Maize Still Flowing Into Local Elevators

Grain Sorghums continued to arrive at local elevators this week at a rapid rate. Box cars remained scarce, and piles on the ground continue to increase. It was estimated that Silvertown Elevators were receiving from 12 to 15 cars of grain per day.

It is believed that the half way mark of grain harvest was passed a few days back, and that the combine season will be practically completed in the next 10 days or two weeks, if favorable weather continues.

Cotton harvest has not reached a peak with local gins able to stay up with ginning without running 24 hours.

The killing frost which was spread over the county Sunday night was expected to get the cotton harvest into full swing within a few days.

There has not been enough cotton harvested in most fields to substantiate yields, but it is believed by many of the growers that they will have above normal yields. Several of the farmers have had yields on their maize crops in excess of the 5,000 lb. per acre mark.

Robert McJimsey Injured in Farm Accident Friday

Robert McJimsey was seriously injured about eleven o'clock Friday morning on the Aubrey Rowell farm southwest of Silvertown. Robert was working on the combine when a truck driven by Alva Jasper backed into the combine causing it to pass over Robert's body, injuring his leg and breaking his pelvic bone, probably in two or more places. Robert was carried immediately to the Plainview Foundation and Clinic where he was still suffering from shock early this week, and the full extent of his injuries had not been determined.

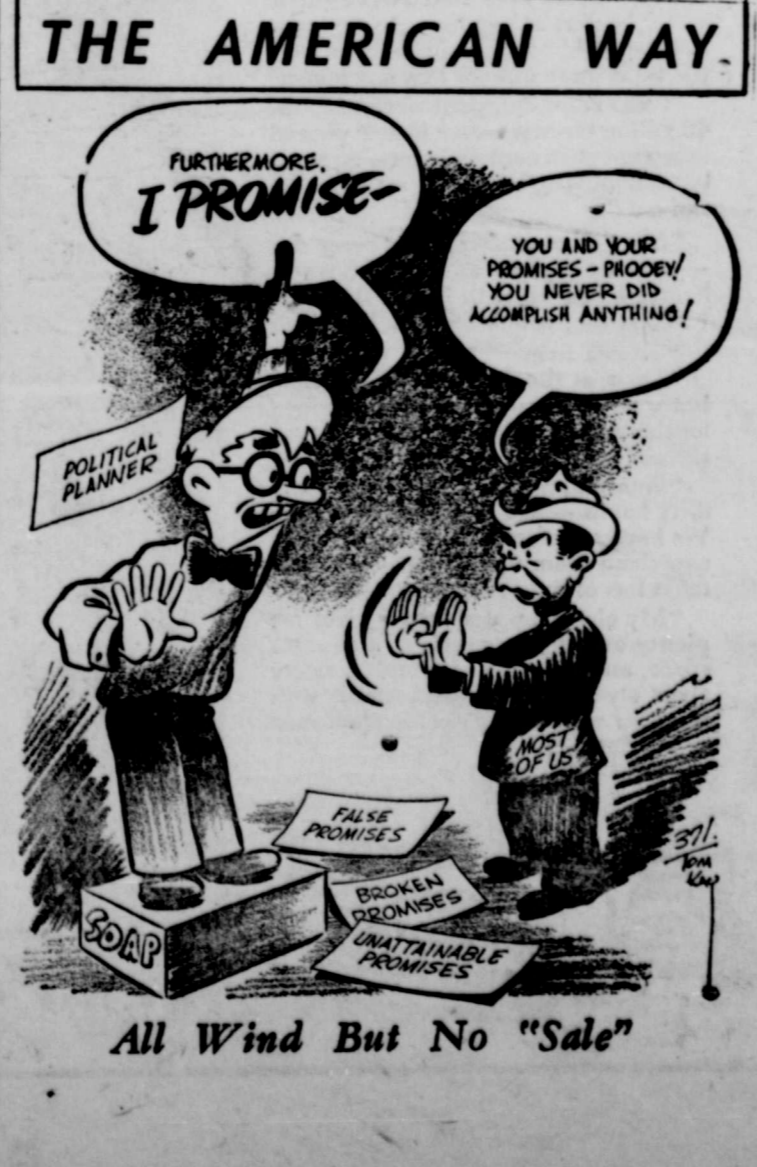
TEXAS YOUTH TO WIN \$8,265 AT FT. WORTH SHOW

Texas members of 4-H Clubs and Future Farmer chapters are eligible to try for a share in the \$8,265 in prize money which is offered to junior exhibitors at the 1956 Southwestern Exposition and FAT Stock Show. Dates are Jan. 27 through Feb. 5.

Junior show contestants must have personally fed and cared for their own animals under the supervision of a county agent, vocational agriculture teacher or Extension Service Staff member for at least three months before the show. Also they must have kept a record on the animals during this period.

All junior show exhibitors are invited to the Sunday School breakfast at 8 a. m. Jan. 29 in Pioneer Palace with the First National Bank of Fort Worth as host. This occasion, unique among expositions, has been observed for years, with an outstanding minister bringing the message and with an excellent musical program.

Whether a junior exhibitor wins or not, he or she will have the thrill that comes of showing at the nation's oldest major livestock show. Live stock entry deadline is Dec. 31.

Post Office Dept. Ask How You Feel About 4c Postage

"No business man would seriously believe it possible for any business to absorb seven major increases in the expenses which account for over 90 per cent of a business's total cost without compensating increases in prices," Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield said in commenting on the proposed postal rate increase.

"This is the situation the Post Office Department faces — and since rate increases have not kept pace with costs, this huge business like enterprise within Government is losing money at the rate of over a million dollars every working day.

"Postage rates on first-class letters are the same today — three cents for the first ounce — as they were in 1932. Meanwhile, Congress has voted wage increases to postal employees on five different occasions since then.

"Two increases in the rates paid the railroads for carrying the mails have also been approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission, in 1951 and 1954.

"These two major costs — wages and transportation — account for over 90 per cent of total Post Office Department costs.

"Not only has the Post Office Department faced these increases in costs without compensating increases in income, but it has been forced to serve an ever-increasing and shifting population.

"The number of householders in the United States has increased almost two-thirds since letter rates were last changed, and new communities requiring postal service have mushroomed in the areas adjacent to our towns and cities.

"These are some of the basic reasons why the Post Office Department believes a reasonable increase in first-class letter rates — from 3 cents to 4 cents for the first ounce — is well justified. Since the volume of letter mail handled in this country is so large, this moderate increase would yield revenues that would go a long way toward balancing the postal deficit."
