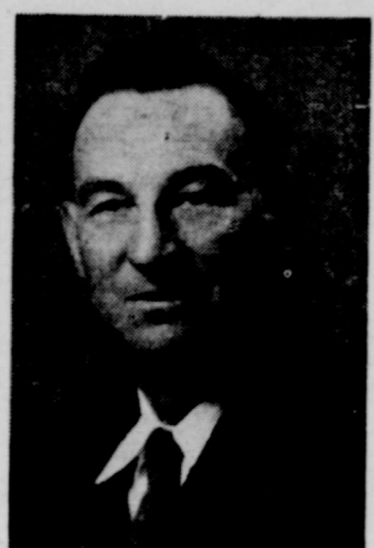
BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD MEETS MONDAY NIGHT, MARCH 3, AT THE BAPTIST CHURCH

Deadline to Register Motor Vehicles April 15, 1958; Remember!

Captain Alan Johnson, Service Commander of Motor Vehicle Inspection of Region No. 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that only 30 per cent of the registered vehicles in this region have been inspected to date for the year, 1958.

Captain Johnson pointed out that motorists are subject to a fine of one dollar (\$1.00) to two hundred dollars, (\$200.00), if they are apprehended operating a vehicle without a valid Safety Inspection sticker.

Richard Brock, Motor Vehicle Inspection Patrolman for Briscoe County, advised that out of 1720 vehicles registered in the county, only 380 have been inspected to date. This represents only 22 per cent of the total vehicles in this county required by State law to be inspected.

Brock stated four state approved Inspection Stations are located in Briscoe County and that motorists should have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible in order to avoid a last minute rush to meet the April 15 deadline.

St. Louis, Missouri—The American National Red Cross has spent a total of \$55,227.00 in Briscoe County, Texas, in relieving distress and suffering and in assisting families to resume a normal way of life. This figure was released today by Palmer Simpson, director of Disaster Service, Midwestern Area Office, American National Red Cross.

The largest portion of the money, according to the final breakdown released by Simpson, went for medical and nursing costs—\$24,055. Other needs met by the organization and accounting for large sums include—home furnishings, \$10,192; building and repair of structures hit by the tornado, \$8,540; occupational supplies and equipment where needed to provide sole income of affected families, \$3,819; food, clothing and maintenance, \$1,482; emergency mass care, \$900; and other needs which accounted for the balance of the total.

It is not unusual in a disaster of this type for the medical expense to be high. Because of death and serious injuries resulting, often times it necessitates Red Cross expenditures over a prolonged period of time, Simpson said. Although the public often thinks of Red Cross as providing emergency care, which is true, rebuilding and other operations termed "rehabilitation" usually account for about 80 percent of total costs to the organization.

It was pointed out that the assistance given by Red Cross at Silverton was an outright gift from the American people who have contributed to the organization across the country. "None of the money given to the Silverton Relief Fund was turned over to the Red Cross," Simpson stated.

The final Red Cross report show that 46 persons were injured at Silverton, in addition to the 20 killed, 30 homes were destroyed, and 42 homes were damaged.

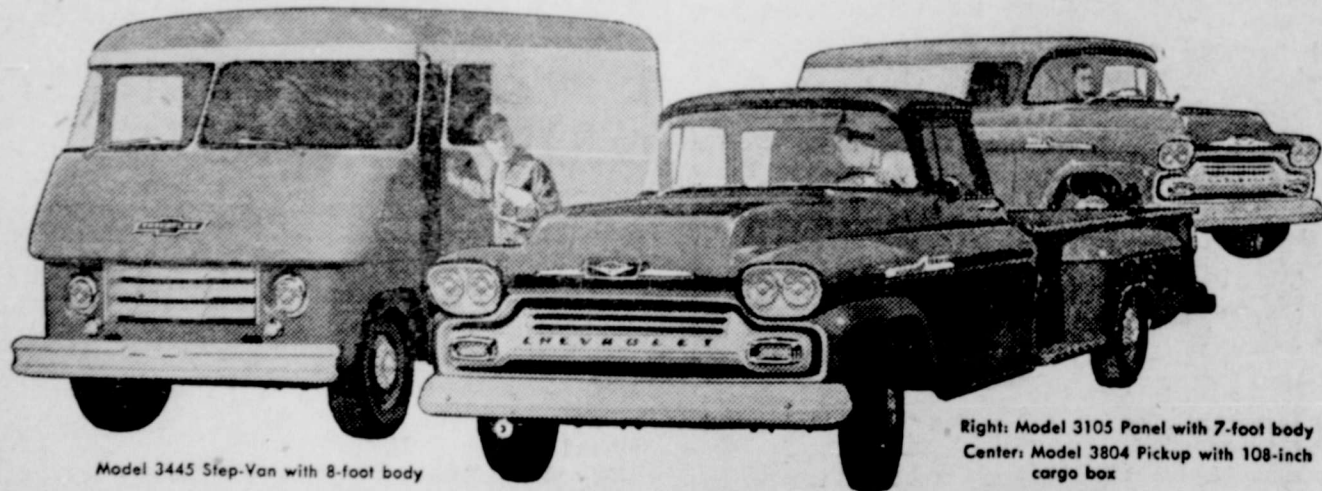

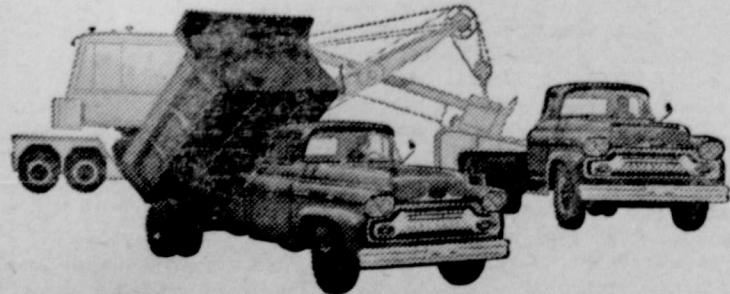
