TO WIDOWS OF VETERANS WHO DIED OF SERVICE-CONNECTED CAUSES BEFORE JAN. 1, 1957

Three of every five widows of veterans who died of service-connected causes before January 1, 1957, have failed to apply for the new increased dependents' compensation payments, Veterans Administration announced today.

Any of those widows who wish to receive the higher benefit must apply for the new compensation payments, even though they already are on VA rolls.

Application cards have been sent to 114,000 of these widows who may be eligible for increased payments, VA added.

With certain exceptions, applications received after July 1 will be effective as of the day they are received, VA emphasized.

The benefit will be paid at the monthly rate of \$112 plus 12 per cent of the basic monthly pay now being received by a serviceman whose rank and years of service are the same as those of the deceased veteran, VA pointed out.

Computing the benefit on the current military pay avoids inequities in the case of widows of veterans who died or were separated when military pay scales were lower than they are at present, VA explained.

Widows who make application for the new benefit, but who would receive more under old laws, will be advised by VA against the wrong choice of payment.

However, if a widow fails to apply for the new benefit, she will continue to receive death compensation at the same rate as in the past, even though she might be eligible for increased payments under the Survivor Benefits Act, VA said.

Advice about applying for the new benefit is available at any VA office.

Hall of Cattle Kings of Texas Goes to Texas Tech, Lubbock

The State Fair of Texas has given its Hall of Cattle Kings to Texas Tech.

The collection contains 53 photographic portraits of men who were outstanding leaders in establishing the Southwestern cattle industry.

The portraits have been hung in the Tech Agriculture Building. Originally they were exhibited at the Texas Centennial Exposition (1936). They were in the care of the Dallas Historical Association until their transfer to Tech.

Dr. W. L. Stangel, Tech agriculture dean, said the collection will be a permanent exhibit on the campus.

"Through the years we hope to add the portraits of representative leaders of the Southwestern cattle industry," he commented.

Acquisition of the Cattle Kings exhibit is another indication that Tech is a fast-growing center of information on ranching history. The institution's Southwest Collection contains one of the world's most extensive accumulations of ranching records.

Creation of the Hall of Cattle Kings was the idea of Dean Stangel, who was manager of the Centennial Exposition's Livestock Division.

The Hall was part of a large exhibit of representative Texas cattle brands and trail maps which Dean Stangel suggested. The late Gus L. Ford of the Tech history faculty headed research on the exhibit and the final assembly of it.

Persons instrumental in working out an agreement to transfer the Cattle Kings portraits to Tech include: Dr. Clifford B. Jones of Lubbock, Tech president emeritus; R. L. Thornton of Dallas, State Fair president; James H. Stewart of Dallas, State Fair executive vice-president and general manager; and Dr. and Mrs. Herbert P. Gambrell of Dallas representing the Dallas Historical Association.

This is the testing of beef cattle for the rate of gain for given age and weight. It is now fact that some cattle have the inherent ability to gain faster on less feed than others. These factors are always evident to the eye when making selections for replacement cattle. Mr. Cross is presently in charge of setting this work up in our section of the Country.

The last part of the program will be a discussion of a County steer program for 4-H and FFA Boys. This program that the Briscoe County Agent and Agriculture Teachers are trying to start is of great merit. A drylot feeding program that will be of size and scope that should interest every rancher that lets club boys feed calves will be presented. The past years program will demonstrate that. High feed cost and the low prices of fat cattle has had a marked affect on the feeding of club steers in this County as well as others. The past two years Briscoe County boys have competed successfully with all competition with commercially fed steers of the right quality. They include Grand and Reserve Champions at the County Show plus Reserve Champion at a District Show plus the top placing in both heavy and light weight classes.

This meeting will be of interest to a large group of people. A large crowd is expected.

JOINT NEWS RELEASE

Housewives employing a maid, cook or laundress and paying cash wages of \$50 or more in any calendar quarter, are required to withhold 2 1/4 per cent of their cash wages as social security tax. Previous to 1957 the tax was two per cent.

The employer then matches this amount and forwards the total to the District Director of Internal Revenue at the close of each quarter.

This announcement was made jointly here today by John R. Sanderson District Manager, Amarillo, Texas, Social Security Office and James Z. Pierce, Administrative officer in charge, Amarillo office, Internal Revenue Service.

The Revenue Official explained that the tax is paid to Internal Revenue Service on a simple, easy to use form called Form 942, which any Revenue Office can provide. He pointed out that such wages include payments in cash, check, or money order. Not included for domestic workers is the value of food, lodging or clothing. Cash payment for car fare is included, but not the cost of bus tokens.

According to Mr. Pierce, Form 942, showing name, social security number, wages paid and tax withheld from each household employee, should be completed and sent to Revenue's District Director within one month after the end of the calendar quarter. That's by April 30, for the January-March period.

Mr. Sanderson said that the law applies to such domestic workers as maids, cooks, waiters, butlers, housekeepers, governesses, valets, baby sitters, janitors, laundresses, furnace men, gardeners, and chauffeurs for private cars.
