged with "improper look-out" as a traffic violation and also held liable in damages to the other driver. The courts call a "proper look-out" such a look-out as a reasonably prudent driver would have kept under the same circumstances.

Of equal importance is the rule of "proper control". This rule means pretty much what those words imply — that the driver should have his car under such degree of control as to be ready for any emergencies as might arise. It may be breached even though no violation of ordinary traffic laws is involved.

For instance, a driver may be complying with the legal speed limit but still be driving at a rate of speed which is unsafe under the existing circumstances.

Even though legal speed limits are expressed in terms of a certain number of miles per hour, conditions may arise which prevent the driver from maintaining "proper control" of his automom-

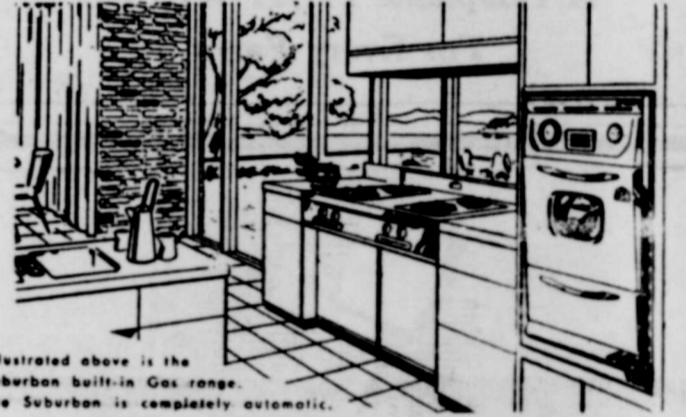
