He said, also, that it is a good idea to stock up on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. If you'd like to include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package, just add the appropriate First Class mail postage to the postage for the package itself; thus, insuring simultaneous arrival of your gift and greeting.

It goes to aid orphans and other needy children in the United States and overseas. Also, free clothing and bedding is distributed during disaster emergency situations. Every student has been given literature to take home explaining the purpose of the drive and asking the cooperation of parents and friends."

## Snow Covers County Followed by Hard Freeze Friday Night

The snowstorm which swept through the Panhandle and South Plains last Thursday reached Silvertown late in the afternoon moved on downstate Friday, leaving Briscoe County covered with approximately 3 1/2 inches of snow Friday morning. Measurements varied, in part of the south plains, but was general in this county.

## FARMERS COMBINE AT NIGHT

Several farmers took advantage of the hard freeze and run their combines in their maize fields as long as the ground would hold up their machinery. Little has been accomplished at night since Friday, as the weather moderated and the ground was too soft to run over. Every effort possible is being made to save the grain crop.

The grain that is harvested at night has a 16.75 per cent moisture content or a little less.

The Wilson Grain Company, said Farris Martin, are storing their grain under fans to keep it cool until their drying plant arrives and is installed ready to operate. They have purchased a Aeroglyde-Dryer which will handle 600 bushels of grain per hour and decrease the moisture content 5%. The drying will process the grain for market or loans is our understanding.

At the Harvest-Queen Grain Company Mr. Williamson said his company were shipping the grain to Plainview where they have a grain dryer, and processing will be carried out at their large plant there.

Men on the job at Silvertown Co-Op Elevator said they were not buying the extremely wet grain, but were open for regular business Saturday afternoon as the ground was slushy and covered with snow.

Among farmers bringing grain to town are: Joe Mercer, Leon Martin, Albert Burleson, Robert McPherson, Lanham and Harris, Bill Malone, Aubrey Rowell, Elbert May. Many others are taking advantage of the frozen ground to do their harvest and delivering their grain on the local market.

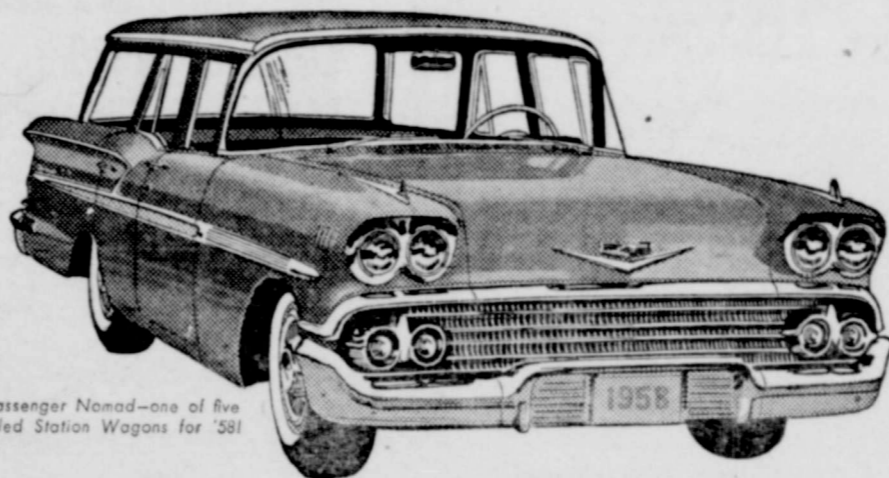

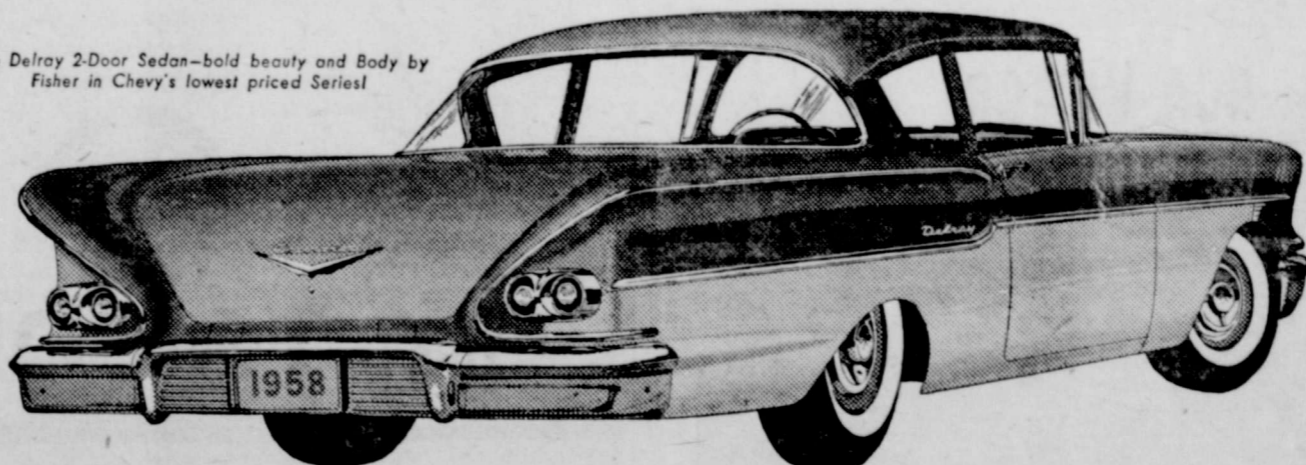

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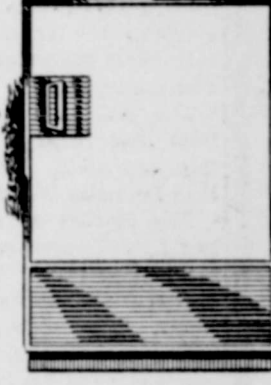
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
