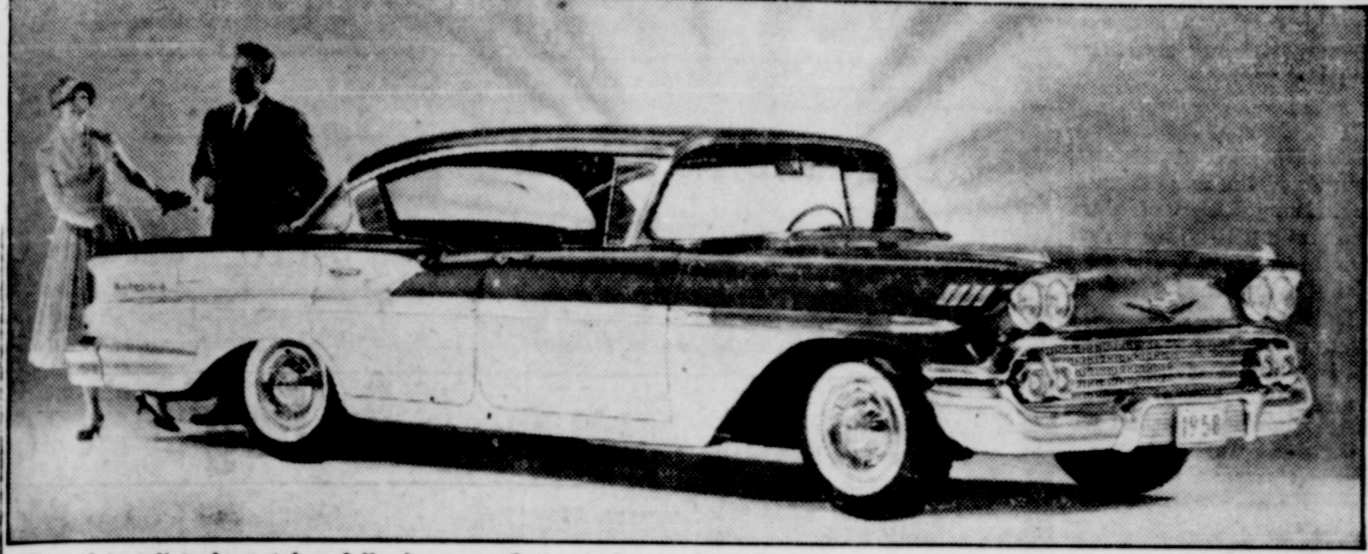

Change in Motor Vehicle Inspection is Announced

Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today a change in motor vehicle inspection regulations so as to no longer require the removal of a wheel in order to inspect the brakes of vehicles.

In an effort to prevent accidents which might occur due to brake failures, the department's earlier regulation had required that the wheel be removed for the principal purpose of determining the percentage of thickness of the remaining brake lining. Inspection stations found difficulty in making these inspections due to the fact that there was no accurate way of determining the original thickness and the decision in each case was left to the inspecting mechanic who had no satisfactory guide to follow.

The change in regulations, which resulted from action of the Public Safety Commission, does not affect the remainder of the inspection of brakes, which will still be required to have the performance ability required by statute.

High Plains Station Will Harvest Fifty Varieties of Sesame

Harvest of the 50 experimental varieties of sesame is under way at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas. Ten of these varieties are of the non-shattering type and forty are the semi-shattering. These varieties were cut and put on drying racks, when all but a few of the top leaves had fallen and the pods showed 75% maturity. After 10 to 14 days drying, the plants will be thrashed.

The outstanding plants in each experimental variety or strain are carefully selected for further development. Dr. Earl Collister, chairman of the plant science department of the Texas Research Foundation and Charles Julian, laboratory assistant selected these plants. Some of the experimental varieties showed unusually high yields, with longer pods and more seeds to the pod. Of unusual interest were varieties six feet tall producing large pods, three pods to the leaf axil. These were of both the semi-shattering and non-shattering varieties. Their further development will be watched with interest by sesame growers. Some of the imported varieties being tried out proved to be of no value and will be discarded. The ten acres of Renner 15 combine type, non-shattering seed production field will be harvested later.

The new experimental strains of sesame being tested at the High Plains Station have been developed at the Texas Research Foundation at Renner, Texas. This research program was initiated in 1947 in the program of new crop development for Texas farmers. Several hundred strains of sesame are received on a continuous basis from countries all over the world. In some areas sesame has been grown since about 2,000 B. C. These different types are observed very carefully in the test plots.

Those possessing desirable characteristics are used in the sesame breeding program.

Dr. Collister and his associates have already developed three varieties of sesame. The first variety, Renner No. 1, introduced in 1953 is still the most popular variety being grown in Texas, comprising about 95% of all commercial acreage of sesame. Another improved variety, Renner No. 2, was introduced in 1955. Both are semi-shattering types. The third variety, Renner No. 15, a paper shell non-shattering type, is being tested in large scale trials this year. Two of these are in the High Plains area. If these trials are successful, Renner No. 15, will be released to farmers in 1958.

Webster's new school and office at News Office.

Glynn H. Bunch, vocational agricultural teacher in Silvertown schools was charged Saturday with murder with malice in the Friday night shooting of his brother in law, Benjamin Wayne Bearden, 20, of Brownfield, and was released from sheriff's custody late Saturday evening on \$25,000 bond.

The shooting was reported by officers to have occurred on the highway about nine miles south of Silvertown.

The murder with malice charge, filed before Justice of the Peace Mrs. Bertha Pavlicek about 4:00 p. m. Saturday, climaxed an intensive investigation by Briscoe County authorities, Texas Rangers and other South Plains lawmen headed by District Attorney John Stapleton of Floydada.

Bunch refused to make a written statement when questioned by authorities, Stapleton said, but that he did tell several persons late Saturday that the shooting was an accident.

Authorities reported Bunch, the husband of Bearden's sister, and the victim were enroute to Silvertown in a Silvertown High School FFA pickup truck when the shooting occurred about nine miles south of Silvertown. Bunch stopped a car driven by Leo Fleming of Silvertown after the shooting, told Fleming that Bearden had been accidentally shot and asked for help in taking the victim to a hospital.

Fleming told officers that the pickup truck was parked facing toward Silvertown on the east side of State Highway 207 when he arrived. He said Bearden's body was lying beside the pickup. Fleming helped put the body in the covered bed of the truck and rode beside the body to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival about 8:30 p. m.

Sheriff Johnnie Lanham was summoned to the hospital immediately and found a 12 gauge semi-automatic shotgun in the pickup truck. Lanham called Capt. Raymond Waters of the Texas Rangers in Lubbock early Saturday morning and Waters assigned Rangers Jim Paulk of Lubbock and John Lynch of Memphis to the case.

Bearden's body was taken to the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock for an autopsy. He had been shot four times, with one shot entering below the left ear, coming out at the right ear, another shot entering at the base of the left shoulder, and another shot entering at the base of the neck on the right side and coming out at the rear of the skull. Other wounds were noted on both legs and one arm and it appeared the victim's skull had been crushed.

The men left Brownfield at 6:30 p. m. Friday with Bunch driving the pickup, Stapleton said.

Other officers assisting in the investigation were Ranger W. E. (Razz) Renfrow of Lubbock and Chief Deputy Sheriff, Bill Gordon, of Brownfield.

Mr. Bearden was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Bearden of near the Patricia community south of Lamesa. He was born in Martin county on March 1, 1937. He attended the Flower Grove School and was employed by the Halliburton Oil Company, of Brownfield. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Sunday at the Lamesa Methodist Church with Rev. Alvin Smith, pastor, officiating. Burial was made in Lamesa Cemetery.

Survivors in addition to his parents are his wife and a son, Bryan, of Brownfield; and two sisters, Mrs. Bunch of Silvertown and Mrs. Edna Curlee of Brownfield.
