The Bailey County proved a $\$ 500$ fund request by the Women's Protective Services (WPS) office of Lubbock on Monday in order that the office may continue to provide needed services in the Muleshoe area
During a meeting of the commissioner's court, Cheryl Cates, a representative of the Lubbock WPS office explained that the $\$ 500$ would be used to allow the office to continue coming to Muleshoe
PALs donate time to clean up the city
Nine Muleshoe High School students spent their day Sunday initating efforts to cleanup the city and make Muleshoe a more attractive place to live. Students enrolled in the Peer Assistance Leadership (PAL) program at Muleshoe High School, armed with trash bags and other clean-up tools, conquered a strip of land on Highway 84 , where they spent four hours picking up litter in that area
Under the sponsorship of Alice Liles, the students conducted the clean-up as a community service project which they are required to do through the PAL program.

has seen its funds cut by the state over the past few years. They also receive funding from the United Way of Lubbock and other organizations Bailey County Judge Marilyn Cox expressed sup
port for WPS saying, "This is the only service we have here in Muleshoe to help battered women and children. We see a lot here and I do appreciate this program.

WPS provides services to 12 counties and is asking the coun
ties it services to help with funding due to a decrease in their budget. Funding requests are based on the population of the city and number of people it provides services to in an area. Cates said the $\$ 500$ funding from the county will also be used to help provide legal assis tance to those in need as well as food and clothing when needed. Cates said that WPS served 15 clients in Muleshoe last year. But she stated, "The Muleshoe Police Department and Sheriff's Department responded to 50
