LEROY SHIPMAN explained if a disabled person became entitled to a disability benefit of \$80 under the social security law and he was receiving \$60 a month from workmen's compensation it would reduce the amount priy on 6th Birthday of his social security disability benefit so that he would receive Wilma Beth to Marlow Wither-Irs. J. E. Minyard honored her only \$20 from social security.

> Sanderson at the same time pointed out that disability payments from private agencies do not reduce or affect the amount of the disability benefit. The reduction is made only for workmen's compensation payments and Mr. and Mrs. William Strange other than compensation paid by the Veterans Administration for service connected disabilities.

> If any eligible person has failed to file an application to establish do so at once. 
