Book Position Affects Reading

CHICAGO-The position in which a book or paper is held is a significant factor in reading efficiency. Recent tests have proved that the angle of the printed text has considerable effect upon both speed of reading and visibility of words.

A group of 300 university sopho mores acted as subjects, from 31 to 75 participating in each of the different tests. A head rest kept their eyes at a distance of 17 inches from the reading copy, and a special reading stand held the copy in various positions, from the vertical to a slope of 30 degrees below the horizontal. Some of the text was in 10-point type, and some in eight-

Both sides of type were read most quickly over five-minute periods when the copy was held at a slant of 45 degrees from the vertical (that is, perpendicular to the reader's line of vision). The 10-

point type was read 5.7 per cent more slowly when lying flat on the table, 8.8 per cent more slowly when slanted 10 degrees below the horizontal and 17.1 per cent more slowly when slanted 30 degrees below the horizontal. The eight-point type was read 8.7 per cent more slowly (than at 45 degrees) when lying flat on the table, 7.6 per cent more slowly when at -10 degrees, and 14.8 per cent more slowly at

3-Horned Chameleon Fantastic Animal

WASHINGTON - One of earth's most fantastic animals is the three-borned chameleon of East Africa, recently added to the reptile collections of the Smithsonian

It is sometimes described as a replica, in miniature, of the ancient monster dinosaur Triceratops, which has been extinct for about 75,000,000 years. The two, of course, are in no direct way re-

The three-horned chameleon grows to a length exceeding twelve inches. The curious horns, an inch to an inch and a half long, protrude from the nose and between the eyes of the males. Females are hornless.

These chameleons are extremely pugnacious and sometimes use eir horns in fights to the finish. At times the contests develop into tedious pushing matches, with the horns interlocked. At other times, a really vigorous fighter will dis-pose of a weaker adversary in a few minutes.

PINECREST, N.C. - Your taste for fatty foods may have been burned to a crisp by Dr. Harvey Estes, associate in medicine at Duke University Medical School, who told a medical meeting that coronary heart disease and other atherosclerotic diseases are associated with too much fat in the

"In view of the high incidence of coronary heart disease in this country, there is a serious question as to whether a permanent reduction in the level of dietary fat should be advised for the population as a whele," he said.

CHICAGO—A sun-powered portable radio developed by a Chicago concern is said to operate satisfacterily, even on overcast days. The transistorized unit converts sun-light or artificial light into electri-city with a small attachment made of 32 silicone cells. At night the unit works on flashlight batteries.

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Matrimonial State Enjoying Greater Popularity Today

NEW YORK-One of opular states in the Union these days is the State of Matrimonywith more people getting married, and getting married at an earlier age in life. Currently about half the men who eventually marry do so before age 23; for women the median age at first marriage is about 20 years.

The total number of married people in the country's population has climbed to a record high of 81% million, which compares with 75 million in 1950, and 601/4 million

At present almost 70 per cent of the population at ages 15 and over is married, whereas for the decades prior to World War II the proportion was at most little more than 60 per cent, according to reports based largely on Bureau of Census data. The increase in the married proportion of the population has been considerably more since 1940 than in the preceding

Among men at ages 20-24 years the proportion married has almost doubled between 1940 and 1955increasing from 27 per cent to 51

New Source for Paper Industry

due of sugar cane that remains after crushing the stalks for juice -known as "bagasse" can help relieve this country's shortage of pulpwood for papermaking, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture. A paper mill in Louisiana is now producing 20,000 to 25,000 tons of newsprint annually from whole

Use of this sugar cane residue as a source of pulp for other papers is possible through a USDA separates bagasse fibers from pith, giving greater strength to the fiber for such use as fine bleached papers, stationery, and packaging materials. This "mechanochemical" process also makes possible greater yields of high-quality bagasse pulps at lower cost.

As far as physical properties are concerned, bagasse paper pulps are stronger in all but tearing resistance than softwood pulps produced by the acid sulfite process. Bagasse pulps are particularly suitable, Department researchers say, for blending with wood pulps to make a wide variety of paper

being returned. Tests run on older people playing a regular game and a "take-iteasy" game showed that the modifled game raised the pulse rate only a few points, while the regular game raised it 20 to 30 points.

Big-Billed Toucan Is Expert Fencer

WASHINGTON-Birds that hold fencing tournaments are the bigbilled toucans of Barro Colorado Island, Panama Canal Zone.

They fence with their formidable beaks but seem careful not to hurt one another. One scientist who studied Barro Colorado's bird life described the birds as follows:

"I saw fourteen toucans scattered about in a big leafless tree in the center of the jungle. They appeared to be fencing. They stood in one spot and fenced with their bills for a half minute or so, rested, and were at it again. Presently they flew off into the forest and then I noticed two others that had now begun to fence. Then one of these flew away and the remaining one picked a new opponent and fell to fencing again . .
