Chamber Banquet plays to sellout crowd

Geezinslaws, steak and shrimp dinner big hits with crowd of 300

The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture's first attempt touse its annual banquet as a major fund raiser was a hit, with a sellout crowd wolfing down steak and shrimp, then giggling themselves silly at the antics of the Geezinslaw Brothers.

At \$50 per person, the banquet was at first glance viewed as a little out of line as compared to the typical chamber banquet with a meal and speaker for about \$20.

But with the success of a similar event in Earth, the Muleshoe Chamber board of directors put a pencil to it and came up with a formula that would not only make the banquet worth the ticket price, but make it an event the community would look forward to each year - allyou-can-eat steak and shrimp and first-class entertainment.

In addition, the banquet was seen as a major fundraiser and sold on the fact that the Chamber must each year seek donations for various projects like Mule Days and the Fourth of July. With this year's banquet clearing in the \$6,000 range, enough funds are available that when combined with dues structure, the directors won't be forces to "nickel and dime" members all year long to fund promotional events.

"Sports fans, it was great!" said Chamber president David Tipps. "I'm amazed at how much fun we had."

The chamber directors and their spouses served the meal, which was prepared by

Victor Leal and J.B. Douglas, who put a special touch on the aged rib eyes donated by West Tex Feed Yard. Also cooking were Mark and Eileen Morton, who put a Cajun flavor on the shrimp, corn and potatoes. The potatoes were donated by Bruce Barrett and Cliff Black.

The Muleshoe High School cafeteria was decorated with a huge world globe flaunting the "world tour" of the Geezinslaw Brothers, the Austin-based country music and humor duo often seen on The Nashville Network (TNN).

Each of the specially decorated tables in the cafeteria told its own story. Miniature road signs carrying the name and population of several Texas communities adorned each table, along with literature from each local chamber of commerce in places like Poth, New Braunfels, Kountze, Yoakum and Paris available to those at the tables. It was a mini-tour of Texas without leaving the cafeteria.

Door prizez were awarded through drawings and through questions about the various Texas communities. Most of the prizes consisted of Muleshoe T-Shirts with \$20, \$50 and \$100 bills attached.



Participants took part in general sessions and workshops on topics that included Working With a Jury, Working Effectively With the Legislature, Processing Juveniles, Budgeting and Purchasing and Optical Disk Programming.

Updates were given on Information Probate, State Jail Felonies/Penal Code and proposed and pending legislation.


Downing said, "Another added bonus of the seminar is that it provides the opportunity for new officials to network with those who have been in office awhile."

"Talking with others who hold the same office from different counties helps one learn how to handle similar situations and problems if and when they arise."

Selena-through her music and tragic death - opens doors for Hispanics

The news sent a chill down my spine, but it was more like a shockwave across my whole body. The tragic death of Tejano music super-star Selena Quintanilla Perez. It certainly hit San Antonio, the Tejano music capitol of the world, like an earthquake and saddened the hearts of people everywhere.

Perhaps many of you are not familiar with Selena. But for the millions of Hispanics in the United States, Mexico and abroad, an explanation of her talent and accomplishments is not needed. Her voice filled the radio airwaves with a vivid intensity and energy that has never been felt in the Hispanic music market.

As a Houston sociology professor was quoted as saying in a story printed in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, "Something bigger than an individual has died - an era, a style of music."

The loss of Selena has left many Tejano music fans like myself feeling a sudden void and emptiness.

Very few things surprise me anymore with the world we live in. But when someone comes along that makes such as impact on a lot of people like Selena – it makes you stop and think real hard. How could something like this have happened?

Though I have never met or even had the opportunity to see Selena perform, it was enough to bring tears to my eyes. My first thought was, "She has come so far so fast and had so much going for her.

How will any other person ever be able to bring what she did to the Hispanic music industry?" It is certainly a tragic loss.

At the age of 23, the life of Selena may seem like another tale of a rising star whose promising career was cut short by a tragic and premature death. But for the Tejano music industry, and the millions of listeners, the impact is more severe. It was a first.

Selena began her career in Corpus Christi, the place she called home, and took the Spanish music industry by storm, sending her albums this past year to platinum status and capturing a Grammy Award. I was a fan of hers long before that, when she came out with her first major hits like "Dulce Amor" (Sweet Love).

To date, there was no one else who could match her. She captured the Tejano Female

Entertainer of the Year award four years in a row.

If I had to chose, I couldn't begin to pick which of Selena's songs are my favorite, "Techno Cumbia," "Fotos y Recuerdos" (Photos and Memories); "Amor Prohibito" (Probited Love); "Bidi Bidi bom bom," and the list goes on and on.

Like the rest of the Tejano music world, I was also looking forward to the release of her first all-English album this

summer. I knew Selena would be the first Tejano star to hit mainstream America. I have a feeling that the four English songs she has recorded will still be released and I will not be surprised if they are mega

Perhaps the most shocking part of the whole incident seems to be the senselessness of her death and how fast it all happened. By the single actions of one person and in a span of less than an hour, a powerful image that brought out the best of modern Hispanic culture, is gone.

Though this certainly has been a tragic week, I can say that this incident has brought

the Hispanic community closer and brought out the best everywhere, as people united to pay tribute to Selena.

Thousands of pink ribbons were fanned from cars, along with headlights and candlelight vigils which were held throughout the nation in her

memory. Radio stations were jammed with dedications to her and played her music all weekend. Thousands of cards were sent to the Quintanilla family, including condolences from Julio Iglesias and Ma-

If anything good comes out of all this, perhaps it is the spotlight the whole incident

has brought to the Tejano music industry, which is considered one of the most explosive musical genres in the United States today. Maybe the Hispanic culture will finally find a place in mainstream America and on primetime TV.

Many may not think anything of this or be aware of it, but to date, there has not been one successful prime time television show portraying the Hispanic culture in today's modern America. Many attempts have been made but none have been successful. I can count about a dozen successful shows that have been successes portraying Black Americans, but not one single show depicting Hispanics has

One explanation for this offered by my mom is that perhaps it is "because we are such

a diverse culture. Some people speak Spanish, some English, some both, some are lighted skinned with blond hair and blue eyes and others are dark skinned. Some have roots of

Mexican and/or Indian ancestry, while others are Cubans, Puerto Ricenos, and what have

Selena was able to span all of these cultural differences

and appeal to Hispanics of all backgrounds.

I feel that Selena-through her music and death - has essentially opened doors for Hispanics and our culture. She has opened the doors to mainstream America.





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


Late registration on the Lubbock campus is 8:30 a.m. -3:30 p.m. and 5:30-6:30 p.m. May 30-31.

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

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

MISD providing services for disabled students

The Muleshoe Independent School District provides comprehensive education services for children with disabilities living in the district. These services include a pre-school program. The program provides for early detection and education of children with disabilities from birth to five years of age.

Services may be provided through special classes in one or more of the following areas; speech-language development, social-emotional development, self-help skills, mental development and fine and gross motor development.

The Special Education for pre-school program is a source of early intervention for aiding young children with disabling conditions. This program provides the opportunity to raise the level of functioning and potential of children with disabilities.

Pre-school classes are available free of charge to all eligible children in the district. Eligibility is determined by a battery of comprehensive tests after a referral is made. Anyone may refer a child who may have a problem in the following areas: speech or language disability, mental retardation, orthopedic impairment, hearing and/or visual impairment, deaf/blind, learning disability, emotional disability, autistic

and other health impairments. The classes are located on the campus of Neal B. Dillman Elementary School. Daily instruction is provided from 811 a.m. and from 12:25 to 3 p.m. Class size is kept to a minimum by offering to classes to provide as much individual assistance to each child as possible.



Harrison, Amy Locker and Cari Faver. They took a fifth place. Megan Harlan, Amy


Megan Harlan, Amy Locker, Carolyn Schuster, and Brandi Harrison were matched up to run the 800 meter relay. They placed 5th in the event.
