Farmers Attend Field Demonstration on M. E. Love Farm

Twelve farmers attended the field demonstration on the M. E. Loving farm South of Quitaque Wednesday, July 25. The farmers had met to hear and see Dr. Freeman Fuller of the A. & M. College Extension Service carry out the demonstration. To the was not able to attend because of regret of the crowd, Dr. Fuller a mixup in his schedule in Floyd County. County Agent Ledbetter conducted the demonstration. All of the farmers counted 30 stalks of cotton and identified the insects that were on the cotton.

About fifteen days is all that is left of the fruiting period that will mature good cotton in Briscoe County. These days are especially critical to some that have late cotton. Fields should be watched closely for boll worm damage and control should begin immediately if sufficient worms are found. Four to five worms per 100 plants is sufficient to warrant control.

Many farmers have been very interested or concerned about the boll and square drop this year with no apparent reason. Donnie Brunson of the Quitaque community was particularly concerned. This boll drop has been caused in many or most cases by angular leaf spot. Angular leaf spot is a bacterial blight that there is no control for. It has increased the past few years and is causing growers many dollars loss by reducing the grade to spotted one. Nearly all fields in the County are showing angular leaf spot damage.

Nationwide Test To Be July 20-26

For seven days in July, Operation Alert 1956 will confront civil defense planning with the type of problems that would arise out of a mass nuclear attack on the U. S.

THE THIRD ANNUAL training exercise, scheduled for July 20-26, will enact on a nationwide stage some of the civil defense measures which would be taken if this nation were suddenly attacked by bombs, s and submarines capable of wiping out millions of persons and dozens of cities in a day.

Plans call for 76 cities, air bases and Atomic Energy Commission installations to be hit by 125 mythical nuclear bombs. These would include 39 hydrogen bombs rated as high as 5 million tons of TNT equivalent each. More than 30 Federal agencies will cooperate by evacuating key employees and operating from emergency sites. Coordinated by the Federal Civil Defense Administration, State and local CD organizations will carry out training exercises as if the attack were real.
