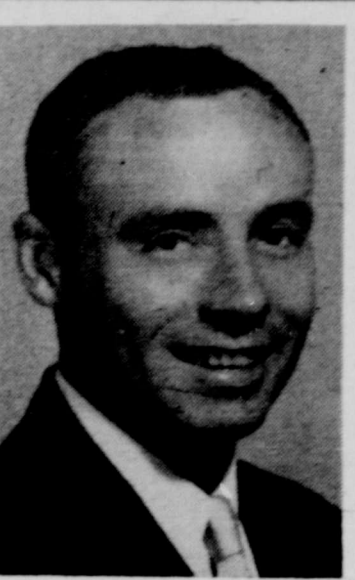

Briscoe County ranchers have completed a 17,000 acre grasshopper control program. This work has been in cooperation with the Briscoe County Grasshopper Control Committee and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Members of the Briscoe County Committee are Johnnie Burson, president; Carl Bomar, secretary, and Wade Steele, member.

In this program ranchers get together and clock up sufficient acreage to get assistance from the State and Federal Government. Cost for poisoning an acre of grassland with two ounces of Aldrin and 1 gallon of diesel oil will run less than 40c per acre. Kills have been very good in nearly all cases. This work was begun Tuesday morning, June 19, and completed Saturday, June 23. Mr. Jack Stanton of the U. S. D. A. has been in charge of the operations of blocking up the land and applying the spray.

A demonstration on the Carl Bomar place east of Silvertton has been placed for the purpose of determining how much grasshoppers actually eat on a given range.

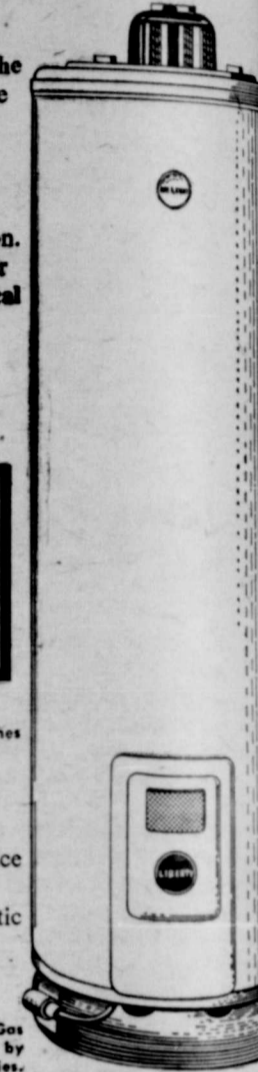

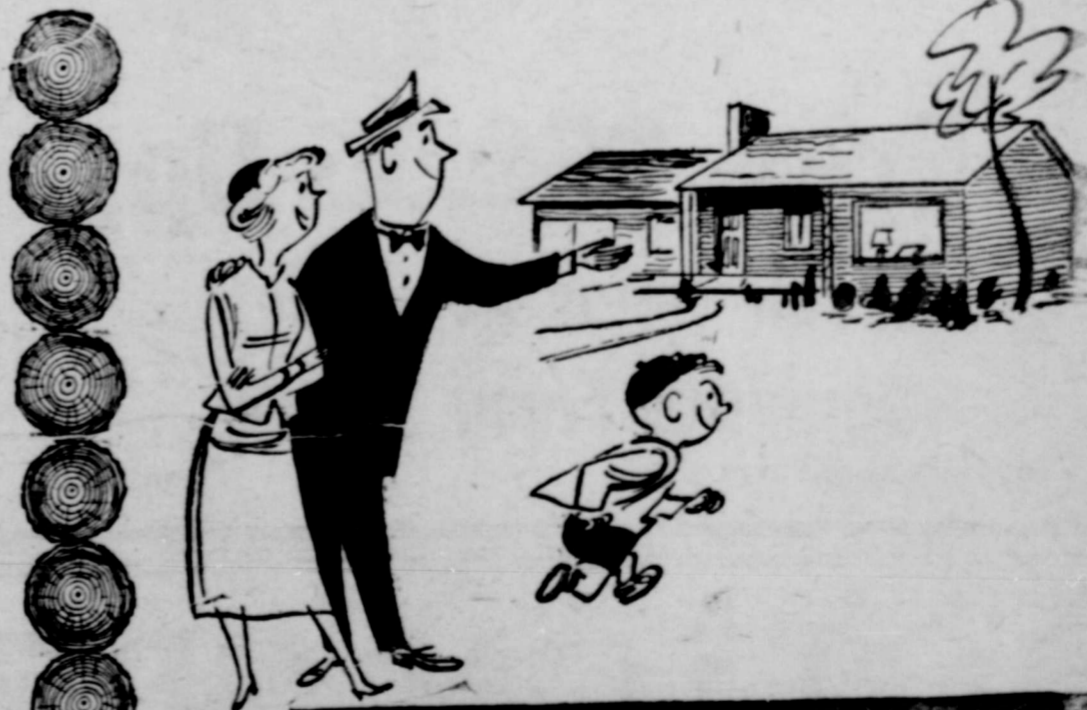

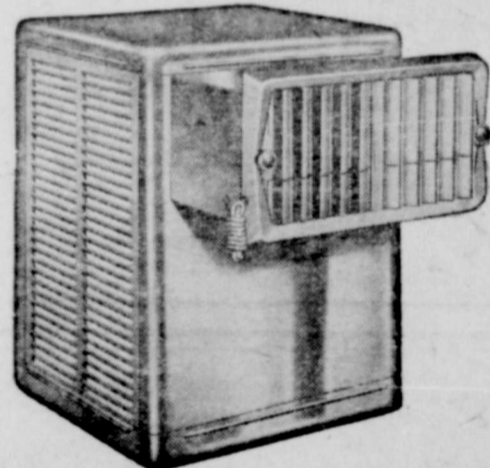
