Benefit Scale of Social Security Raised By Congress

Social security benefits are intended to replace in part loss of income brought about by the death, disability, or old-age retirement of the worker. For this reason, Congress felt that adjustments in the benefit scale were in order and voted an across the board increase. These benefits become effective at the beginning of 1959, and will be included in all benefit checks for the beginning of 1959, and will be January which will reach beneficiaries early in February. It is not necessary to visit your social security office to apply for these increases. They will be made automatically.

The benefit increases for retired workers amount to about 7 percent over the levels provided in the old law, with a minimum increase of \$3.00 in the benefits payable to a retired worker who came on the rolls at or after age 65. Lightly smaller increases will be shown on the benefit checks of retired women workers who elected to retire at age 62 or at any age thereafter before reaching age 65. Proportionate increases will be made in benefits paid to beneficiaries who are the dependents or survivors of retired or deceased workers.

Another change in the law will make possible larger maximum benefit payments for many people coming on the benefit rolls in the future. This will be due to the change in the so-called "earnings base" on which payments are figured. Right now, only earnings up to a total of \$4,200 in a year can be credited to a worker's social security account; beginning with 1959, earnings up to \$4,800 in a year will be credited to a social security account. The largest monthly benefit payable to a retired worker with average yearly earnings of \$4,800 will be \$151. However, this maximum benefit cannot be reached for several years.

Along with the increase in benefits will come an increase in social security taxes. Beginning with January, employed persons will have one-fourth of 1 percent additional taken out of their pay; the tax rate will be 2 1/2 percent each for employee and employer. The rate for self-employed people will be 3 1/4 percent on their 1959 net earnings. The old rate, however, will apply to self-employment earnings for 1958 which must be paid when income tax returns are filed early in 1959.

Two of the most important recent changes in the social security law related to the families of workers who have become too disabled for further substantial gainful work, and to dependent parents of workers who have died.

The first of these concerns families of insured workers who are no longer able to do substantial gainful work. While monthly benefit payments to qualified disabled workers have been made beginning with July 1957, until now, no payments were possible

to their families. Payments to them could not be made until the disabled breadwinner reached age 65 or died before that time.

Insurance protection in the form of monthly benefits is now provided the disabled person's children under 18 and any oldtr children under a disability beginning before he became 18. Benefits are also payable to the disabled person's wife if she has in her care a child eligible for benefits or is age 62 or older.

Before the enactment of the 1958 amendments, an aged parent, however dependent, could never get benefit payments based on the earnings of a son or daughter if there was a surviving wife, dependent widower, or child who was entitled to payments. This restriction applied even in cases where those survivors next actually became beneficiaries. Under the law, as amended, the dependent parent can also be eligible for survivors' benefit payments.

Since an application must be filed before benefits can be paid, persons receiving disability insurance benefits who have eligible dependents should contact the social security district office. Parents of deceased workers who were financially dependent on the deceased son or daughter should also contact the social security office. The district office serving this area is located at Amarillo, Texas.

TRUMANN MAN KILLED AS TRUCKS CRASH HEAD-ON
Norman Deavenport Victim of Crash on Highway 69

A Trumann man was killed and another seriously injured in a head-on collision of two trucks on Highway 69, a half mile west of Trumann. Friday afternoon at 4:45.

Dead is **Norman Deavenport**, 37, of Trumann, a well known farmer. **Henry Welch**, 49, of Trumann, Route 3, suffered serious head injuries and injuries to the back, arm and knee. He is being treated at St. Bernard's Hospital.

State Trooper **Bob Cooper** said Deavenport was driving his late model GMC pickup east toward Trumann, while Welch was driving a ton and a half Chevrolet truck west on Highway 69 at the time of the accident.

Trooper **Cooper** said Welch's truck went out of control, crossed the center line and collided head-on with Deavenport's truck.

The impact knocked both trucks off the highway, and both spun around.

Deavenport's truck came to a stop across a shallow roadside ditch, while Welch's truck ended up on the shoulder of the highway.

Deavenport had lived in the Trumann area for the past ten years. He was an Air Force veteran of World War II and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include his wife, **Mrs. Marcel Deavenport**; a son, **Norman Wade Deavenport Jr.**; a sister, **Mrs. Herman Thornton of Lockney, Texas**, and a brother, **Noel Deavenport of South Plains, Texas**.

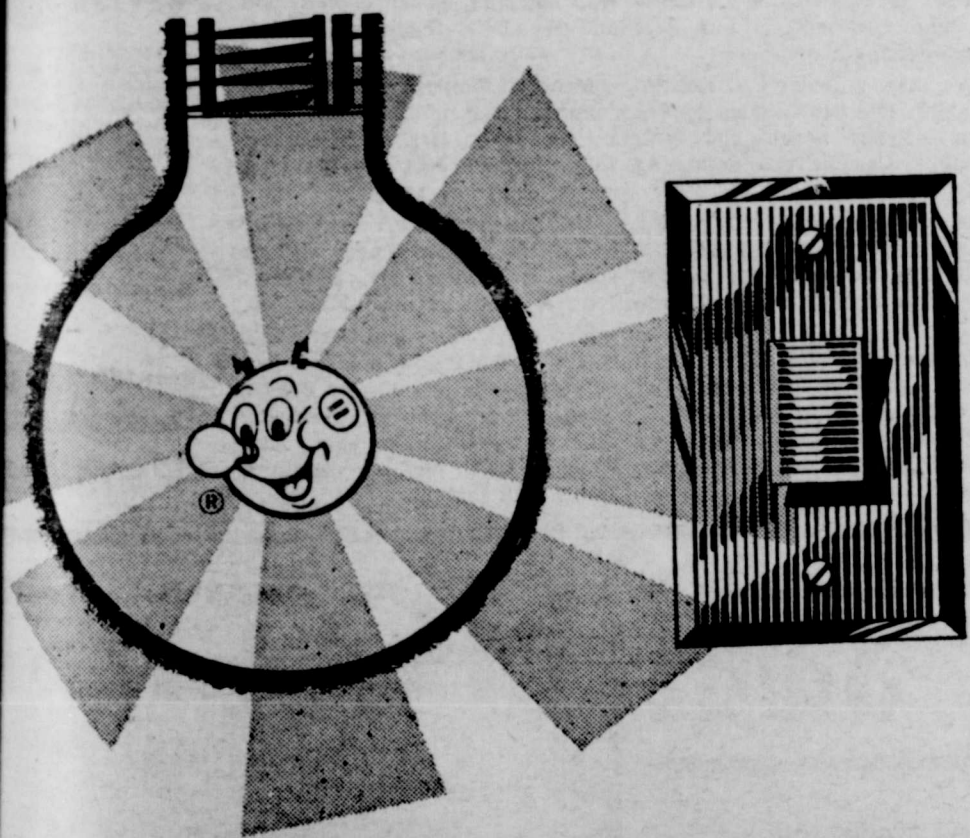

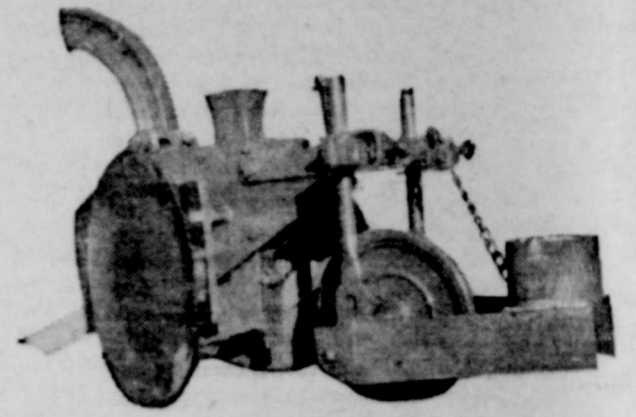
