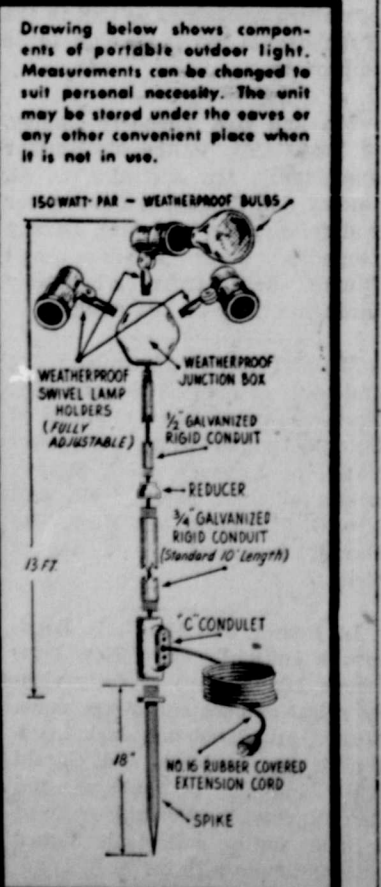

No Machine Yet Outstrips Man's Remarkable Brain

WASHINGTON—Can there be an artificial brain?
Perhaps, some day—at least on paper—but it will be far different from any of the marvelous machines now in existence, says Dr. D. M. MacKay of the University of London.
These machines may be perfected more and more to take over various functions now carried out by the brain—perhaps, as even now is the case, better than the brain itself. But the true model of the brain, Dr. MacKay says, must be constructed that it can grow, profit by its own experience, can make mistakes, and by the consequences of them be conditioned not to make them again, can even suffer mental breakdowns—in the same way and on the same principles as the human brain.
Already, Dr. MacKay believes, it is possible to design an artificial brain that will incorporate in itself patterns due to its own internal and external experiences. There is, in fact, one possible statistical model which he thinks might usefully stand comparison with the human brain.
"The basic feature of this model," Dr. MacKay says, "is the ability to adjust the rules of its own activity according to the degree of success it attains. It does this not by throwing switches but by adjusting the relative probabilities of different patterns of activity. Its rules are grown statistically as a result of its own trials and errors."

West Europe's General Health Better Than Ever

NEW YORK—Western Europe's general health, as gauged by prevailing mortality and morbidity conditions as well as by the expectation of life, is better than ever before despite the relatively short period that has elapsed since the devastating days of World War II, when there was widespread privation of food, clothing, shelter and medical services.
A survey of data from the United Nations and other sources concluded by insurance statisticians show each of the countries studied has established a new minimum death rate during the postwar period.
The death rate in France, for example, fell from 13.5 per 1,000 in 1946 to 11.9 in 1954, as compared with 15 per 1,000 in the immediate prewar period. Similarly, in Italy the death rate was reduced from 12.1 to 9.0 per 1,000 between 1946 and 1954, which compared with an average of about 14 per 1,000 in 1937-39.
New low death rates were cited for Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Western Germany, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, England and Wales, and Finland. Correspondingly, many of these countries also reported new records for expectation of life.
The excellent postwar health record of Western Europe may reflect, in part, the weeding out of impaired lives during the war. But generally the gains have resulted mainly from such planned activities as the restoration, soon after the war, of medical, hospital, and public health services, and the subsequent expansion and improvement of these services.
Wide use of the recent advances in medicine, including the antibiotics and other drugs, and greatly increased food supply which has raised nutritional level of the population also have been important factors, it is noted.

Being Bright Pays Well in College

NEW BRUNSWICK—Does it pay to be bright in college?
"Consider the 'plight' of 37 young men in the freshman class at Rutgers University's men's colleges. Because they have exceptional talents and unusual foresight, these lads will spend an extra year in college.
Their intelligence will pay off in big dividends for they comprise the first full-scale class to enroll in Rutgers unique five-year program that leads to two degrees. Yes, two degrees! When they graduate in 1960—though they are at present members of the class of 1959—each will receive a degree of Bachelor of Science from the College of Engineering and a Bachelor of Arts degree from the College of Arts and Sciences.
The new Rutgers program is unique in that courses in the liberal arts and engineering fields are taken side by side through five years. Other institutions have somewhat similar programs, but they require a student to spend three years in a liberal arts college and then switch to engineering for two years.

Diamond-Studded Smog Investigator

LOS ANGELES—A balloon-borne "diamond-studded" device which etches meteorological data on a smoked glass plate is one of the latest instruments being used in smog studies.
Developed by Don T. Hilleary, UCLA meteorologist, the device is known as a meteorograph.

A map showing the actual journey of Columbus through the Bahamas is a feature of an exhibit at the U.S. National Museum, Smithsonian Institution, illustrating with original materials Indian life among the historic tribes of Latin America. Navy Won't Commission Any Male Nurses

WASHINGTON—There's a ditty about the soldier who wouldn't trade his "O.D.'s" for Navy "dun-garees" and the Navy says it won't follow the Army lead in giving commissions to male nurses. In the foreseeable future, the Navy indicates, it will continue to give commissions only to women in the Nurse Corps.
The Navy thus disagrees with the Army which started commissioning male nurses in accordance with a law sponsored by Rep. Frances P. Bolton, (R., Ohio).
A Navy spokesman pointed out that the Bolton law does not require it to put men into the Nurse Corps. Anyway, he added, the Navy has no need to hire male nurses to go into battlefield, as does the Army.

Motorist Wins Right To Drive 1926 Auto

HAGERSTOWN, Md.—A 63-year-old motorist defended and won the right to drive his 1926 Oakland, which he says will continue to operate until "it falls apart."
It started when the car ran through a red light. Patrolman H. M. Snyder said the brakes of the 29-year-old vehicle were inadequate. Owner John Luipersbeck said it wasn't so.
The policeman said he tested the brake pedal and it went clear to the floor. Luipersbeck said the Oakland had mechanical brakes and was not moving when the officer tested it.
Magistrate William Kreykenbohn ruled Snyder had made no case against the brakes of the car, which owner Luipersbeck fondly referred to as "part of my family now."
Luipersbeck didn't get off completely, however. He was fined \$15—for going through a red light.

Pose as Wife's Lover Brings Jail Sentence

READING, England—Four years in jail was the sentence for a married man, Montague Harris, 32, who posed as his wife's lover.
Harris admitted playing the dual role of husband and correspondent in an attempt to fake evidence so he could get a divorce and marry another woman.
He pleaded guilty to 10 charges of forgery and perjury arising out of the case.
Police said Harris hired another woman to play the part of his wife, donned a false mustache as the "correspondent" and went off to stay at a country hotel with her.
Later, without his real wife's knowing about it, he used to fake evidence to accuse her of "adultery." He got a divorce and remarried.

Drained Moonshine Trapped by Officer

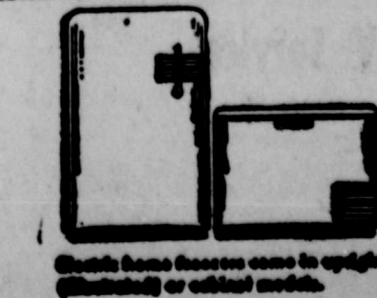
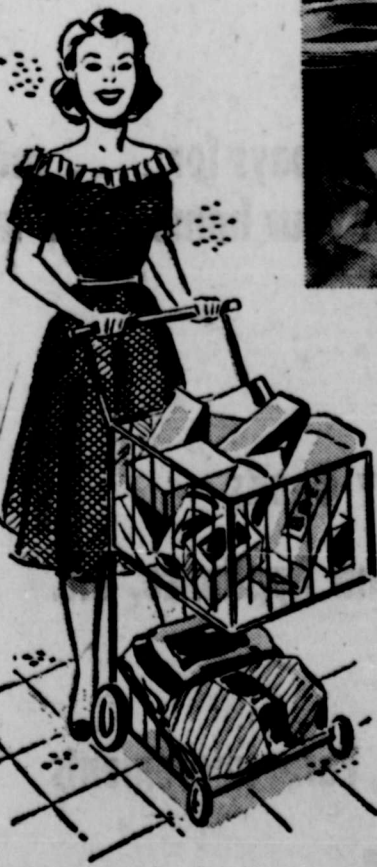

English Sailor Set Mark for Marathon Walkers

WASHINGTON—It wouldn't be too surprising if it happened in this day and age, but there is an often discredited story about an early English sailor who took a 3,000-mile walk from Mexico's Gulf coast to a point near what is now Saint John, New Brunswick, in Canada.

History shows that sometime late in 1586 more than 100 English seamen of the adventurer Sir John Hawkins went ashore near what is now Tampico, rather than starve afloat. A disastrous battle with the Spanish had left Hawkins' ship overloaded and short of food.

Only five of these men ever got back to England. One group of 75 men headed south and only two of this number eventually escaped from Spanish servitude. One after 14 years, the other after 23 years.

Three others, David Ingram, Richard Browne and Richard Twide, were among a smaller group of men who set out "northward." Most were killed by Indians or hardships. But 11 months later, Ingram related, three of them had reached a river mouth 60 leagues west of "Cape Britton"—Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia. There they found a ship, the French "Gargarine". By 1590 they were back in England.

There has been much controversy over whether Ingram really walked as far north as Saint John, but attempts have been made to prove that he and his companions must have crossed New England to describe the things Ingram related 13 years after their "long walk". It was not the first overland walk in America.

Homicide Rate At All-Time Low

NEW YORK — Despite reported increases in major crimes and juvenile delinquency, the homicide rate in the United States has fallen to an all-time low level, insurance company's statisticians report.

Among one company's industrial policyholders, whose experience closely parallels that of the country's general population, the homicide death rate dropped from 5.8 per 100,000 in 1934 to 1.9 in 1954. This downward trend was interrupted only twice during the twenty-year period—immediately after World War II, and to a lesser extent during the Korean War.

The long-term reduction in the homicide rate has been especially large among white male policyholders, amounting to 70 per cent over the two decades. Among white females the corresponding reduction was 60 per cent and among nonwhite persons it was about 55 per cent.

Despite the over-all improvement, homicide continues to be a major cause of death among nonwhite males. In the insurance experience homicide mortality among nonwhite males averaged 21.7 per 100,000 in 1952-54, or more than 11 times the rate for white males.

Detroit Teachers Use 'Punishment Code'

DETROIT—Public school teachers in Detroit can paddle junior where it hurts when he gets out of line.

In a 500-word policy statement, Superintendent of Schools Arthur Dondineau outlined a physical-punishment discipline code to be used with discretion as to "size, sex, and physical strength."

However, Dondineau said that any punishment given must not be such as to cause "lasting pain or injury."

Explaining the reason for the policy statement, Dondineau said: "We wanted to give teachers and principals an understanding as to how far they can expect the support of the administration in punishment problems. Now we think the teacher knows how far he will be protected if a complaint were made in court of his actions."

Sex Equality Gets Blame for Divorces

LONDON—A leading marriage counselor blames the growing equality of sexes for Britain's booming divorce rate, now about four times the 1939 level.

"It has really shaken the stability of marriage and family life," said Joseph Brayshaw, in the magazine Family Doctor.

"Women now do almost every job that men do. The plain truth is that the modern marriage partnership is much richer. It involves much greater tolerance. And in aiming higher in marriage today, we are suffering more casualties."

SIMPLE, INEXPENSIVE DEVICE OFFERS ROUND-THE-CLOCK PROTECTION FOR BABY CHICKS

Poultry raisers can now go to bed secure in the knowledge that the safety of their baby chicks is guarded by a new protective warning device which rings an alarm bell should there be a temporary interruption of the flow of electricity.

Brooding with electric heat lamps is recognized as

a superior method of providing life-giving heat to baby chicks, and this new warning device creates still another advantage to the use of electricity. Under no other brooding method can such protection be installed with such simplicity and with such inexpensive outlay of cash.

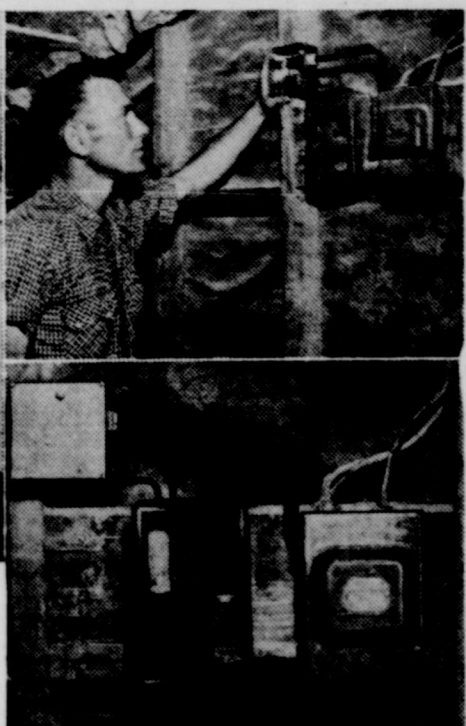
Here's how it works: The device pictured rings an alarm bell awakening the farmer who can then take measures to protect his baby chicks. Necessary to its operation is the self-contained

mechanism which trips the alarm bell, the bell, and two ordinary A batteries. In another device available, the bell is contained within the tripper housing. Regular electric wire of proper size must be used to connect these devices to the electric circuit. Chicken raisers who might wish to build their own alarm device can do so through the use of an electro-magnet which will "break" whenever current fails to flow through it, thereby triggering the alarm system.

Although LeRoy Hutton's brooder alarm is home made, when he saw the manufactured unit illustrated, his first words were, "Where can I buy one for my hens?" So impressed was he that he didn't even inquire as to the cost. However, the units are inexpensive and can be purchased for about \$10.00.



LeRoy Hutton raised 2,000 baby chicks under heat lamps with an automatic alarm unit. An overloaded circuit in the brooder house caused a fuse to blow, thereby interrupting the flow of electricity and causing Mr. Hutton's alarm to sound off about 3:00 a.m. the first night that his heat lamps were connected. Now Hutton rests well at night, knowing that his alarm will warn him of trouble in the brooder house.



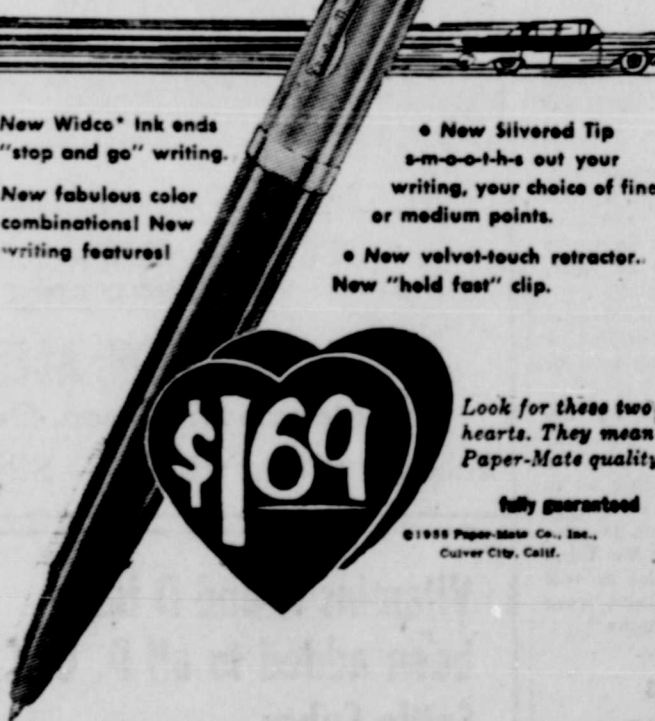
