## Two Briscoe County Farmers Make Good

County Agent Robert Ledbetter came by Monday, and in his conversation revealed some interesting information and opinions thereon, on farm operations during the current harvest in Briscoe County.

It was a relief to gather some opinions of farmers who were not complaining, but had done all "considering" on this years crop. Farming is big business in our section of the country. In business—though prices play a major part in the success—management is perhaps even more important. Ledbetter's farm testimony backed up this statement. He told us of one man who recently was not complaining, but seemed pleased with the results he had found on a 100 acre rented piece of land. He planted grain sorghums and harvested an average of 4,500 pounds per acre, receiving an average of about 30 per hundred weight, and after giving the landlord 1,500 pounds, he had 3,000 pounds per acre for himself. He said he did \$15.00 per acre tied up in labor, seed etc., which left a net profit of \$30.00 per acre. This man always keeps informative, up to the minute records—and with the results that he can show on paper, helps to verify Ledbetter's remarks "that he is a good farmer, one of the best in fact", and he who knows something about managing.

Another story of interest on production, was told of a 12 acre field of grain sorghum which came up volunteer on the Earl Antwell farm. Earl says he really intended to reseed this acreage but it got away from him during the rainy spring. He watered it from a near-by lake and harvested the astounding yield of 8,600 pounds per acre. It was measured and observed by the ASC and County Agent's offices.

Girls from 10,222 of the nation's high school took the aptitude tests on Tuesday, December 6.

General Mills, sponsor of this \$100,000 scholarship program designed to assist the schools in homemaking education; announced this huge participation of nearly half of the nation's high schools today. Last year, 187,463 girls in 8,040 schools were enrolled.

The examination paper of the girl receiving the highest test score in each school will be entered in state competition with each state Homemaker of Tomorrow receiving a \$1,500 scholarship and each state runner-up a \$500 scholarship.

Each girl who takes the test will receive a homemaking guide. Each school winner will receive a golden Homemaker of Tomorrow pin and her school will receive a cook book. The school of each winner will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

Last year's national winner was Deloris Arnette of Enterprise, Ala. who is using her scholarship at Hudson College.

produced upland cotton in 1955 are eligible to vote. Marketing quotas cannot be continued in effect without the approval of at least two-thirds of the cotton growers voting in the referendum.

If quotas are approved for 1956 crop upland cotton, price support will be available to eligible growers at a level between 75 and 90 percent of parity, the exact level depending on the level of supply at the time the support is determined. If quotas are disapproved, cotton acreage allotments without marketing quotas will remain in effect, but

price support to eligible growers of upland cotton will be limited to 50 percent of parity.

## The World As I See It

The matter of mistakes, or errors, has me plain baffled. When we are the one guilty of the mistake, we will console ourselves—either openly or silently—"everybody is guilty of making mistakes." But let it be on the other fellow, and so many times we act as if it were the "unpardonable sin."

Our attitude toward the one who makes the mistake is either wrong, or we are not training our youngsters from infancy how important it is to do things "just right." And we might have something there!

In the training of children don't we let them begin many times doing their chores, or the things they are expected to do, just half heartedly. We let them throw their toys into the toy chest, or get by with slaming their clothes into a drawer or closet, instead of staying with them until the job is done neatly and right.

When they get to the age of six and start to school, we have a grading system which allows them to get by with a sixty or seventy percent accuracy and yet meet the requirements of a course. They have this standard for 12 or maybe 16 or more years of schooling. There are, of course, a rare few who strive for the 100% mark, but not many.

But had you ever stopped to think just how many things in life require a 100% accuracy mark—or there is disaster.

And say have you ever worked for a boss who will take absolutely nothing less (without fussing and fuming) than 100% accuracy. In school I knew I could miss three problems out of 10 and still pass, but on my job should I make errors on three out of ten papers I prepare for my boss, I would wish I could be "shot before sunrise." And it's that way sometime here in our own business. "Wow" the lid comes off, if a mistake is committed—that is by a few—not everybody thank goodness. In our adult world, adults expect 100% accuracy from their fellowmen.

All right let's face it. Are we being too lenient during the learning, habit-forming days of our training, or are we forgetting as adults that we didn't rank 100% back there, and be more tolerant.

My philosophy is to get the principle of "doing our best", from infancy to adulthood, over. Some people's best is better than others, so we must try to understand that.
