## THREE ELECTIONS COMING UP NEXT WEEK

### April 6 is Date Set For Silverton School District Trustee Election

The Silverton Independent School District will hold a trustee election on April 6, 1957, at the legal voting places in the district as set out in the publication which is carried below.

All interested voters should bear the date in mind and cast their votes in the school trustee election. Remember, the school election is to be April 6.

The legal notice of the election reads as follows:

#### NOTICE FOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT TRUSTEE ELECTION

STATE OF TEXAS,  
COUNTY OF BRISCOE,

On this the 11 day of March, 1957, the Board of Trustees of Silverton Independent School District convened in Regular session with the following members present, to-wit:

Ware Fogerson, President; R. L. Carver, Monroe, Carroll Garrison, A. J. Rowell, Albert Mallow, and E. A. Birdwell, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS this school district has fewer than 500 scholars and is subject to the terms and provisions of Article 2746a; and

WHEREAS on the first Saturday in April, 1957, being April 6, 1957, a trustee election will be held in said School District for the purpose of electing 2 members to the Board of Trustees of said School District.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SILVERTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

That an election be held in said School District on April 6, 1957, for the purpose of electing 2 members to the Board of Trustees of said District.

That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and filed with the County Judge of the county in which this district is located at least ten days before the date of said election.

That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election, to-wit: County Court Building, in Silverton, Texas, in said School District with Mrs. Florence Fogerson Presiding Judge and Mrs. Rob London and Mrs. Carl Crow, Clerks.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the Election Code of this state, and the County Judge shall furnish, at the expense of the School District, all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding same shall make returns of the ballots thereof to the County Judge, who shall return the ballot boxes and other supplies of said election to the Commissioners' Court shall make the returns of said election and notify the candidates and this Board of Trustees of the results thereof.

A copy of this order shall serve notice of said election, and be filed in three different places in said School District, which posting shall be done not less than ten days prior to the date for said election.

### .28 of an Inch of Moisture Received Saturday and Sunday

During the worst tropical-like storm in years Silverton received .28 of an inch of moisture Saturday night and Sunday. Wind, blowing in the eighties and four ways at once done some damage to roofs, television property and plate glass windows.

Simpson Chevrolet Company lost a section of plate glass from their show room during the storm, other minor damage was reported in the county.

Some live stock has been reported dead from the storm, and others have strayed from their pastures during the cold high winds.

March has been an unusual season this year. More than an average of moisture has come, and at the same time excellent weather has prevailed the greater portion of the time. Moisture to date amounts to about 1.72 in Silverton; other sections of the county report slightly more.

### Car Owners Warned To Get Their Vehicles Inspected Early

Austin, March 27 (Special to the News)—Only two-thirds of the total number of vehicle owners in Texas have received their 1957 vehicle inspection stickers. Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said today. He warned against the last minute rush at inspection stations at the close of the inspection period April 15.

"Of the more than four million vehicle owners in Texas only about 2,500,000 have had their cars, trucks and other vehicles inspected, leaving more than 1,000,000 to act within the remaining three weeks."

The state police director reminded motorists of the impending deadline with a note of concern. He suggested that automobile owners visit a nearby inspection station now before inspection lines become long and they suffer an undue loss of time and effort.

### CAR-SCHOOL BUS ACCIDENT SENDS OSCAR WEAKS AND WIFE TO HOSPITAL

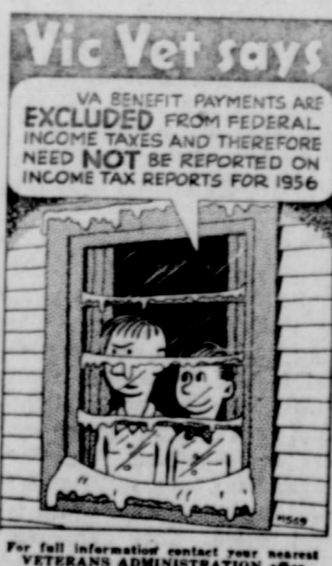
