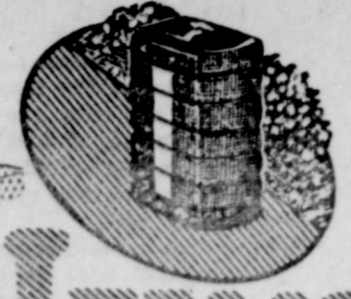

## Grand Jury Returns Indictment Against Glynn H. Bunch

The Briscoe County Grand Jury met in a called session last Thursday morning, October 31, 1957 for the purpose of investigating the death of Benjamin Wayne Bearden, of Brownfield, which occurred on Friday night, October 25, 1957 about nine miles south of Silvertown.

Glynn H. Bunch, brother-in-law of Bearden, had been charged with murder with malice in Justice Court on Saturday following the shooting Friday night which climaxed an intensive investigation by Briscoe County authorities, Texas Rangers and other South Plains lawmen headed by District Attorney John Stapleton of Floydada.

The grand jury spent most of Thursday and Friday hearing testimony of witnesses, who had been subpoenaed from Brownfield, Lamesa and Silvertown. Late Friday afternoon they returned an indictment charging Mr. Bunch with murder with malice. His bond was set at \$25,000.00, which he made following the grand jury report.

**Data of Findings of Research Program to Be Distributed**

Data on the results of the research program will be sent to all investors in the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas. Dr. Tom Longnecker, head of the station stated.

Since the Field Day in September, many inquiries have been received by members of the Regional Council and the Station staff regarding the availability of the results of the first year's research program. All professional workers including County agents, Soil Conservation Districts, Vocational Agricultural teachers, Texas Tech and Texas A & M Experiment Stations will also receive results. Research results will be released through the newspapers in the High Plains Area.

Due to the fall rains, harvest has been delayed here as it has throughout the Plains area. Preparation of research data for release will take considerable time following the late harvest. The results will therefore probably not be available until early in 1958.

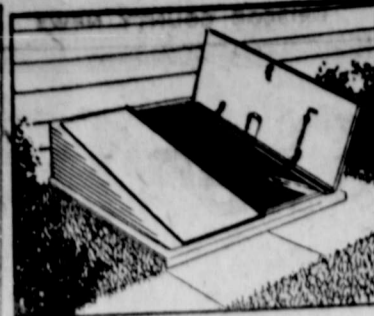

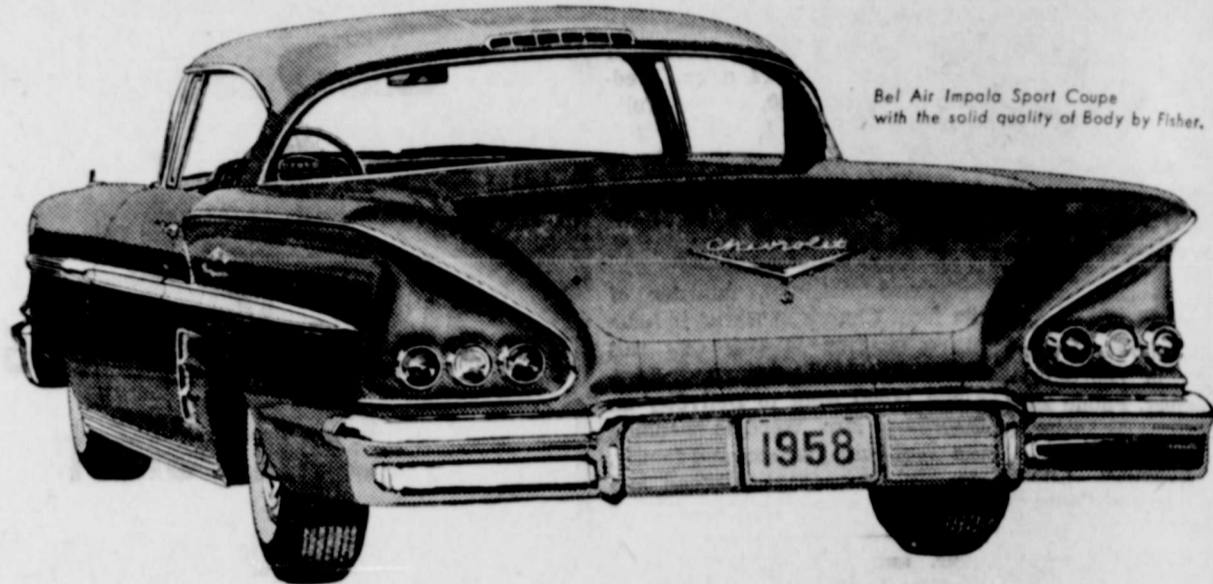

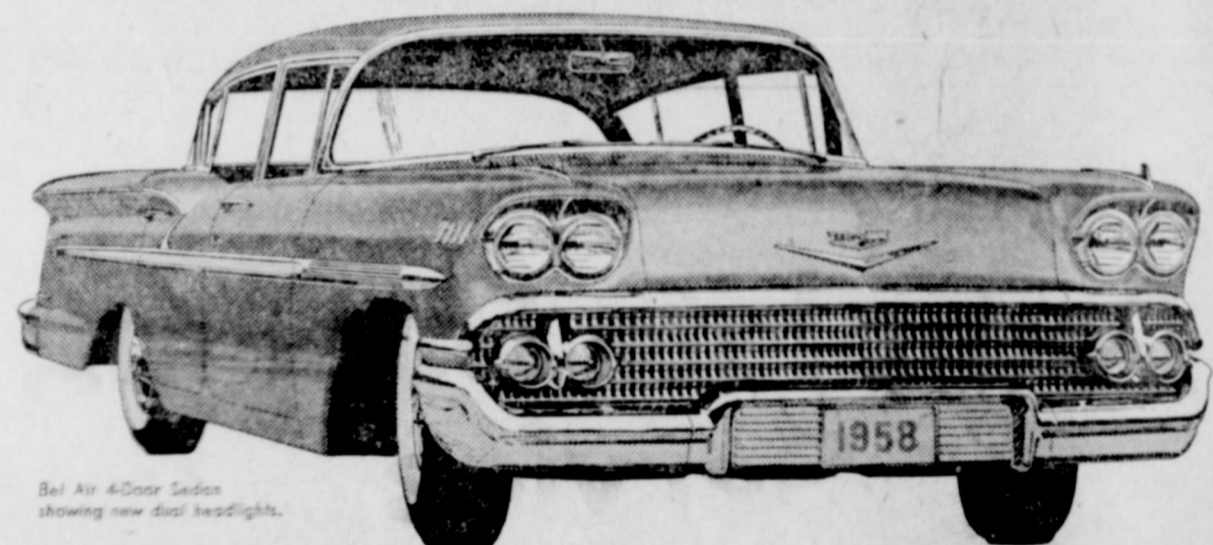
