BLOCK TAKEN IN HAILE COUNTY FOR OIL TEST A block of some 30,000 acres of land is being assembled for a 7,500 foot wildcat immediately east of Plainview in Hale County. The block is being take for Lyman B. Newman, Plainview, and Joe E. Newman and B. Y. Brush, Denver, Colorado, who must start the test on or before May 15, according to the announcement.

Leases in the proposed block will be for five year term, with no bonus or rentals. Rentals will start if there is no drilling or production on a particular tract after two years. A second test must be started within 45 days after completion of the first.

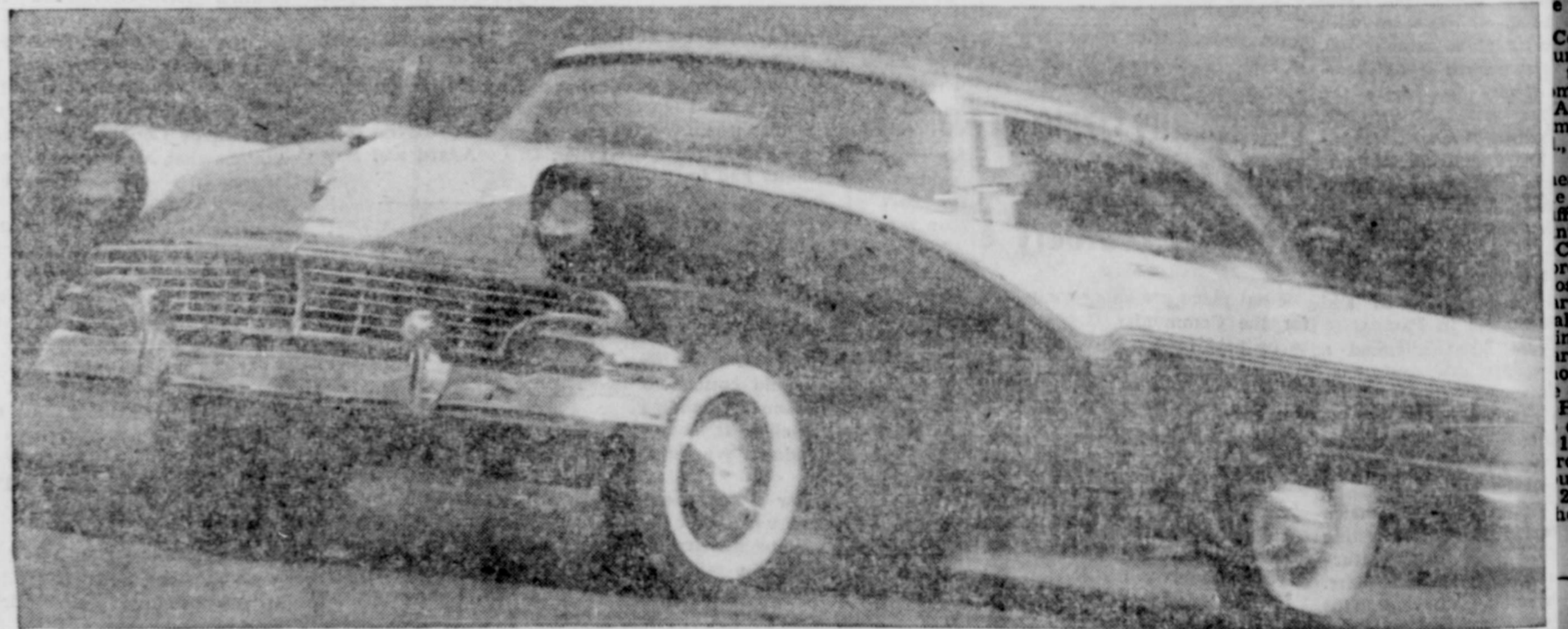

Registration Day for WTSC Set for January 24

Registration for the second semester at West Texas State College will be held in a single day, January 24, according to Registrar Frank H. Morgan. A new procedure for enrolling will be initiated.

Students will wind up first semester work January 16-19 with final examinations, with a short holiday before registering for the new semester. Time that students register will be determined by the letter with which their last names begin.

In the past, students have registered according to number drawn, and always before registration opened, students stood for hours in line to draw early registration numbers.

It will be necessary to adhere rigidly to the registration time schedule Mr. Morgan said. Students who fail to register at the time designated must wait until the end of the registration period.

Order of registration begins with letters W through Z at 8 a. m., and continues backward through the alphabet at half-hour intervals. In the fall, 1956, registration will start with those students whose last names begin with the letters T through V. Those who register first this spring will be last next fall, so that by following the same procedure each succeeding semester, all students will have equal opportunity as to time for registering.

JANUARY 31 IS DEADLINE FOR ISSUING W-2 WITHHOLDING STATEMENTS

Employers were reminded today that the deadline for issuing W-2 withholding statements to employees is January 31, according to D. L. King, administrative officer of the Internal Revenue Service office in Plainview.

If it becomes necessary to correct a W-2 after it has been given to an employee, a corrected statement must be issued and marked "corrected by employer."

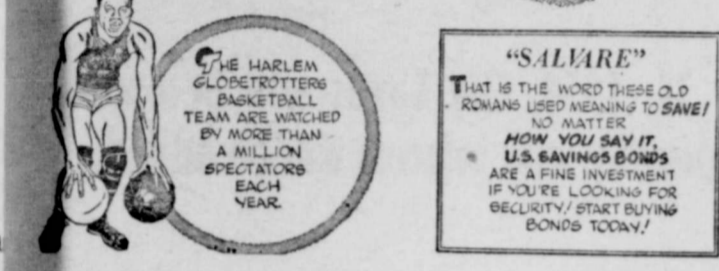

Turn Porch Into a Room



When enclosing a porch, the home-owner will generally find that complete window units of ponderosa pine are easiest to install. They are fitted to each other at the factory for smooth operation and are chemically treated to prevent sticking. The friendly atmosphere of this enclosed porch is highlighted by the colorful draperies, the knotty pine paneling, and the handsome panel door.

Converting a porch into a year-round room may be the solution to the space problem of many homeowners.

According to A. B. Campen, modeling expert from Peoria, there are two main questions to be answered before going ahead with conversion work. Is the porch in good condition? Will sufficient space be gained to warrant remodeling?

Campen says that frequently porches are only 8 feet wide. For most practical purposes this is too narrow. It often is more economical in the long run to build a porch wider than to remodel a porch this narrow. He suggests a porch could be about 12 feet wide to be eligible as a year-round room.

Here are some general things to check for porch conversion: 1. Are the porch supports sound? If not, erect a masonry foundation.

2. Is the flooring in good shape? If the porch flooring must serve as the base for the finish flooring.

3. Are the floor and walls insulated? The room will have two or three outside walls and will tend to be cold without insulation. Three-inch-thick mineral wool bats and blankets, or four inches of blown wool will add to winter and summer comfort.

4. Will the new room get enough heat? The Coleman Heating Institute, Wichita, Kan., suggests that if the central heating system doesn't have the capacity to heat the extra space, a space-saving wall heater, a floor furnace, or a room heater can be added as supplementary equipment.

5. Is the roof weathertight? If not, a new roof of asphalt shingles will give long life. The shingles come in a great number of different colors to satisfy any color preference. Roofing on various parts of the house wears out at about the same rate. If the porch needs reroofing, chances are the main roof does too.

WHO MAKES WHAT THE DEPENDENCE OR DEPENDENT

Questions of dependency often plague collection agents of the Internal Revenue Service. This is particularly true when the status of valuable animals is the basis for argument.

Age of Home Cloaked by New Roof

Remodeling lopped a half century from this 60-year-old house. More gracious living was the result, plus better appearance.

Basically, this 6-room bungalow was similar to many thousands of other houses scattered throughout the country. The owner, Miss Helen Maletz, of Pittsburg, Kansas, was born in the house.

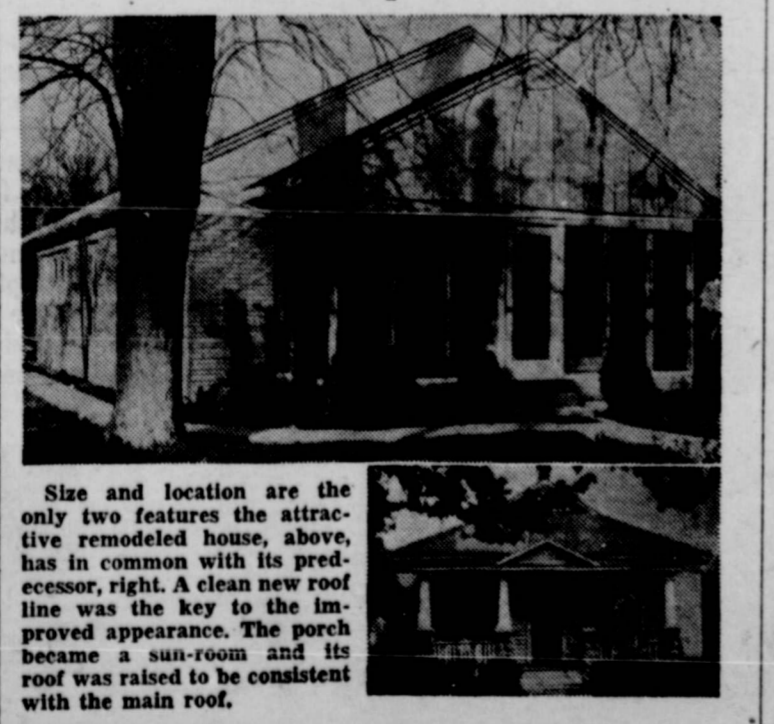
Though linked to it by sentiment, she wanted to make a number of specific improvements. She decided that because the house was large enough for her, she'd spend her remodeling funds solely to gain convenience and better appearance. She hired a reliable local contractor to carry out her ideas.

The first item of business was the roof. It reflected the extravagances of the late Victorian period—false dormers and other grow-aws. Miss Maletz had the contractor build a new roof with green asphalt shingles. The roof color was to set the central color theme for the remodeling.

The covered porch was transformed into a sun porch with movable glass louvers. This modern note was continued in the side walls by installing new ponderosa pine window units with modern horizontal panes. The windows, completely weather-stripped and chemically treated, do not stick. The walls of the house were re-sided with buff-colored brick veneer.

Changes for the interior remodeling were reduced by keeping in the load-bearing walls. The load-bearing partition between the living room and dining room was removed. This was the way for a 28-foot by 18-foot living room. The living room was decorated in subdued green. This repeated the green color of the roof and tended to unify the exterior-interior decorating schemes.

Ceilings in the house were lowered. Wall-thick insulation plus a new gas heating unit were installed, reducing heating costs. New hardwood floors were laid throughout the house.



The kitchen got a good share of the remodeling dollar. Modern cabinets and electric appliances were installed. Both the kitchen and bathroom walls were tiled in yellow.

Experts Tell How to Choose New Windows

"What can a window do for me?" A man who is about to build or remodel a house should ask himself this question.

According to the University of Illinois Small Homes Council, a window should be chosen for particular needs—light, heat conservation, ventilation, beauty, view, and privacy.

No window does all jobs equally well. Here are some guides:

1. Light—A horizontal window gives a wide but shallow spread of light. A vertical one will give a narrow but deep-penetrating light. The higher on the wall a window is placed, the farther the light will penetrate into the room. Windows on two or more walls distribute light more evenly than the same window area on one wall. Windows situated at the corners of the house do not admit as much light as windows of the same size located elsewhere.

2. Heat conservation—Wood is a good insulator. The inside of a wood window frame stays close to room temperature, regardless of the temperature outside. Moisture will not condense on it as it will on a cold surface. This prevents staining of curtains and wall paper. Picture windows, in most areas of the country, should be on the south wall rather than a north wall. The south wall is the warmest wall. Heat loss is minimized.

3. Ventilation—Double-hung, casement, and awning windows do a better job of ventilating a room when placed at sitting and standing levels. A top-hinged window that opens inward may be placed high on a wall and still distribute air efficiently. Windows located at the corners of the house do not ventilate as efficiently as windows of the same size located elsewhere.

4. Beauty—Windows, because they break up a wall surface, are an important factor in the architecture of a building. The current trend is to locate windows in related groupings, rather than scatter them. For purposes of color decorating, the familiar, ponderosa pine window is most practical. It can easily be painted and repainted.

5. View—Picture windows should be used with discretion. A huge horizontal window may be suited for panoramic views of mountains or the sea. A more modest-size horizontal window or a vertical one may be preferable for framing less dramatic scenes.

6. Privacy—Horizontal windows, placed high on a wall, will give both privacy and light.

"A piece of sun in a bottle" is what someone once called the heat lamp now being used on many farms to give quick permanent or portable supplementary heat. This lamp contains a built-in reflector that directs the light and heat onto the working surface. The R40/1 costs about one-third less than the 250 watt R40/10 lamp which contains a heat-resistant, hard glass red lens.



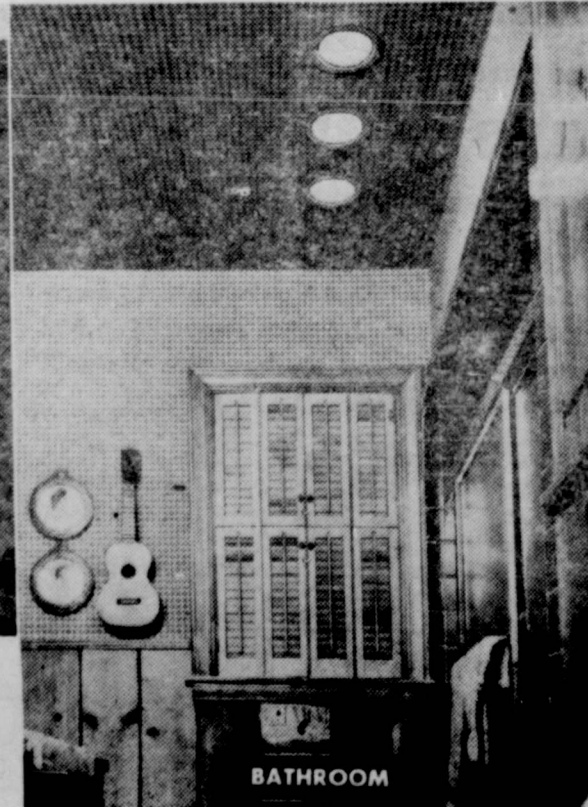

\$30,000 Gift From Ft. Worth Couple to Apply on New Hall

Mr. and Mrs. William Fleming, Fort Worth, have given \$30,000 to Wayland College to complete the construction of the residence hall for young women that was started on faith in 1954, according to President A. Hope Owen. Plans are for this to be ready for occupancy September 1.

Mr. and Mrs. Fleming have long been instructed in both the promotion of Christian Education and in the expression of Southern Baptist work in the Western states. In their gift they have combined these interests since Wayland is a pioneer baptist college in the west and draws many students who will return to their homes in the western states to work and serve.

The Fleming gift insures the completion of the building but Wayland will have to raise an additional \$10,350 to complete the furnishings. Of this sum, \$2,500 in cash and pledges is already in hand.

Money to purchase the following furnishings will be needed: carpeting; draperies for parlor, office and counselor's apartment; parlor, recreation room and kitchenette; heating unit; laundry equipment; cleaning equipment such as vacuum, electric scrubbing and polishing machine.

Furniture for students' rooms was purchased at a considerable saving at the same time as that for Agnes Mays Dormitory. P. Edward Ponder, Sweetwater, in 1954 gave Wayland money to purchase pianos for these two residence halls.

The campaign for funds for this building was started in 1952 and through the years gifts have come from individuals and churches. Because of denominational emphasis on other campaigns and the administration's desire to cooperate this campaign has been sidetracked until now.
