Turner topped the candidates with 119 votes, Mallow received 115 while Birdwell tallied 86. A total of 198 votes were cast. Other candidates and their votes were Virgil Crow, 75; Charles Francis, 68; William Long, 42; Johnny Burson, 36; and Merle J. Montague, 35.

Mrs. Keys was born Polly Floyd on July 31, 1891, in Lewisville, Texas. She moved to Lockney in 1898 where she was married to Arch Keys 30 years ago. The couple later moved to Plainview where they operated a florist business.

Will Meet Monday Night to Discuss Hybrid Grain

Monday night at 8:00 p. m. a meeting of all farmers that are planning to grow hybrid grain sorghum in 1956 will be held. This meeting will be for those that plan to have the one acre crossing blocks as well as those that will have hybrid seed to plant for production. One of the purposes is to set up some demonstrations comparing hybrids with the regular varieties of grain sorghum.

There has been some confusion as to the things that hybrids will do and won't do. This will be the first year that these have been planted in any quantity anywhere. Persons interested in hybrid growing are also invited to attend. This should be a very informative meeting.

Another topic that will be brought up for further consideration will be the formation of a Registered and Certified Seed Growers Association for this county. Farmers in this county that are now growing Registered or Certified seeds should also plan to attend this meeting. This will apply to those that are growing small grain as well as grain sorghum.

The meeting will be held at the County Court Room Monday night, April 16th.



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
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
