Douglas was born on November 8, 1937, at Ima, New Mexico, and moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Durwood O'Neal and his sisters to Briscoe County in early childhood. He attended the Silverton schools and was a graduate of the local high school. He had been a member of the Methodist church for nine years. He was married to Miss Sue Smith on September 22, 1956 and they spent their brief married life at their farm home west of Silverton, in the Rock Creek community.

Douglas was not musically inclined and was unable to participate in athletic activities and having lived on the farm all his life he was a natural agriculture student. In his junior year in high school he was awarded the Lone Star Farmer degree and was a member of the State Cattle Judging team; as a senior he was chosen as the outstanding agriculture student in the class and was a member of the State Livestock Judging team. He was currently an active member of the FFA and was working on his American Farmer degree.

Douglas had suffered most of his life from a rheumatic heart condition. He was taken to the Tulia hospital after having suffered such an attack. He died there at 10:00 p. m. on October 26. Survivors include his wife and parents and three sisters, Mrs. W. H. Martin, Silverton; and Mrs. E. W. Clifton and Mrs. Lewis Croft, Jr., of Tulia. Another survivor is his grandmother, Mrs. T. W. O'Neal, of Paducah.

Lyon, Jr., County Judge of Briscoe County, Texas, at Silverton, Texas, will be received at the office of the County Judge until ten o'clock a. m., on the 12th day of November, 1956, for the purchase of the following road machinery for the maintenance and improvement of the roads in and for said County, to-wit:

One Crawler type tractor, approximately 85 H. P. Equipped with Electric Starter, Hydraulic Dozer; and Hydraulic Scraper.

BIDDERS shall consider the following described machinery now owned by Briscoe County, to-wit:

One Used TD-18 International Tractor with Cable Dozer and Scraper for trade-in allowance in connection with their proposals for sale of the above described tractor.

SUCH PROPOSALS will at said time be publicly opened and read before the Commissioners' Court. A CERTIFIED CHECK, or CASHIER'S CHECK in the amount of five per cent (5%) of the amount of the bid, must accompany each bid.

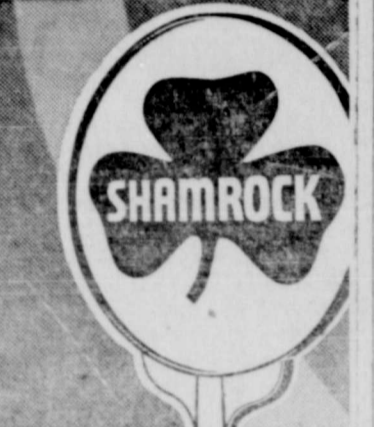
Hy-Lands Study Club

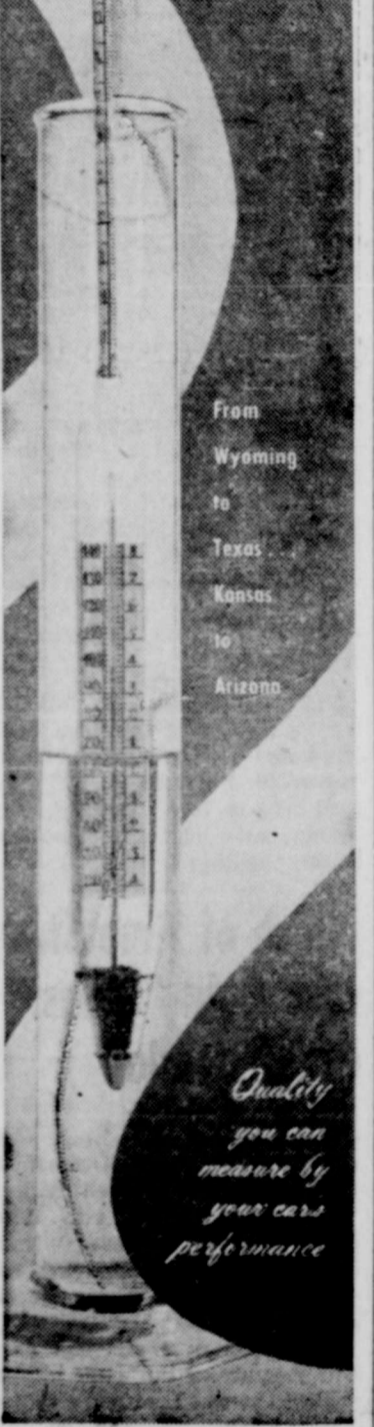

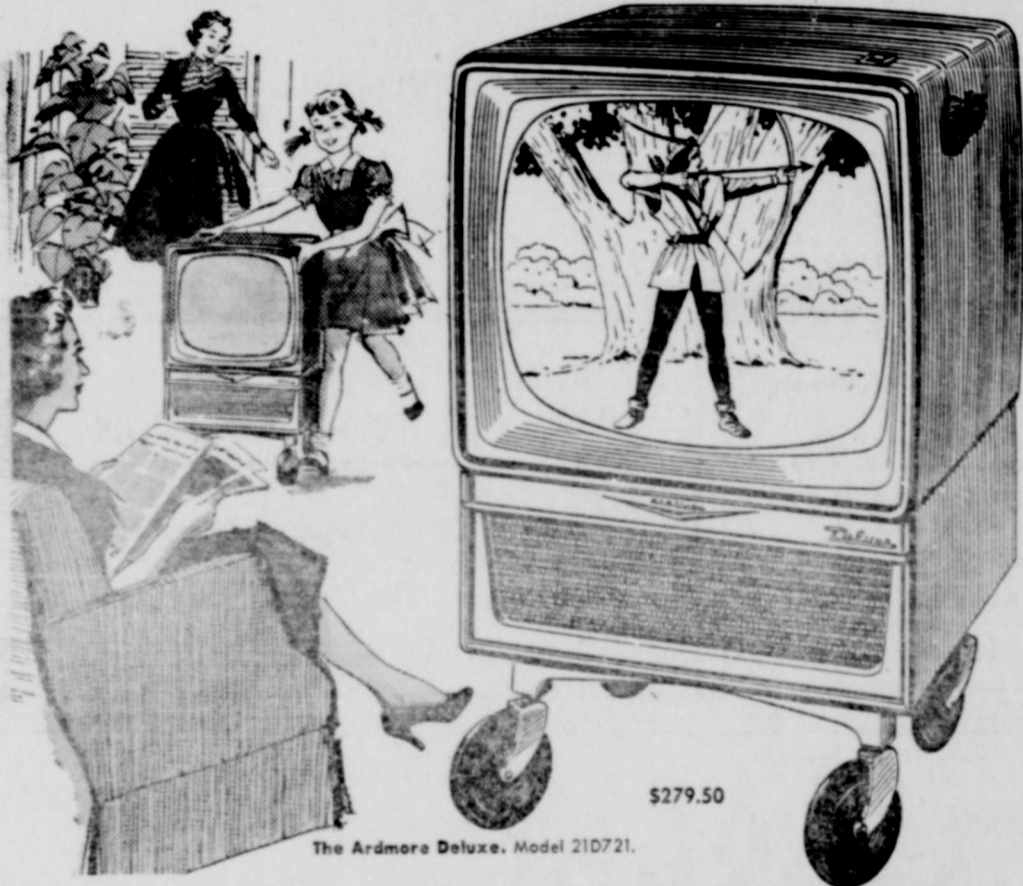
