The Silvertton Owls came out on the little end of the score in their second conference game of the year Friday night.

The Silvertton boys who have been plagued by serious injuries faced the heavier team on the Wheeler field. Coach Buddy Travis, who started the year with 13 lettermen and only 15 men with experience; has had from three to five of his experienced men out in each game. Now he faces the remaining game with one of his most reliable backs out for the season and another who will more than likely be unable to play any more ball this season.

The Wheeler Mustangs were able to make five touchdowns and score 1 extra point, with Jim Porter of the Mustangs giving the Owls their most trouble.

6th Grade Class Studying Briscoe County History

History is beginning to be an interesting part of lessons since the 6th Grade Class has begun studying the History of Briscoe County.

Back in 1936 the Texas History Class, A. K. Castleberry teacher, compiled a book on Briscoe County History. This book is being reprinted and used by the present students. They also have them for sale to those interested in obtaining a copy.

Among other things the book tells of the organization of Briscoe County on March 15, 1892. It was originally a part of Jack County for judicial purposes until Donley county was organized, then it was annexed to Donley County until Briscoe County was organized in 1892.

Silvertton and Los Lingus were in the race for being chosen as the county seat. Silvertton won and the town section was paid for by the settlers. T. J. Braidfoot filed on the land and it was awarded to him by the State. He reserved 40 acres for his services in filing on the land. This is called the Braidfoot reservation and is located in the northwest part of the town section.

The first settler was Chas. Goodnight, who established the old "F" ranch on Quitaque Creek. He and L. R. Dyer brought a bunch of cattle from Raton Mountain in N. M. and settled on Quitaque Creek, in 1877. The ranch was bought by Chas. Goodnight and John D. Adair, later owner of the famous J. A. Ranch.

Much of the book is made up of Legends and Letters told and preserved by the people of this county.

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Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I am planning to go to school this fall under the Korean GI Bill. If I get a part-time job to supplement my GI training pay, will my monthly allowance be cut?

A — No. Outside earnings have no bearing whatsoever on your GI education allowance. Veterans in school will receive the full rate of allowance regardless of how much they earn. In fact, they need not even report earnings to the VA.

Q — I want to apply for disability, but I do not live near enough to a VA office to pick up the right form. Could I apply by a letter to the VA?

A — Yes. Your letter will be considered an "informal application" if you specifically mention the benefit you are applying for. VA will send you a formal application to be filled out. So long as you return it within one year, the effective date of your application will be the date of your letter, rather than the date of the form itself.

Q — In my GI insurance policy, I have specified that payments be made to my beneficiary in monthly installments. If she wants, would she have the right

to ask VA for a lump sum payment instead?

A — No. A beneficiary does not have the right to elect lump sum payment, if the veteran has specified on the installment plan.

Q — If a Korean veteran uses his GI training, would he still be entitled to use his GI loan benefit?

A — Yes. Use of one benefit does not deny a veteran his right to use the other.

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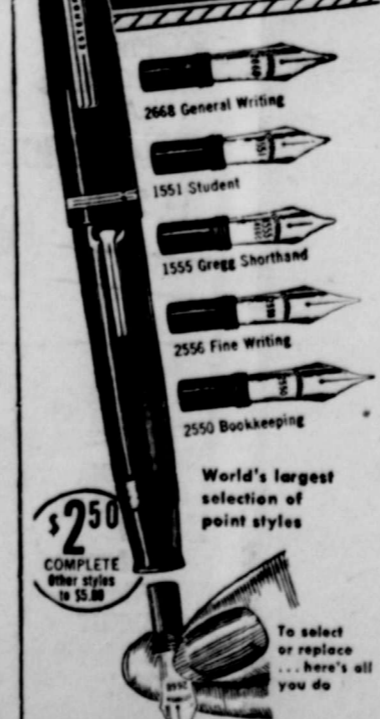

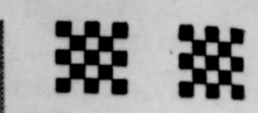

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SOCIAL SECURITY

Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits under the Social Security Act, and survivors payments where the worker is deceased, are based on the total earnings posted to the worker's account. This account is set up under the number on the individual worker's social security card.

No earning, whether from wages or from self-employment, can be posted to a worker's account unless his correct social security number is given. Wages or self-employment income reported without a number, or under an incorrect number, can never be posted unless the correct number is obtained.

John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, urges that employers examine each new employee's social security card when he goes to work, copying the employee's name and number exactly as they are shown on his card. Getting this information correctly before the tax return is made will save the employer's time in answering correspondence and personal contacts to try to get the information later. Employees who are not asked for this information should volunteer it when they go to work for a new employer, Sanderson says.

As a final reminder, Sanderson urges employers who receive correspondence from the Social Security

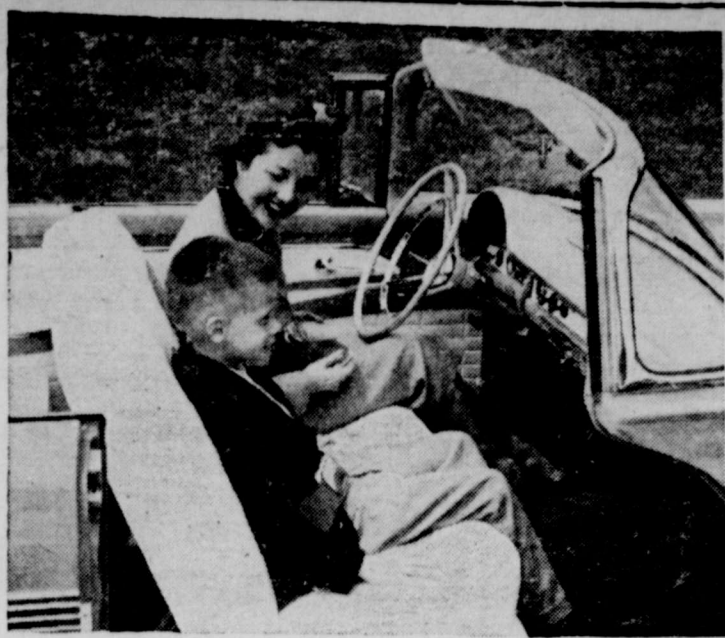

Changes For 1956 Ford Engines

Better performance has been the objective in design changes developed for 1956 Ford engines. Ford engineers have improved "breathing" in the new power plants, by means of larger passages in heads and intake manifolds which will admit more fuel-air mixture when it is needed. In addition, higher compression ratios mean greater power output.

Precision molding of exhaust valves permits use of an improved steel alloy. Valve stem lubrication is better, due to introduction of a deeper cupped "umbrella" which fits over the valve stems.

Cam shafts, also of a new special alloy, are smaller in dia-

meter with higher-lift lobes than on previous models.

Engine fuel pumps have larger porous fiber filters for better fuel cleaning with less restriction of flow. The pump is located toward the front of the engine so it will remain cooler, reducing the chance of vapor lock. A gas tank strainer provides additional protection from dirt which might clog fuel lines.

"Automatic Power Pilot," a Ford-developed system for controlling carburetor-ignition-combustion functions, also is improved in 1956 models. A single vacuum chamber attached to the distributor controls ignition timing in engines with single — or two-barrel carburetors. In four-barrel engines, the system is improved by addition of a second vacuum chamber on the distributor. This provides more responsive spark control when the driver needs rapid variations in engine power.

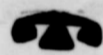

You will receive the maximum allowance rate for the rest of your first year in training, after which your checks will be reduced at four-month intervals.

Q - I am getting a VA pension, and I recently inherited enough money to push my yearly income above the limit set for pensions. Am I supposed to report this fact to the VA?

A - Yes. You should promptly report your additional income, so that VA can discontinue your pension payments. If you do not report it, you may find yourself hard put, later on, to repay a sizable sum of money to the VA.

Q - I have a World War II GI term insurance policy. Is it possible to convert just part of it to a permanent plan, or must I convert all of it at once?

A - If you wish, you may convert only part of your GI term insurance to permanent insurance. However, the insurance must be converted in multiples of \$500, and the minimum amount that may be converted is \$1,000.

Q - I plan to start school this fall under the Korean GI Bill. Would it be possible for me to receive my GI allowance pay in advance, before I start class?

A - No. Under the law, the allowances are paid some time after the end of each month of training completed, and not before. Furthermore, after the end of the month, you and your school will have to sign a certification stating you were in class all month. VA is allowed up to 20 days, after receipt of that certification, to send your check.
