Briscoe County's first 4-H dress review and baking contest was held Wednesday, August 13, 1958 at 3 p. m. in the Silverton Church of Christ.

The days activities began with the arrival of Mrs. Robin Taylor, Swisher County Home Demonstration agent at 10 a. m. Mrs. Taylor judged the record books, construction of blouses and skirts, and the garments modeled by the girls.

Mrs. Grady Martin acted as judge for the baking contest. Both she and Mrs. Taylor were assisted by Mrs. Buster Miller, who is to be home economics teacher in Silverton High School for the coming school year.

Twenty-three of the twenty-four girls who participated were present and modeled their 4-H shirts and blouses which they made as demonstrations in February. 12 girls who took clothing as their projects for this year modeled a skirt and two blouses each.

The highest possible score in the dress review was 125 points, 25 on records and 100 on garments. Blue ribbon awards were earned for a score range 115-125, red ribbon awards 105-114.

Blue ribbon awards in the senior division of the dress review were earned by Carolyn Garrison, Joyce Thomas and Sue Lanham. Red ribbon awards were earned by LaQuetta Chitty, Jimmie Nell Reynolds, Shelia Jarnagin and Sandra Mercer.

In the junior division of the dress review blue ribbons were earned by Glenna Sue Hill and Sherry May. Red ribbons by Raye Nell Garrison, Martha Mills and Jeanne Davis.

Carolyn Garrison had a score of 119 for the high score in the senior dress review and Sherry May and Glenna Sue Hill tied in the junior group with a score of 115 each.

Mrs. Robert M. Ledbetter acted as narrator of the dress review. The highest possible score in the baking contest was 200 points, 100 each for cookies and biscuits. Blue ribbon awards scored in the range of 170-185; red ribbon awards in the range of 155-169.

Blue ribbon awards in the senior division of the baking contest were earned by Jane Brooks, LaQuetta Chitty, and Ann Wingo. Red ribbon awards were earned by Joyce Thomas, Jimmie Nell Reynolds, Lou Brannon, and Sandra Mercer.

Jane Brooks placed first on a combined score of 185 on her biscuits and cookies; Jane made

highest score of 91 on the cookies, and LaQuetta Chitty tied with Jane on her biscuits, which scored 94.

Blue ribbon awards were given to the following Junior girls in the baking contest, Dianne Davis, Jealeta Eddleman, Mary Beth McWilliams, and Gale Whitfill. Gamelia Comer received a red ribbon. Dianne Davis placed first on a combined score of 183 on her biscuits and cookies, her cookies scored highest score 100 of both

junior and seniors. Gale Whitfill made high score on her biscuits in this division, score 91.

Mrs. Detton's Recipe for
APPLE STRUDEL

Beat one egg in cup. Fill cup with lukewarm water. Add 2 cups of flour (a good pint). Add a pinch of salt and mix well. Beat and knead (by picking up dough and throwing or hitting it on table) until white blisters appear. Divide into 4 parts and cover each. Let stand 2 hours. Roll and pull tissue-paper thin. Spread with sliced apples, sugar, cinnamon, butter and sour cream. Roll up - place in greased pan. Bake in moderate oven for one hour, basting with hot milk. Apple strudel may be frozen unbaked. After removing from freezer, bake, basting with hot milk. Bake slightly longer than one hour.
