Farmers Union Pres. Elaborates on Cotton Growing and Prices

Alex Dickie, Jr., president Texas Farmers Union, said today that he wanted to set the record straight on the stand taken by at least one farm organization in Texas for holding the price line on cotton to the producers. We in Texas Farmers Union are not in favor of sacrificing the price to the producers, and we intend to fight for an extension of the present minimum acreage now in effect for cotton to expire this due year.

Dickie stated that he agreed that cotton had to be in a competitive position with synthetics but that this did not have to be done at the expenses of cotton farmers. Cotton should be sold in the normal channels of trade both at home and abroad and if the price received by the producer is less than a parity of income price, then the difference should be made up by compensatory payments.

Attending National Guard Encampment Near Waco, Texas

Lieut. Pat L. Northcutt went to Amarillo Saturday afternoon to join a group of National Guardsmen from Amarillo, Tulia, Canyon and Borger which boarded a special train there Saturday evening to attend the 14-day Texas National Guard Encampment. The encampment, which will feature basic combat training maneuvers is being held at North Fort Hood, 40 miles southwest of Waco.

The special Burlington train left Amarillo at 8 p. m. Saturday evening. The guardsmen formed at the Burlington station at 7 p. m. with Col. Seldon Simpson commanding the 142nd Infantry Regiment.

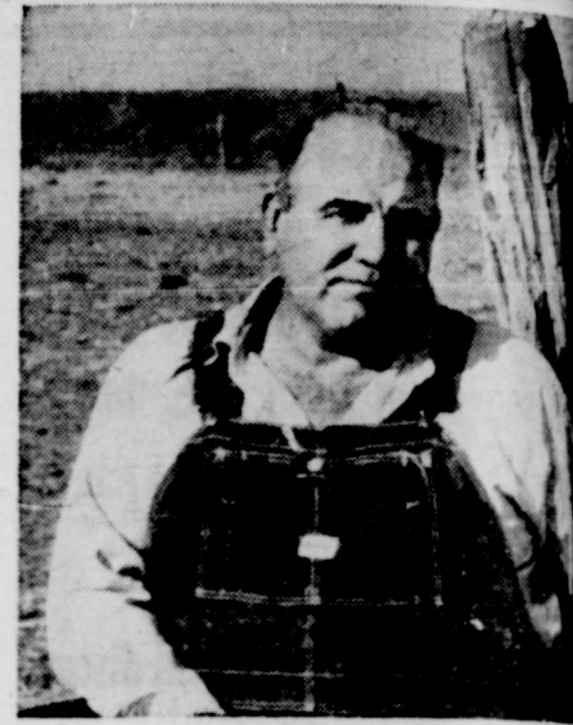

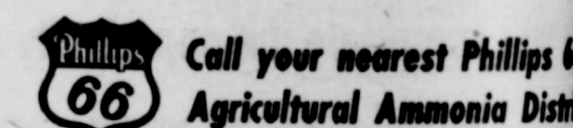
