Briscoe Farmers Attended Field Days During Past Week

A number of Briscoe County farmers have attended the Field Days of the Lubbock Experiment Station this past week.

At the Hybrid grain sorghum growers meeting, Allen Kellum and Roy Beasley with his two sons Wayne and Leon found out some valuable information on growing Hybrids in 1956. These two farmers and Alva C. Jasper grew one acre crossing blocks of grain sorghum this year. The Experiment Station announced that these growers of apprentice blocks in 1955 would be the only eligible growers in 1956. Any farmer that wants to go into hybrid seed production will be eligible to grow one of these one acre crossing blocks in 1956.

Growing hybrid grain sorghum is a pretty risky business. That is the purpose of the one acre blocks to take some of the risk out of the business. A crop of hybrid planting seed must bloom on the approximate same date or there will be no seed set.

Hybrid seed planted for commercial production will yield 30 to 40 percent over the comparable varieties.

Dee McWilliams, Lem Weaver, Carman Rhode, George Krupala, Donald Bean, and County Agent Ledbetter were the group attending the annual field day at Texas Experiment Station at Lubbock. Of prime interest to the group was cotton varieties and cultural practices. The new cotton Blightmaster that is tolerant to Angular Leaf spot that has dropped so many bolls in Briscoe County was noted with interest. Blightmaster was developed at the Station from a strain of Stormmaster, and Stoneville. Leaf spot has caused little or no damage to it in plantings this year.

Hybrid grain sorghum looked good. The hybrid that will be planted this next year will be a red early maturing variety that is very open head and early drying qualities with good head exertion with the increased yield that we desire in sorghum.

The Briscoe County Farmers Union met Monday night at the Court House in regular meeting. Judge Gilbreath of Matador gave an interesting talk on Farmers Union. The Judge will represent the farmers at a meeting in Fort Worth in November.

Refreshments of popcorn balls and cookies were served to the group after adjournment.

Tripple honors came to the Silverton F. F. A. Chapter at the National F. F. A. Convention which met last week in Kansas City, and as Cotton John said in his column, "Silverton cut the most ice of all Golden Spread chapters," and that can be broadened to include the entire state of Texas. Silverton had two boys receive the American Farmer Degree and the chapter received the Gold Emblem award, highest award given by the National Association.

Due to the trip planned by the chapter to the Dallas Fair, Glynn Bunch, Silverton's agriculture teacher and chapter advisor, did not attend the Kansas City meet, which awarded to two of his outstanding boys, Freddie Hamilton and Jack Graham, the highest award, the American Farmer Degree; and he did not know that his chapter was to be ranked with the four highest chapters in the state and to receive the Gold Emblem award. Only one other Texas school, Robert Lee in Central Texas, had two American Farmers. There were 38 Texas boys who received the coveted award.

Freddie and Jack graduated from Silverton High School in 1954. They kept up their FFA work, and had until they were 21 years of age to earn the American Farmer Degree, but both made it while they were only 19.

Jack Graham is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Graham, a family who are well known in breeding top quality Hereford cattle and manufacturing chisel plows, operated his own farm 8 miles west of Silverton. He has irrigation but raises no cotton.

Freddie Hamilton is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Hamilton. Freddie raises cotton, cattle, hogs, grain sorghums, wheat and other crops.

American Farmers are the cream of the crop. The citation is the highest degree of achievement in F. F. A. The National Association only is authorized to confer the degree.

Future Farmers start as "greenhands." After a year of membership they may advance to Chapter Farmer, then to State Farmer. States may submit only one candidate for American Farmers for each 1,000 members.

The Golden Emblem which Silverton received is the top award. Only 57 chapters in the nation earned it this year. There are 8,868 FFA chapters in the 48 states Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

This award was given on the basis of Chapter activities as published and recorded in a scrapbook. Silverton's Chapter scrapbook had previously ranked first in Area I contest, and brought an award to their advisor, Glynn H. Bunch, and also to the Briscoe County News.

Wayland Given FARM LAND

Plainview, (Spe.) Wayland College Board of Trustees have received from Mrs. Gertrude M. Van Howeling, Plainview, a gift of land, proceeds from which will provide the Arie Van Howeling Memorial Library. This is the largest single gift Wayland College has received since its establishment in 1909.

W. A. Mays, Amarillo, chairman of the Board, presided over the called session Monday at which Mrs. Van Howeling and her attorney, Frank Day, explained the provisions of the gift of 599.58 acres or irrigated land 442 acres on the Petersburg Highway near Plainview and 157.58 in the Bellview community. The total proceeds will be used to construct and equip a library on the North east corner of the campus, facing Quincy street.

Plans and specifications for this building to cost at least \$225,000 are to be approved by March 1, 1956, with completion of construction at earliest possible time.

Mrs. Van Howeling, who came to Hale County as a bride, is making this gift as a memorial to her late husband, who purchased the land in 1908, a year before Wayland was founded. Mr. Van Howeling's lifelong interest in helping young people and in Christian education, as well as his leadership in community affairs in Plainview and in the First Baptist Church, will be memorialized at Wayland College to which he had made other gifts during his lifetime. Mr. Van Howeling died January 14, 1955.

Mr. Van Howeling engaged in farming and livestock enterprises for many years after coming to Hale County in 1908. He retired from active farming in 1944, but retained his land holdings.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q—I would like to go to France Foreign training under the Korean GI Bill at one of the world-famous French restaurants. Would this be possible?

A—It would not be possible. Foreign training, under the Korean GI Bill, is limited only to VA-approved courses in colleges and universities.

Q—I am a service-disabled Korea veteran. Recently I was blinded in an industrial accident. Would I be entitled to VA aids for the blind, even though my loss of sight was not service-connected?

A—So long as you have a service-connected disability, you may be entitled to VA aids for the blind. Blindness itself does not need to be service-connected.

Q—I hold a World War II GI insurance policy. I have just been married, and I would like to change the beneficiary from my mother to my wife. Am I supposed to notify my mother of this change?

A—You have the right to change beneficiaries without notifying either the old or the new beneficiary. All you have to do is notify the VA district office that handles your insurance account.

Q—I am a Korea veteran with a 20 percent disability rating. Would that automatically make me eligible for vocational re-

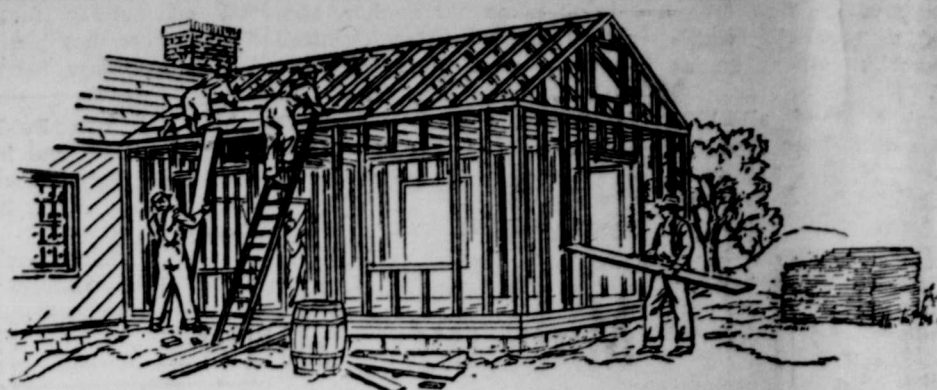

The new 1956 Pontiac models which go on display in dealers' showrooms Friday (October 21), introduce a General Motors "first", a completely new Hydra-Matic transmission. Called Strato-Flight Hydra-Matic by Pontiac engineers, the new transmission is designed to provide smoother, quieter shifting of gears.

The Pontiac Strato-Streak V-8 engine, introduced last year, is larger in 1956 with horsepower upped to 227 in the Star Chief and 205 in the 870 and 860 series. Fifteen new body styles, longer by 2.4 inches six "hardtop" Catalinas, three of them four-door and three two-door. "Hardtop" models are available in all three series, the Star Chief, 870 and 860.

There is a choice of 57 new colors in "Vogue" two-toning or solid colors. Interiors utilize new fabrics and leather in a wide range of colors.

"Pontiac is proud to be the first to introduce a bi and vita General Motors first—Pontiac's new Strato-Flight Hydra-Matic transmission", R. M. Critchfield, General Motors Vice President and General Manager of Pontiac Motor Division, said today. "In over two million test miles this revolutionary transmission system demonstrated smooth, effortless shifting. This new Strato-Flight Hydra-Matic transmission combined with gear will give Pontiac owners a Pontiac's more powerful V-8 engine experience in positive efficient performance. There is no interruption in transmitting power to the rear wheels and car action is barely noticeable. This positive action insures unhampered acceleration for quick, safe maneuvering.

The longer and lower look of Pontiac's new body styles combine with big-car riding comfort in the new series", Critchfield pointed out. "The rich colors of Pontiac Vogue two-tones are picked up in the luxurious interiors. Exciting new fabrics are colorful with durability, cleanability and slideability".

Foremost among the mechanical improvements in the 1956 Pontiacs are the New Strato-Streak V-8 engines—bigger and sturdier than ever and upped in horsepower to 227 in the Star Chief series and 205 in the 870 and 860 series. The upsurge in horsepower comes from the increased displacement, higher compression ratios up to 8.9:1, and improved carburetion.

Pontiac offers three Strato-Streak body series in 1956. Longer by 2.4 inches overall, the 15 new body styles have a longer, lower looking silhouette.

Most luxurious of the three series, the Star Chief line consists of the custom Catalina two and four-door "hardtops", four-door sedan, convertible, on a 124-inch wheelbase and the Safari Station Wagon on 122 - inch wheelbase.

In Pontiac's middle-priced 87* series with 122-inch wheelbase are the Catalina two and four door "hardtops", a four-door sedan, a two-door two-seat station wagon and four-door three-seat station wagon.

Comprising the low priced 860 series are the Catalina coupes and sedans, two and four-door sedans two-door two-seat station wagons and four-door three seat station wagons.

Newly designed for increased car space, the Pontiac two-seat station wagons have a folding seat with the back-rest and the cushion folding into the floor. Still others bear such descriptive names as Amethyst, Camellia, Vista Blue and Raven Black. The exciting flair of the new "Vogue" two-toning combines these colors to add to the low, trim look of the 1956 Pontiac silhouette.

The wide variety of interior trim materials on the new models

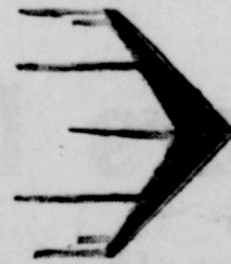
