At the great American clinics, ulcer patients are told not to The Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans refuses to treat an individual unless he totally abstains from smoking. In Boston doctors had an interesting case some years ago, a man who had all the symptoms of doudenal ulcer. Even the X-ray showed it. But an operation found no ulcer at all. The patient stopped smoking, under orders, and his ulcer left him. Three months later, feeling quite well, he took up smoking again, and back came the ulcer. This time, however, the doctors ordered him off cigarettes completely. Since he stopped smokinig, he has had no more ulcers.

Smoking is bad for athletes. Where staying power is demanded tobacco lowers athletic performance. Non-smokers, in four years at Yale and Amherst, grew more in height and weight and lung capacity than did their smoking colleagues.
