## Silvertton Owls Win Over Kangaroos of Kress by 19-12 Score

After taking an early lead, the Owls of Silvertton had to come from behind to defeat the Kangaroos of Kress 19-12.

The first quarter was a wind blown affair with the wind in the Owls favor.

Robert Hill's kick off was returned to the 12 and the Silvertton line began its usual good game by forcing Kress to kick out. From the 37, C. L. Dunn passed to Jimmy Whitfill for the first down on the 27 yard line.

Kress was loaded for L. C., so Deleath Peugh was called on and he began his outstanding game plowing through, on and over the Kress line for a first down, and then from the four yard line for a touchdown. Brad Wilson's point after the touchdown was blocked.

The Owls almost scored twice more in the first quarter, but Deleath Peugh's hard runs were offset by penalties and fumbles. One especially good chance was set up by Robert Hill recovering a Kress fumble on Kress 22 yard line, but quarter ended 6-0.

Kress had the wind in the second quarter, but couldn't keep the ball. Bill Stephens, Owl's half-back (who weighs 148 after a large meal) combined with Deleath Peugh to ram the ball deep into Kress territory three times. In the second quarter, the Owls made eight first downs to the Kangaroos none. After Bill Stephens made three first downs to put the ball on Kress 18 with one minute to play it appeared the Owls might score but with 19 seconds to play they were back on their own 48 yard line with second down and 40 to go.

As time ran out C. L. passed to Robert Hill for 35 yards, but Robert was caught from behind on Kress's 15. First half ended 6-0.

The third quarter was one of those quarters one would like to forget. Robert Hill kicked short to Kress's 38th but the Owls lost Bill Stephens on a shakeup. The Owl line held and then had to kick. C. L. Dunn made a kick. C. L. Dunn made a first on the 45 but a cut over his left eye forced him to retire. Silvertton fumbled on the 42 and C. A. Rousser, Kress half back, slipped through the Owl line and went to the Silvertton six where Bill Baird caught him from behind. But after being stopped twice, Lanny Johnson scored but the extra point failed. On the ensuing kickoff Silvertton fumbled on their own 42 and a fast pass to C. A. Rousser made the score 12-6 in favor of Kress.

Bill Stephens and C. L. Dunn returned to the game as Norman Chitty carried kickoff back to 35 yard line. C. L. Dunn moved 20 yards to Kress 15 then Kress took over on downs. On the first play Jim Marshall pounced on a Kress fumble on the 43. The shot next must have helped Bill Stephens, because he went 43 yards for a touchdown to tie score 12-12. Deleath Peugh moved three Kangaroos back into the end zone for point after to make the score 13-12 with 4 left.

Kress took the wind in the fourth and from their own 35 tried a passing attack. But with Sam Turner and Jim Marshall breathing down their necks, the passes were inaccurate and Tootie Alexander intercepted and almost got away but was stopped on the 22 yard line. Bill Stephens went to the five yard line but a penalty moved Silvertton back to their own 40 and Kress took over a fumble on Silvertton's 48.

Kress had the ball for one play. As Jim Marshall forced the quarterback to lateral hurriedly, big Sam Turner recovered on Silvertton's 40.

## Silvertton Received 1-2 Inch of Rain on Monday Night

Rain Monday night gave Silvertton one-half inch of moisture, which fell in a very short time. Farmers around report from a trace to as much as an inch in some places. A. P. Dickenson said he received one inch. Light showers were reported at Flomot, Turkey and Quitaque. More than an inch was reported across Cloud crossing. The report did not give how large an area it covered in that part of the county.

## Reappraisal of Roughage Program To be Made in Texas

The volume of approved applications for assistance under the Texas Emergency Roughage program has exceeded the estimates of demand made when this program was negotiated so it is necessary to reappraise the actual cash requirements.

The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allan Shivers provides for an allocation of one million dollars of federal funds for the roughage program. Funds available to the U. S. Department of Agriculture to finance roughage programs must be allocated among all disaster designated states where such a program is needed.

Mr. Walter T. McKay, Texas State Director of Farmers Home Administration, has been instructed by K. L. Scott, director of credit services, U. S. Department of Agriculture, to immediately instruct all FHA County Offices in the designated areas to withhold further approvals of roughage purchase certificates. The County Offices are authorized to continue to accept and hold on file applications for assistance under this roughage program, but are instructed to take no action on these applications and to make daily reports on the tonnage requirements covered by such applications to Mr. McKay's office.

Mr. McKay has been asked to solicit the assistance of the Texas PSDA Drought Committee and the Office of the Governor in making a careful reappraisal of the demand for assistance under this Emergency Roughage program including financial requirements.

Mr. Scott stated that in keeping with the policies and the desires of Secretary Benson, the Department will continue to work closely with Governor Shivers and leaders in the State and give all assistance possible within the authority and funds available to the Department in providing assistance to drought stricken farmers and ranchers in Texas.

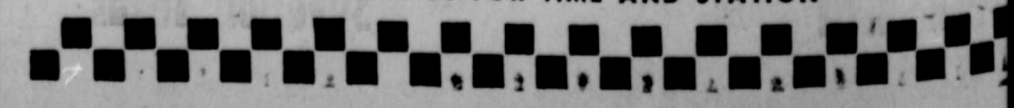

## Reappraisal of Roughage Program to be Made in Texas

The volume of approved applications for assistance under the Texas Emergency Roughage program has exceeded the estimates of demand made when this program was negotiated so it is necessary to reappraise the actual cash requirements.

The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allan Shivers provides for an allocation of one million dollars of federal funds for the roughage program. Funds available to the U. S. Department of Agriculture to finance roughage programs must be allocated among all disaster designated states where such a program is needed.

Mr. McKay, Texas State Director of Farmers Home Administration, has been instructed by K. L. Scott, director of credit services, U. S. Department of Agriculture, to immediately instruct all FHA County Offices in the designated areas to withhold further approvals of roughage purchase certificates. The County Offices are authorized to continue to accept and hold on file applications for assistance under this roughage program, but are instructed to take no action on these applications and to make daily reports on the tonnage requirements covered by such applications to Mr. McKay's office.

Mr. McKay has been asked to solicit the assistance of the Texas PSDA Drought Committee and the Office of the Governor in making a careful reappraisal of the demand for assistance under this Emergency Roughage program including financial requirements.

Mr. Scott stated that in keeping with the policies and the desires of Secretary Benson, the Department will continue to work closely with Governor Shivers and leaders in the State and give all assistance possible within the authority and funds available to the Department in providing assistance to drought stricken farmers and ranchers in Texas.

### Kenny Foundation Broadens Work In Treatment, Research Fields

Minneapolis, Minn.—Scientists, professors and department heads of leading medical schools across the country are cooperating in the expanding medical program of the Elizabeth Kenny foundation, according to Marvin L. Kline, national executive director.

The program, he explained, includes medical research, and the sponsoring of fellows and medical seminars and scholarship grants. The medical research program which the Kenny foundation is sponsoring at its own treatment centers and a number of universities across the country is not limited to the field of polio, but includes other neuromuscular disorders of various kinds, he asserted.

"Included on the medical advisory committee and planning committee set up by the Kenny foundation to help provide greater service," Kline said, "are doctors who are affiliated with the various departments of the following schools:

"University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minn.; Stanford university, Palo Alto, Calif.; University of California, Los Angeles, Calif.; New York university, New York City, N.Y.; Columbia university, New York City, N.Y.; Ohio State university, Columbus, Ohio; Baylor university (hospital), Dallas, Texas; Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn.; College of Medical Evangelists, Los Angeles, Calif.; McGill university, Montreal, Canada; Washington university, St. Louis, Mo.; University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wis.; University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Mich.; University of Illinois, Urbana, Ill.; Herman hospital, Houston, Texas, and Marquette university, Milwaukee, Wis.

### Stork Deliveries To Hospitals Are On Great Upswing

New York—If you're a prospective parent, you'll welcome the news that more and more children are being born in hospitals.

In the past few years the number has exceeded 3,500,000 annually; in 1952, the last year for which official data are available, about 3,530,000 or better than 9 out of every 10 births were delivered in hospitals, and there is definite evidence that the proportion has risen appreciably since then. The proportion of hospitalized births in the white population increased from 59.9 to 95.7 per cent between 1940 and 1952, and among the non-whites from 26.7 to 66.4 per cent.

A percentage-wise gain in hospitalized confinements is evident throughout the country, and is especially noteworthy in areas which in the past had the lowest proportion of hospital deliveries. Thus, in the white population of Kentucky the proportion rose from 18.7 to 80.4 per cent between 1940 and 1952; in West Virginia the rise was from 20.2 to 83.2 per cent; and in Arkansas from 21.5 to 88.1 per cent.

Geographic differences in the proportion of hospitalized births have narrowed a great deal, but there is still appreciable variation from one state to another, particularly for the nonwhite population.

### Mistletoe, Traps Catch Wild Deer

HOPLAND, Calif.—Mistletoe and rat traps are helping University of California researchers study deer-sheep relationships at the range research station in Mendocino County.

Mistletoe is used to bait traps to catch deer for two studies. Rat traps are part of the trapping mechanism devised to catch the deer.

Some of the deer are turned into pastures with sheep to study grazing competition and parasites common to both groups of animals. Other deer are earmarked—a few are also belled—to trace their movements on the natural range for more information on how far they wander for food and how long they live.

New types of traps are used. One is a small individual trap made of a pipe frame covered with tuna netting. The other is a larger, corral type made of a series of 8x8 board panels.

During July, August, and early September 78 deer were caught. Fifteen of them were retraps. One doe was caught five times, another three times. Two marked bucks have been taken by hunters.

### Like All Else—Price Of Brides Higher

WASHINGTON—The rising price of brides in the far corners of the world is turning young men's fancy into financial complications.

In Eastern Nigeria, says the National Geographic Society, buying a bride has become so expensive that a government committee proposes price control and rationing. Fifty years ago a tall comely 150 lb girl might cost \$50, and an ugly maid only three goats. Now a \$300 bride is a bargain.

In West Pakistan, soaring abductions of 13- to 16-year-old girls are blamed on high parental price tags. Suitors unable to pay resort to kidnapping.

Among many remote tribes, the bride price can be the biggest outlay of a man's life. Through the Bismarck Archipelago it may come to 15 to 200 strings of shell money. In Samoa it includes canoes and pigs.

A Basikuma swain, in the territory southeast of Lake Victoria, pays a first installment of 60 sheep. Then he must work for his bride's father for two years. A Banyoro pays with cattle as fast as he can, but any children born in the meantime belong to the father-in-law until each is paid for separately with a cow.

### Wrong Beam Almost Brings Air Visitor

KNOXVILLE—An Air Force pilot's complaint that he almost landed on the apron of a filling station brought city police to the grand opening of a new North Broadway service station.

The pilot complained that he mistook the searchlight's beam for a ceiling light at McGhee Tyson Air Force Base.

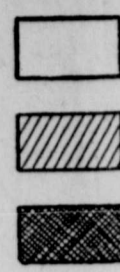
Ordered to put out the light, the station owner quickly obliged. "That's OK," he said. "I had more business than I could take care of anyway."

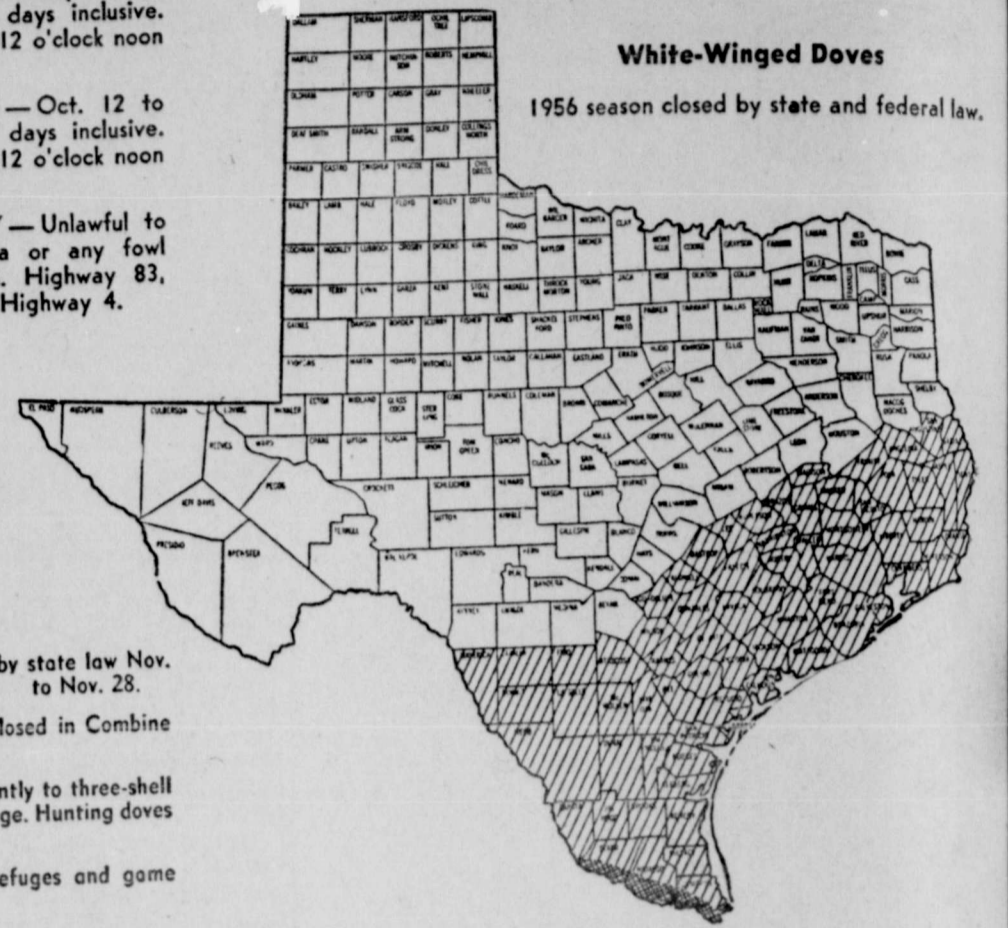
