

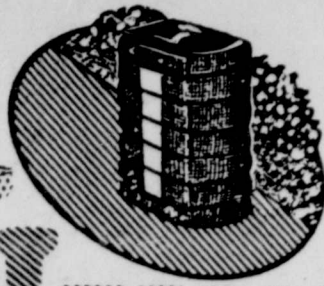

District Governor W. T. 'Dub' Nelson will visit the Lions Club of Silverton on November 3rd. The Silverton Lions Club will welcome Governor Nelson, of District 2-T1, Lions International, which includes 84 clubs in this section of the state.

As a member of the Childrens Lions Club, Lion Nelson has over ten years of perfect attendance. He has held every office in his club except secretary-treasurer and has been awarded the key of state for obtaining 75 new members.

### Harvey Courson Fatally Injured In Canyon Accident

Harvey Courson, age 60, of Floydada was critically injured Wednesday afternoon when the 1949 Ford he was driving left the pavement just east of the Sky Hi roadside park on highway 256 east of Silverton. The car was completely demolished as it went over into the canyon. Courson died about 7 a. m. on Thursday October 27 and was buried at Flomot on Friday October 28.

Messrs. W. E. Schott, and Oliver Ware were coming to Silverton Wednesday afternoon when they noticed car tracks leaving the pavement and that a guard post had been broken off. When they stopped to investigate they saw the car in the canyon. Another passer by stopped and then came into Silverton and sent the Douglas ambulance to the scene of the accident. Hugh Nance and Doc Simpson answered the call and took Courson to the People's Hospital in Floydada, having found the Floydada address on papers in his wallet. The attending physician in Floydada knew the man's brother, M. C. Courson, a resident of Floydada and notified him of his brother's accident.

Harvey Courson, an unmarried man, had been working on the Sam Hill farm south of Silverton for some months and had been previously employed by B. B. Joiner and other local farmers in cutting feed and other farm work.

### Soil Conservation Tour Made By Study Club Group

Soil Conservation Service personnel were honored with the opportunity of presenting some phases of conservation to the ladies of the Century of Progress Study Club and their guests last week. The program consisted of a tour of the L. V. Vaughn and W. E. Austry farms to observe some conservation treatments on the land and hear a brief discussion of each.

On the L. V. Vaughn farm a concrete irrigation pipe line, and two land leveling jobs were observed. These two practices and their place in a conservation irrigation system was discussed by A. H. Jackson, conservation aid of the local S. C. S. office.

Two fields of wheat and one of grain sorghum following guar were observed on Mr. Vaughn's farm. A field of guar and one of mungbeans interplanted in grain sorghum were seen on the W. E. Austry farm. J. C. Ebersole, Area Agronomist of the S. C. S., discussed legumes and the management of crop residue and the benefits of each to the soil.

The tour was concluded by a discussion on the Soil Conservation District, its organization and operation by Carman Rhoads, Work Unit Conservationist of the local S. C. S. office.

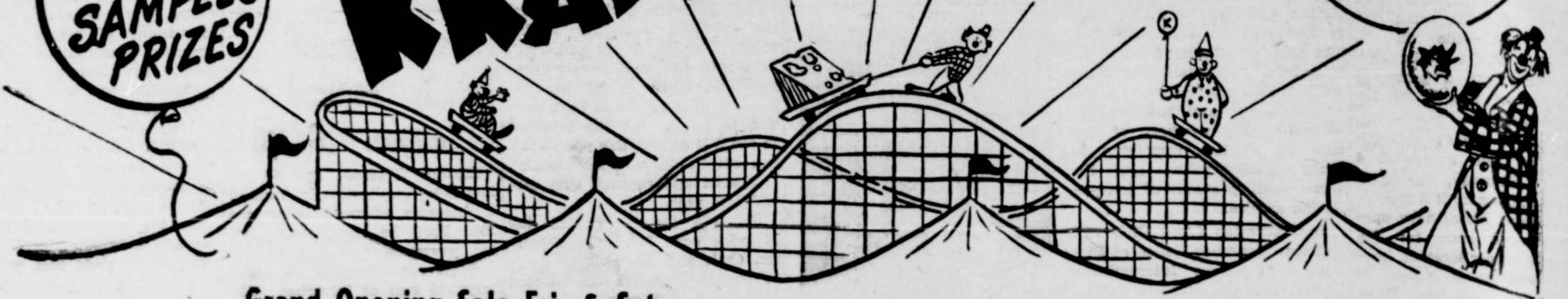

This is the first anniversary of the Beef Council's state-wide "eat more beef" week, which was launched in 1954. A recent survey of meat retailers indicated beef sales are up 17 per cent since the first Beef Week last year.

"The cattle industry is one of the oldest and greatest in Texas and cattlemen have always played important roles in the growth and development of our state", the Governor's proclamation read in part.

Restaurants, hotels and food retailers are participating by emphasizing beef during the week. Two million recipe folders will be distributed through retail stores.

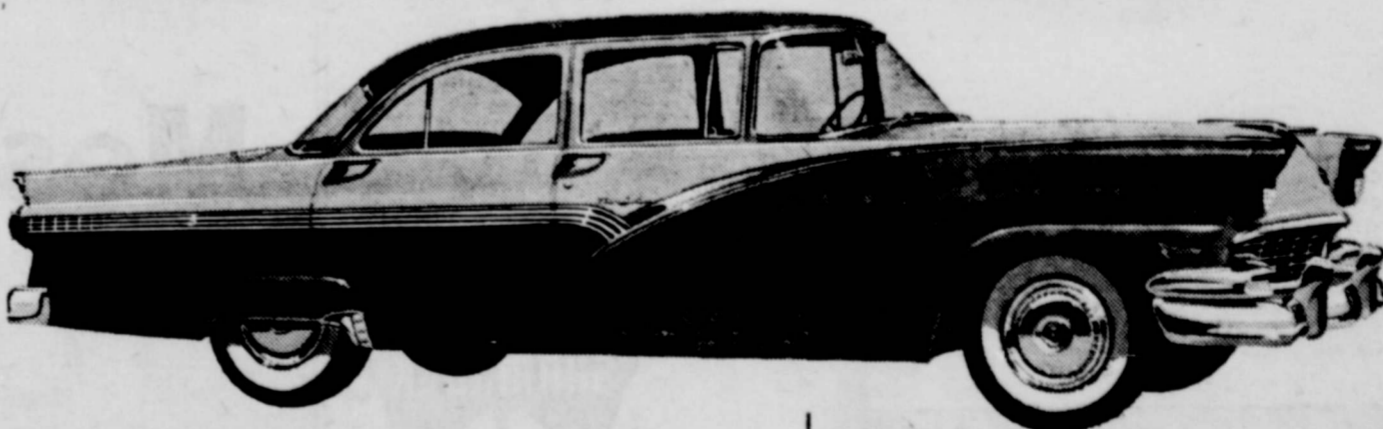

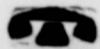
