ON PACKING MEATS—Every steak, chop, or meat pattie will keep its individuality if two pieces of waxed paper or freezer wrap are placed between meat cuts when packaging for the freezer. Just the amount you wish to use may be removed and the pieces quickly defrosted or cooked from the frozen state. (See second picture from right). A pad of moisture, vapor wrapping paper placed against boney areas of some cuts of meat protects against puncturing of freezer wrap, keeping meat free from freezer burn.





Were One Continent

WASHINGTON - Islands of the southwestern Pacific appear to be fragments of an ancient Melanesian continent which broke up 10 or 20 million years ago. This hypothesis, previously ad-

vanced by geologists, is amply supported by plant distribution, says Dr. Albert C. Smith, botanist of the U.S. National Museum.

Dr. Smith recently completed his third collecting expedition in these islands, during which he visited the wild, little known Korombasanbasanga Mountains-a region of massive rock columns ringed by precipices and divided by dark steep and silent rain forest. 


