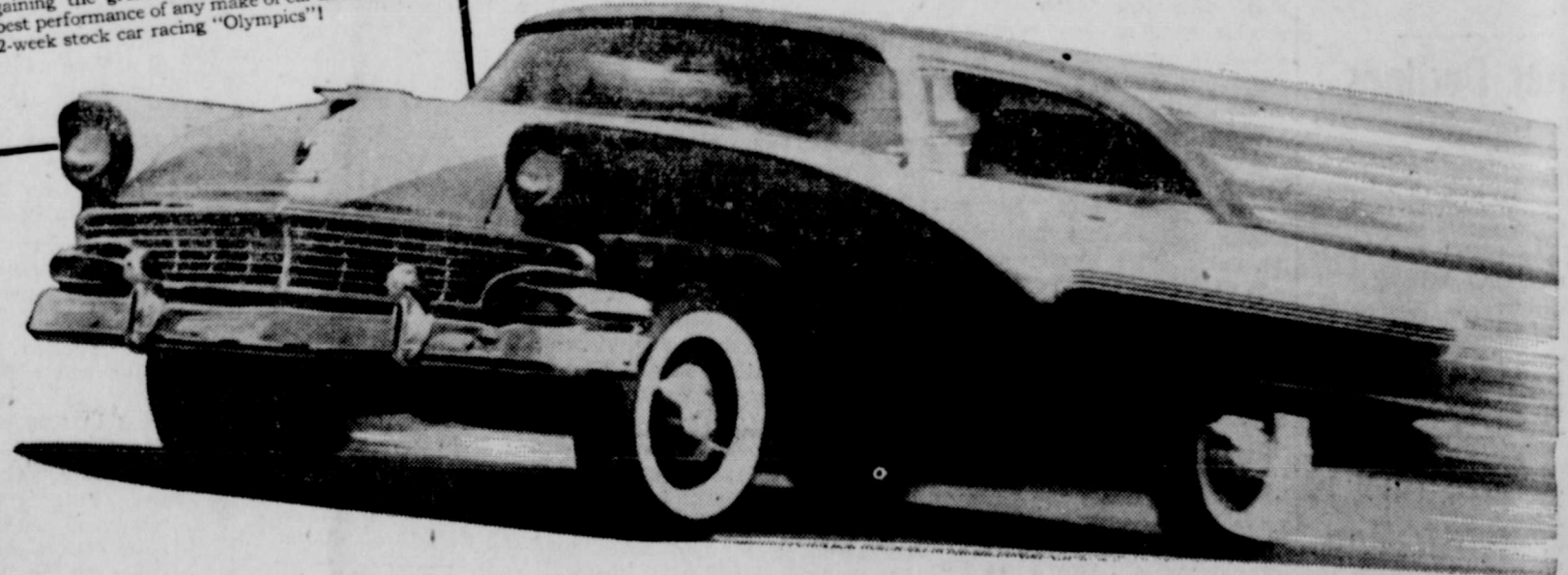

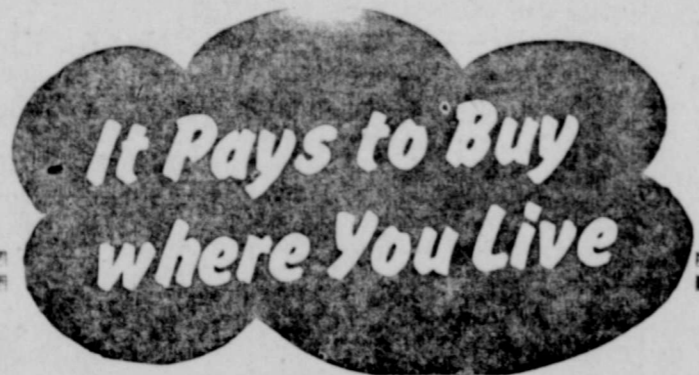

33 Texas Farmers go to Washington Seeking Support

Thirty three Texas Farmers Union members spent February 26 to March 2 in Washington, D. C. where they actively solicited support for farm legislation which will increase farm income this year. Briscoe County was represented by Gilbert A. Elms. He was joined in Washington by 32 other Farmers Union members from Texas and 105 members from North Dakota, Illinois and Pennsylvania who spent the same days in the capital city.

Elms reports this state's group contacted their Congressmen and Senators and that they urged them to support proposals that will provide 100 per cent of parity income for all farm families. Elms adds the present bill being considered by the Senate falls considerably short of accomplishing this objective. Although he points out the bill does call for reinstatement of 90 per cent price supports for corn, wheat, cotton, peanuts and 80 per cent for manufacturing milk. One of the highlights of the trip, according to Elms, was listening to a part of Senator Hubert Humphrey's comprehensive 358 page oration on the general farm situation on the floor of the U. S. Senate.

A two and one half hour conference with Department of Agriculture officials revealed certain facts, Elms reports, that seemed to be in direct contradiction to Secretary Zra Benson's statement of the previous weekend, when he declared on a national TV show that anyone who claims farmers are depression-bound is "simply not telling the truth." One of the charts displayed at the Department meeting showed farm income dropped from 100 per cent (of 1947-49) to 80 per cent in 1954 and still lower in 1955, while national income jumped from 100 per cent to 140 per cent in the same period. Another department chart showed the farmers' share of the consumer's food dollar is today at an all-time low having dropped from 49c in 1950 to 38c now.

One of the department officials concluded his remarks by saying the material he had presented "highlights sort of a serious situation" and that he didn't "think it can continue much longer" according to the Farmers Union Delegate. He also pointed out that most of the Washington Farmers Union visitors felt that Secretary Benson's nationwide TV statement of only

a few nights earlier to the effect that farmers were in a sound financial condition was not at all in line with the hard cold facts as presented by the Department officials at their Tuesday morning conference. The Farmers Union must, therefore, seek out ways and means of building a strong economy for the family size farm, thereby helping build a strong economy for us all.

While in Washington the farmers Union group visited many of the important points of historic interest, including Washington monument, Lincoln and Jefferson memorials, Mt. Vernon and FBI headquarters.

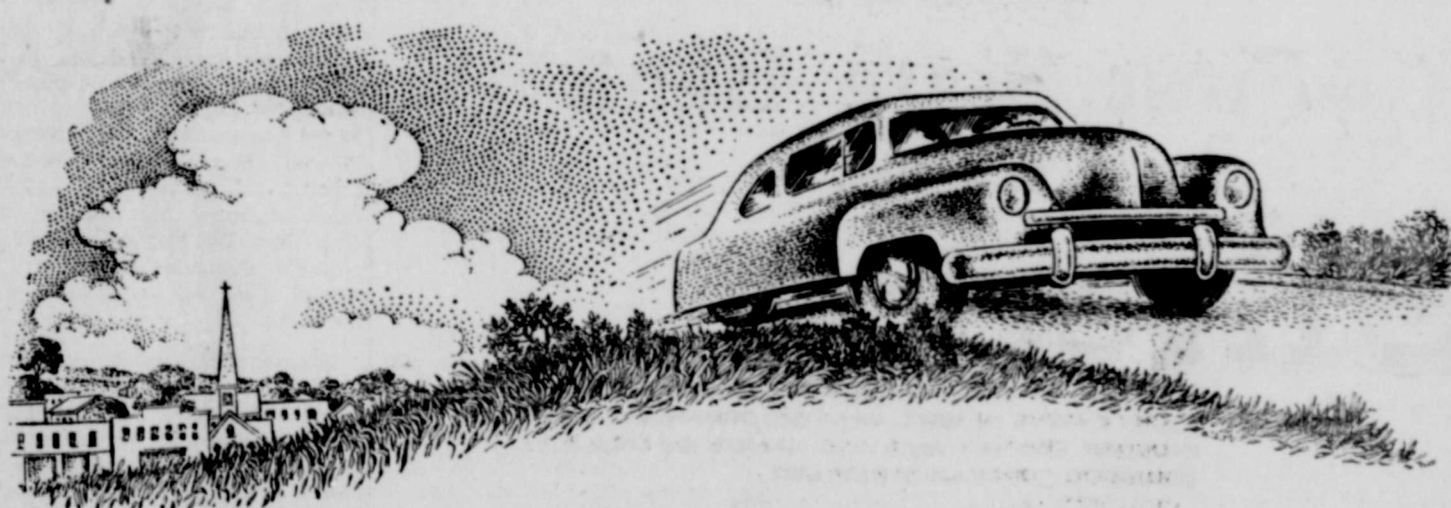
