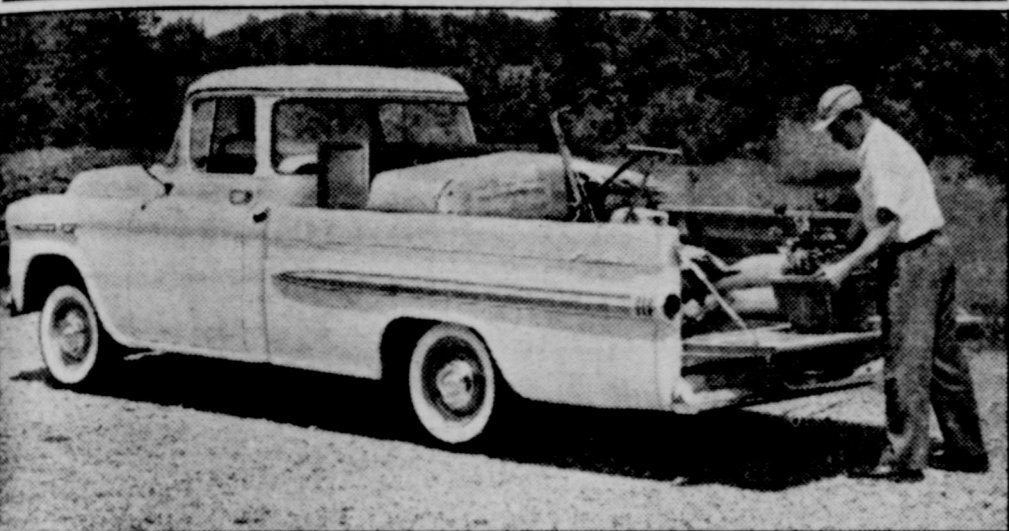

Chevrolet Task-Force 59 Trucks arrives. Simpson Chevrolet Company will be glad to show you the New might! New Models! New money-saving power in these new Chevrolet's '59 line.

Substantial fuel saving in the light-duty range, larger brakes on the half-ton series, a new optional power train for 14 heavy-duty models, and durability improvements from engines through axles are top developments in the expanded Chevrolet truck line for 1959.

The model lineup is increased to 139—three more than last year—on 22 different wheelbases. Gross vehicle weight ratings range from 4,000 to 36,000 pounds, with the sedan delivery increased to 4,900 pounds from 4,100. The 1959 line includes 96 conventional, 22 low-cab-forward, 8 forward-control, 6 tandem-axle, and 5 school bus chassis models in addition to the sedan delivery and a new luxury pickup to be announced later.

Generally, the popular, massive, functional styling of 1958 is retained, with a new two-tone pattern for Fleetside pickups. Cab interiors are restyled with a wider choice of brighter trim available.

Light-duty feature for 1959 is a six-cylinder engine of improved design which has shown substantially better gas mileage in on-the-job tests. Fuel savings, plus an increase in torque at low and medium speeds, comes from a camshaft design that reduces loss of fresh fuel mixture during the combustion cycle. On the half-ton models even further fuel economy is attained from a special carburetor-rear axle combination, optional with the economy six.

Rear brake shoes and linings are widened on 1959 half-ton units to provide 167½ square inches of braking surface—an increase of 10½ square inches. The new brake design also assures better cooling.

More load space is furnished on ¾-ton stake models with a longer rack body which measures 98 inches on the inside or seven inches more than last year.

The new optional power train for 14 of the 70 and 80 Series 2½ ton trucks results in up to 12 per cent greater pulling power and greater efficiency in a wide range of hauling operations. Teamed together are a 185-horsepower 348 cubic inch V8, heavier clutch, a close ratio five-speed or Powermatic transmission, and a 16,000-pound single or a 30,000-pound tandem rear suspension.

Added to Chevrolet optional offerings this year is a manual five-speed close ratio transmission. Its closely stepped shift pattern gives top performance in highway hauling.

Including the economical six, Chevrolet truck power plants for 1959 total nine—three sixes and six V8s. In addition to the two new close-ratio five speed units, there are seven other manual and automatic transmissions.

Among important mechanical revisions contributing to durability and performance in Chevy's 1959 trucks are:

A new thermostatically-controlled by-pass cooling system for all heavy-duty truck engines, providing a more rapid warmup, uniform temperature distribution, and constant circulation.

Greater driveline efficiency and reduced wear with a design that affords maximum protection against water, dust and other foreign matter.

## City Council Met In Regular Session on October 6, 1958

The City Council of the City of Silverton, Texas met at 8:00 p. m. on this 6th day of October, 1958 for their regular meeting.

Mayor Redin brought to the Councilmen's attention that they should vote for or against the holding of a Bond Election to build a swimming pool. After discussing the matter for some time, the City Council voted against holding an election for the issuance of bonds to construct a swimming pool. The reason the City Council voted against the swimming pool at this time is because they feel that the City is going to have to extend their 6" water and sewer mains within the very near future and that the City is not able to do both.

A petition was presented to the City Council by a group of citizens who wanted the City Council to call an election for the purpose of zones for livestock maintenance and control within certain zones of the City Limits. Mayor Redin ordered the election to be held on the 1st Tuesday of November, which would be November 4, 1958, and said election will be held at the City Hall. The qualified voters of the City of Silverton will either vote for or against livestock control within the City Limits.

The City Secretary, Fred A. Strange, contacted Mr. Bill McMorris, the City Engineer for the City of Silverton, about the paving project that the City had planned to do starting October 6, 1958. Mr. McMorris said that it was too late to start a paving project this year. He explained that the asphalt would not take the gravel as good this time of the year due to the cold weather and suggested the City wait until next spring to do this paving. The City Council therefore postponed the paving project until next spring.

## Some Draft Boards Disrupted by Late Registrations

Austin, Texas, September 23—Some state draft boards are complaining that an increasing number of youths are registering late under provisions of the Selective Service Law.

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, reminded draft-liable men Tuesday that it is their duty under the law to inform themselves as to the proper time to register.

Several misconceptions about the legally required time to register cause most of the late-comers, Colonel Schwartz thinks. There is some belief among young men that they can wait until they are 18½ years old to register.

As a matter of fact, the law requires that a man register on his 18th birthday, or within five days thereafter. Colonel Schwartz pointed out that all males born since August 30, 1922, are legally obligated to be registered under existing law, except those not yet 18.

Some young men think that membership in the National Guard or the Reserve excuses them from registration, but it does not.

If a young man joins the regular services for full-time duty before he is 18, he does not have to register when he is 18 if he is still in service.

But when he gets out, the law requires that he go to a draft board and register within 30 days. For example, if he joins the Army at 17 and stays in 10 years, he must register for the draft at age 27. The law would not obligate him for further service currently, but it obligates him to register.

Draft registration in Texas is expected to reach about 66,000 in 1958.

### Social Security Checks In Amarillo District To Be Increased

The more than 13,395 persons in the Amarillo District now receiving social security checks will get an automatic increase of about 7% on the checks to be mailed out nearly in February, according to John R. Sanderson, District Manager. There is no need for any of them to write or call at their social security office to get that increase.

However, Sanderson says, "I know there are several hundred others in this District who will need to talk with a social security representative in order to get benefits started to them." For the quickest and most efficient way to start that action, he suggests that a card or letter be written to him, at 324 New Post Office Building, Amarillo, briefly outlining the situation below which applies to a particular individual or family:

(1) Certain dependents of persons now receiving disability insurance payments can now qualify for monthly benefits. These are wives at age 62, dependent husbands at age 65, and unmarried children under 18 or disabled children who have been disabled since before age 18.

(2) Persons whose disability claims either for benefits or the amount were previously denied only because they did not have 1 1/2 years of social security credits in the 3-year period just before becoming disabled.

(3) Disabled adult children whose claims were previously denied solely because they were not receiving at least one-half of their support from the retired or deceased parent.

(4) Dependent parents whose claims or inquiries were previously denied only because the deceased son or daughter was survived by a widow, widower or child who could be entitled to benefits.

(5) Anyone whose social security checks were stopped because of marriage, if he or she married a person who was also receiving social security checks.

Sanderson suggests interested persons first write his office about possible benefits so that a mutually convenient interview time may be arranged, either at his office or with a representative of his office on one of his future visits to this country.

For more detailed information on the above changes, readers should write for a copy of free Leaflet No. 1958-1. Those wanting just the changes in the disability provisions should ask for Leaflet No. 1958-2.
