Explained Herewith "Social security monthly retire-

ment benefits may be available to workers when they are still employed," Mr. John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo District Social Security stated today

Mr. Sanderson says that every man at age 65, and every woman at age 62 should be aware of the provisions of the law which determines whether one or more monthly checks are payable for the year. The application of these provisions is referred to as the Retirement Test.

Steps that might be followed are listed below

Varieties: If possible plant one of the later maturing varieties early. They will produce a heavier yield and a longer staple length than the quicker maturing ones. If it not possible to get a stand of these and the date is nearing June, switch to one of the earlier varieties as they will have more time to fully mature.

Planting should be as shallow as possible to get the seed in warm ground and off to a fast start. A press wheel should be used.

Irrigation should not begin be fore the plant has begun to bloon otherwise the plant will go into a vegetative growth and square set will be slowed down. Water should not be applied to cotton after the 25th of August. There are many instances of the late watering decreasing the yield as well as the grade.
