Mr. and Mrs. Edward Younger, daughter, Ellen, arrived here last evening for a visit with Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Badgett. The Youngers are enroute to their home in Charlottesville, Virginia, after spending the past academic year in India, having gone in mid July of last year.

Younger was a Fulbright Professor of American Diplomatic History at Allahabad University in India; he taught American Diplomatic History and American Government at the University of Virginia. He also gave lectures on American foreign policy throughout India.

Mrs. Younger and Ellen accompanied Dr. Younger on most of his trips; they travelled 10,000 miles on Indian railroads to these lectures.

Mrs. Younger also gave talks to groups of girl students, usually on American Woman's place in society, mode of dress, etc.

Younger, who is ten, attended school; all other students are little Indian girls. She took in dancing and has learned regional Indian dances.

The Younger family left India on May 10; their first stop was in Bangkok, Thailand, where they spent some time. They spent a few days with friends at the University of Hong Kong. In Tokyo they stayed in a Japanese hotel and ate Japanese food, mostly fish. A day was enjoyed at Honolulu with friends at the University of Hawaii. In Los Angeles they had a real pleasure, enjoying clean customs, foods, etc. after being away for so long. They leave here on Saturday and Arkansas for a visit with Dr. Younger's relatives. They will return to Charlottesville, Virginia, a few days where Dr. Younger will resume his teaching of history at the University of Virginia May 1.

Rev. J. H. Burson, minister of the Church of Christ, officiated.

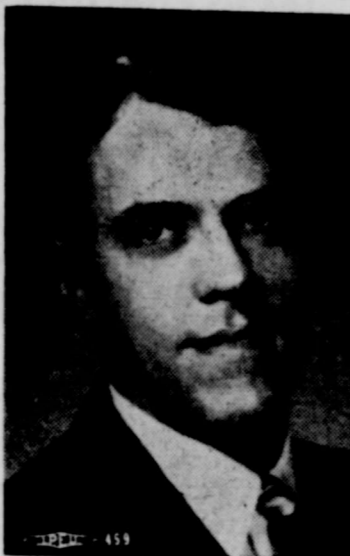

Texas Highway Department New Roadmap Ready

Austin, April 24—It's here! It's new! It's free! The Texas Highway Department today released the big new 1958 Official Highway Travel Map. Maps may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, Texas, or at the Highway District Offices and Travel Information Bureaus. County tax offices have map cards available for requesting copies of the map.

The Official Highway Travel Map is used by all state and governmental agencies in Texas for determining highway distances, mileages, zones, and like information. The same map is used by Texas tourists seeking roads to recreational and historical attractions throughout the state. The reverse side of the map reflects in full color some of the outstanding scenic and recreational facilities in Texas.

Texas' new 1958 travel map is the answer to today's demand for more and more travel information. The steady growth of Texas from a state with a population of slightly over seven million just ten years ago to its present estimated population of more than nine million is reflected by the information shown.

The number of cities and towns indicated on the 1948 map was 567. Today, there are 1,812—an increase of 1,245. State and U. S. highways have been increased by 2,026 miles, and farm-to-market roads from 620 miles to 17,126 miles—a 16,506-mile increase. The map reflects a total of 43,292 miles of highways.

Roadside parks, long cherished by Texas highway users, were not shown on the 1948 map. Today, 1,026 roadside parks are pinpointed as pleasant stopping places. Divided highways also show a startling jump in the ten-year period. In 1948 there were 110 miles of divided roads shown. Now there are 1,007 miles marked on the map with the black bands and red center indicating divided highway miles.

WE ARE STEWARDS OF THE LAND

The people of the earth should look upon the use of the land as a heritage. The soil should be cared for, so that it can be passed on to posterity in as good condition as it was received by the present generation.

A nation with fertile soil is a prosperous nation, because it is able to raise the food needed for its inhabitants. Many great nations have become second-rate powers because their soil was allowed to waste away, and not enough raw materials were produced. Consequently, their industries slowed down as the supplies dwindled.

As an example of a country's ability to keep its soil fertile, consider China, one of the oldest countries in the world. China has land which has been cultivated for hundreds of years and is still highly productive. It has been necessary to farm the land intensively in order to produce food for China's enormous population. The fertility of the land has been maintained, even under primitive conditions, by fertilization, erosion control, and irrigation.

In a few generations, Americans have squandered much of their fertile land by the careless cutting of forests, the plowing up of grasslands, and poor farming methods. If we are to continue as a great nation, we must conserve our natural resources, and thus, protect our soil.

Even damaged soil can be reclaimed by the use of conservation measures. Erosion control is probably needed most. Planting cover crops, applying organic matter, using commercial fertilizers, and rotating crops will help to build up the soil so that it will produce more food for our ever-increasing population. The soil is not ours to waste, but rather to hold in trust for those who come after us.

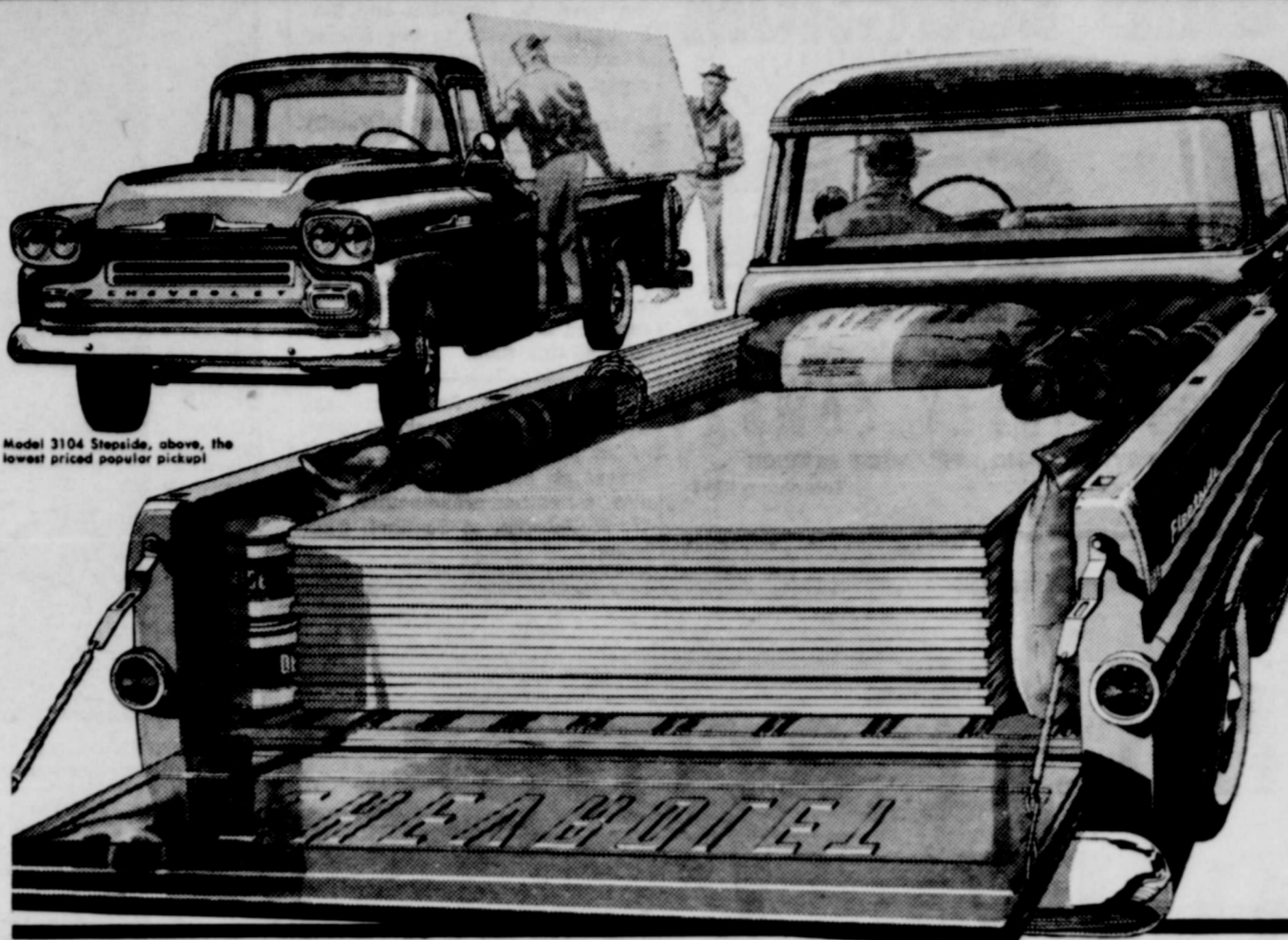
