Leroy Saul Making District in Interest of Candidacy

Leroy Saul, Kress, has announced his candidacy for the State from the 30th Senatorial district.

The district includes Bailey, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Castro, Hall, Donley, Collingsworth, Childress, Armstrong, Hale, Briscoe and Floyd counties.

Mr. Saul, who has lived in Swisher and Clay Counties for the past 33 years, was a classroom teacher and administrator in Runningwater, Texas, for ten years. After moving to Kress 12 years ago, he was publisher of the Kress News and now owns a cleaning establishment there.

Mr. Saul was first elected to the Legislature in 1952. He served six years, being re-elected twice without an opponent. He has a lifelong undeviating demonstration of his six years in Austin, Texas, served as vice-chairman of the Water Resources Committee, and as one of two Texans appointed to the Council of State members special committee on policy and was chairman of the gubernatorial committee for the governor in 1957. He was chairman of the House Temperance Committee, Code of Ethics for the House, and was chairman of three temporary committees appointed by the Speaker in 1957. He served on the following committees since his election in 1952: Chairman, Conservation and Reclamation; Chairman, Rules; Vice-Chairman, Labor; member, agricultural member States Affairs, member, Appropriations; member, Transportation; member, Elections; member, Highways and Roads. Kent Creek Water Control and Improvement Dist. Approved

It was announced today by Judge J. W. Lyon, Jr., of Briscoe County that the Commissioners Court acted upon and approved the petition of the land owners within the Kent Creek watershed to form a water control and improvement district and to issue preliminary bonds as needed.

The Kent Creek watershed heads on the edge of the Cap Rock north west of Quitaque and continues in a southeasterly direction north of Quitaque and enters Quitaque Creek in Hall County. The district embodies some 23,000 acres.

In approving the petition for the District the Commissioners Court appointed the following owner's of land within the boundaries of the proposed district as directors: F. C. Benson, Bert Grundy, Glynn Morrison, James Branson, E. J. Hamilton, Quitaque, Texas.

It will be necessary for each director to establish bond which will be submitted to Judge Lyons for approval and be sworn into office as a director.

Newly appointed directors plan on submitting bonds by May 26, and organizing the board of directors and develop plans for holding a confirmation election within 30 days.

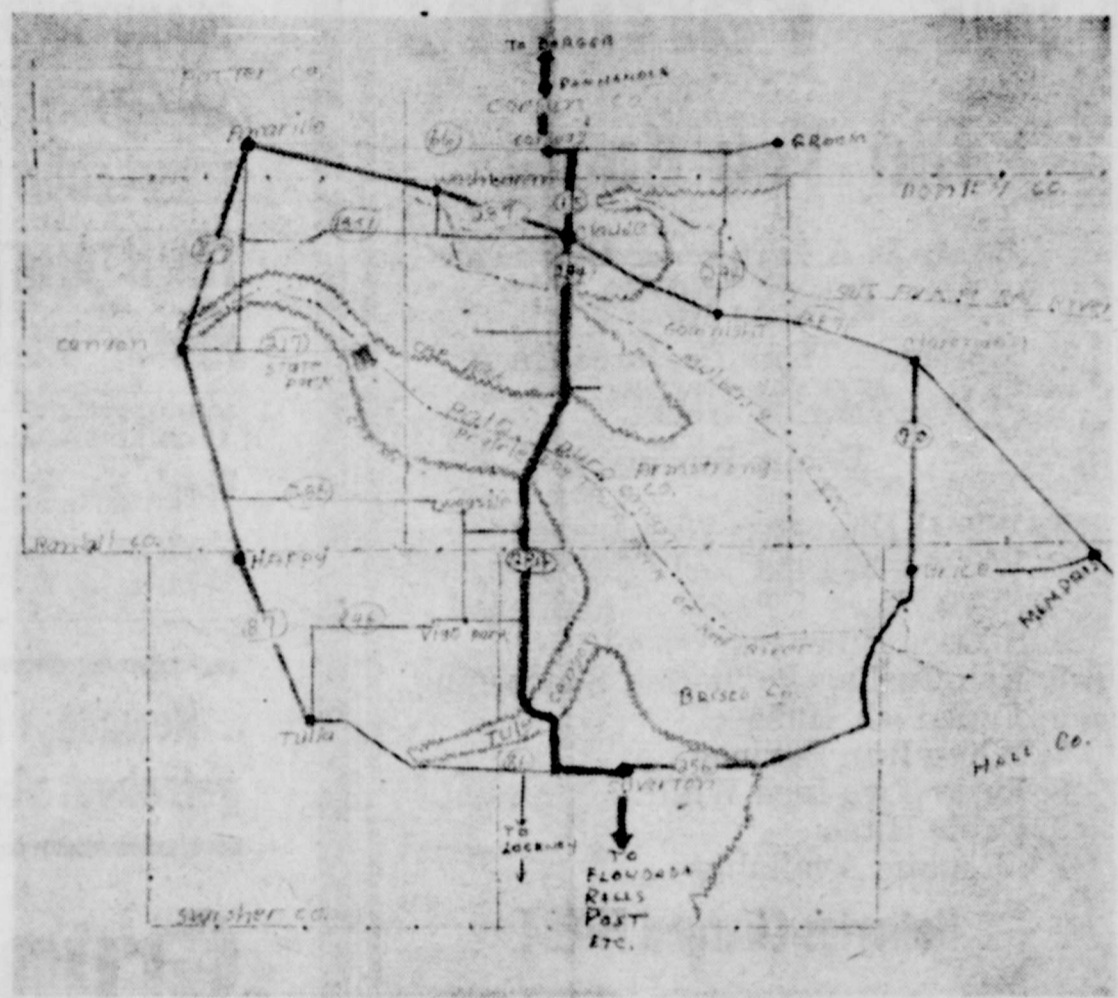

New Standards For Silvertown High School Announced For 58-59

Beginning next term, the standards of Silvertown High School will be raised to the following requirements:

Each student will be required to take four years English, three years Mathematics, two years Science (Laboratory science, Biology Chemistry or Physics), One unit in World History, One unit in American History, One unit in Civics and Driver Education.

Superintendent Moreland said he will offer in addition to the above required subjects, Vocational Agriculture (4 units), Homemaking (3 units), Bookkeeping, Shorthand, Typing (2 units), a total of 4 units of Mathematics, a total of four units of Science.

This is well above the minimum requirements as set by the State Board for accredited high schools. The State Board has set as the minimum course offering in an accredited high school, effective in September, 1959: four years of English, four years of Mathematics, four years of laboratory science, two and one half years of Social sciences, an adequate program of health and physical education, and enough electives courses to provide alternatives for pupils.

A comparison of our offering and the State required will show that we are meeting the requirements and just a little more.

Visitors to Texas Spend More and Stay Longer

Austin, Texas, May 21—Visitors to Texas spent more money and stayed around longer spending it in 1957 than during any previous year, so indicates the Tourist Industry Report released by the Texas Highway Department today.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, pointed to statistics in the report which show that expenditures per person per day jumped to \$8.22 in 1957, as compared to \$7.71 in 1956. "Moreover, the typical tourist extended his visit to 6.3 days in 1957, as against 5.9 days the previous year," Greer observed.

The report defined tourist dollars as new money earned elsewhere and brought into the community where it is then spent and respend into the local business cycle. Specifically, tourist dollars to the tune of \$531 million made music in Texas cash registers and jingled in the pockets of Texas jeans last year. This whopping amount was cleared from tourists traveling by automobile. Green pointed out that this was an impressive increase over 1956's intake of \$379 million. The report says that approximately \$89.9 million was spent also in 1957 by tourists visiting Texas by air, rail, bus, and ship.

Largest part of the tourist dollar in Texas is spent for food, lodging, and car upkeep. To serve those basic needs, the report estimates, 25,320 established businesses with 102,265 employees are required. The final figures are increased many times when the retail stores, amusement sport, gift shops, and other places where the remainder of the tourist dollar is spent are considered.

Tourists themselves provide the records from which the Highway Department obtains the statistics in the annual Tourist Industry Report, Greer remarked. Survey cards, to be completed and mailed back after the visit in Texas, are given tourists stopping at the Department's seven Highway Travel Information Bureaus located on main

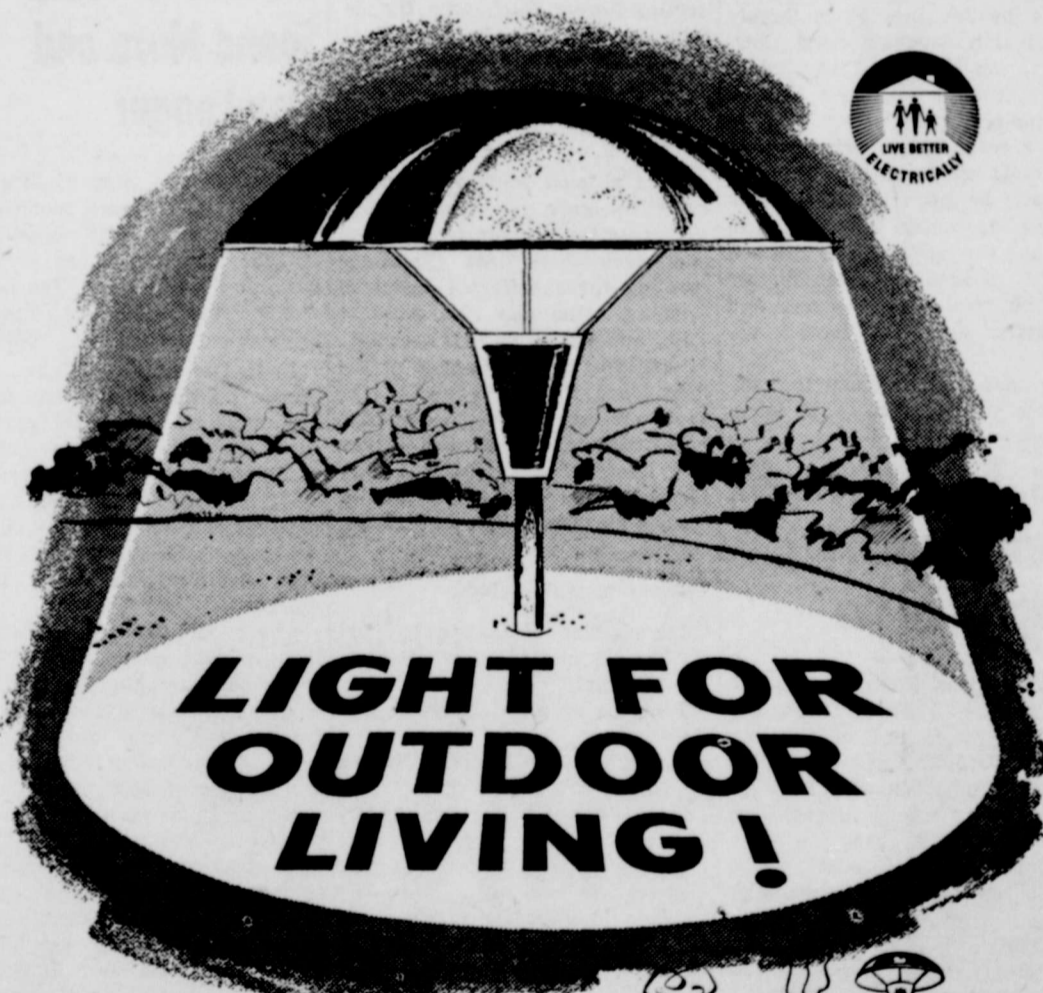

Of Interest to Disabled People

"June 30, 1958 is a very important date for many disabled people," John R. Sanderson, District Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, said today.

Many people who are disabled have already filed for disability insurance benefits under the provisions of the Social Security Act, Sanderson said. There may still be some who have not applied for benefits to which they may be entitled and if not applied for before June 30, 1958 deadline will lose them.

Workers, both men and women, who have been disabled for over a year have until June 30, 1958 to file application for the disability freeze or for disability benefits if they are 50 or older. Those who have been disabled for a prolonged period and wait until after June 30 may forfeit their rights to disability benefits at age 50, to old-age benefits, and to benefits for their survivors.

Sanderson pointed out that there is no deadline for those who file for a freeze within a year from the time they become disabled. The June 30, 1958, deadline applies only to those who have been disabled for a prolonged period and who file for a freeze, not disability payments after age 50.

In addition to being "disabled," a worker must have worked under social security for some time in order to be eligible for disability insurance benefits or to have his social security record frozen. A worker must have social security credit for work in 5 out of the 10 years before he became disabled, including a year and a half out of the 3 years before the disability began.

Sanderson pointed out that there is no benefit for temporarily disabled workers under the provisions of the Social Security Act.

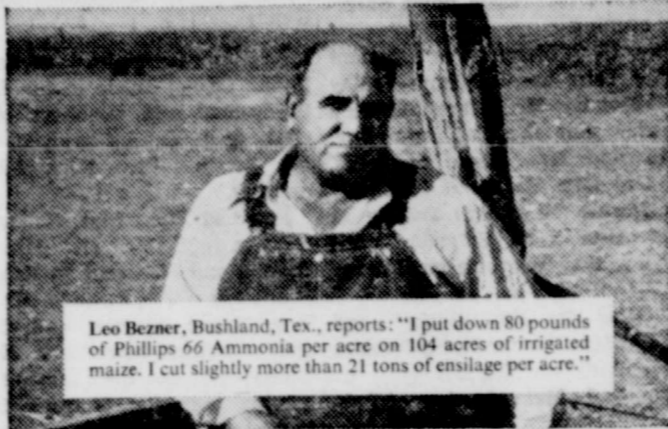
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
