### GOVERNOR PROCLAIMS CHRISTMAS SEAL DAYS

Governor Daniel proclaimed Christmas Seal Days from November 14 to December 24 as he viewed Designer Alfred Guerra's original drawing of the 1958 seals. Mr. Guerra, a former San Antonian who now lives in New York, submitted the winning design for the seals in national competition. In the proclamation, Governor Daniel said, throughout most of the world tuberculosis remains as mankind's most fatal disease. Modern drugs, medical science and better living conditions have lowered the once terrible death rate of tuberculosis in Texas, but new cases continue to be found each year. In our country today an American dies of tuberculosis every forty minutes and each minute another person becomes ill with this disease. The Christmas Seal Sale is the one annual appeal of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated county associations for funds to make possible year-round work for the prevention and control of tuberculosis. Therefore I urge all citizens to buy and use Christmas seals.

### Lone Star 4-H Champs Win Chicago Trip

Young Texas 4-H residents of Carson, Fayette, Kent and Wichita Counties will be among the 4-H delegates at the 1958 National 4-H Club Congress opening in Chicago on Nov. 30. They have won state honors in the 4-H Safety, Entomology, Soil and Water Conservation, and Electric programs and have been awarded all-expense trips to the Windy City. These programs are conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

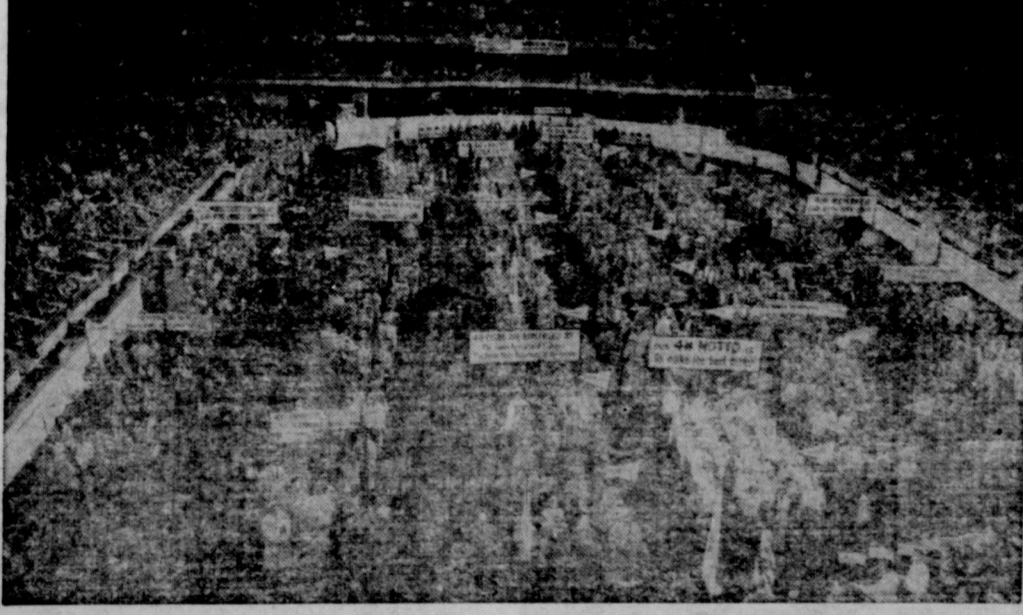


Life is much safer in White Deer since Norman Warminski, 16, has been participating in the 4-H Safety project. General Motors is rewarding him with a trip to Club Congress. Two serious accidents on the Warminski farm which involved his younger brothers marked the beginning of safety awareness for this young man. His survey resulted in laying electric wires underground, and attaching lightning rods to buildings. The workshop was transferred to a Quonset building and gasoline storage was moved away from wires. The windmill pump was enclosed, and safety designs were incorporated into plans for a new home. Young Warminski joined his sister in over 30 demonstrations on "The Use of Volatile Liquids on the Farm and in the Home." The pair also tested drinking water on 10 farms and found nine contaminated. This safety-minded 4-H'er is a member of the Carson County Red Cross and Disaster Committees, and also of the Civil Defense Ground Observer Corps. Bugs Rate High There's more to an insect than meets the eye, according to young entomologist Jeanette Pfeiffer, 15, of Carmine. In her 4-H Entomology project she learned all about harmful and beneficial insects, and how to control the bad ones. Miss Pfeiffer was one of four girls in the Round Top-Carmine Community Sr. 4-H Club who exhibited insect collections at Fayette County and district fairs. Her team won blue and red awards, and she was high individual. Her collection consists of 36 insects from 12 different species. She also has entered two spelling "bees". This year Miss Pfeiffer attended a training course and is now a junior entomology leader. The Hercules Powder Co. provides awards in the entomology program.

Top Conservationist Ray Dunlap, 17, of Jayton has successfully completed work in the 4-H Soil and Water Conservation program. Dunlap has witnessed the tragedy of erosion and flooding. He was forced to put into practice good conservation methods to save his land. He practiced terracing, contour farming and crop rotation to maintain fertility. He used diversion ditches and stock tanks to prevent erosion — the largest tank stocked with fish as a further conservation measure. Young Dunlap was awarded the Hornaday Medal for distinguished service to conservation. Only 40 of these medals have been given out since 1920. In recognition of his accomplishments, the Firestone Tire & Rubber Company has provided his trip award.

Knows Electricity The 4-H Electric program holds no mystery for Olen Baley, 17, of Wichita Falls. As a matter of fact he is a guiding light for Wichita County. He has been county 4-H leader in electricity for the past five years. In 1957 and 1958 he had the grand champion entries in the county electric show. He has been a county and district Texas Electric Company winner in 1956 and 1957. Not content with being an electrical live wire, Baley also has a well rounded program of field crops, poultry, cattle and swine raising, tractor maintenance and safety projects. His steer last year was graded as prime at the Dallas Fair and brought the top price for commercial steers at the show. Baley has won 101 ribbons and \$450 in prize money in local, district, and state contests. The Westinghouse Educational Foundation supports the 4-H Electric program.

### 4-H'ers to Parade Again During Chicago Congress



The 4-H parade pictured above is one of the exciting demonstrations that will be repeated in the amphitheater of the International Livestock Exposition during the 37th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Thanksgiving weekend will usher in 1,300 champion 4-H Club members, several hundred state and national 4-H officials and many friends of 4-H who help to make the annual Congress possible. They arrive by train and plane from every state in the nation, and will be joined by delegates from Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Canada and other foreign countries as well.

The Congress opens officially on Sunday morning Nov. 30, at the Conrad Hilton hotel and closes with a banquet for about 2,000 on Thursday night Dec. 4, when more than 200 national 4-H champions will be saluted. This unique delegation of 1958 national, sectional, and state 4-H winners represent the best of 2,200,000 Club members. By diligent and successful application of 4-H principals and techniques to project work these ambitious boys and girls have climbed their 4-H career by attaining state honors. They have participated in one or more of some 50 different 4-H award programs conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Among the wide range of projects and activities carried on in nearly 91,000 clubs are field crops, clothing, poultry, achievement, entomology, health, safety, leadership, foods, soil and water conservation, swine, and tractor. To be eligible for a state or national award, the 4-H'er must be over 14 years, and must have completed three years of club work. Awards include \$400 college scholarships and all-expense trips to the National Club Congress. They are provided each year by half a hundred business firms, educational foundations and private citizens. 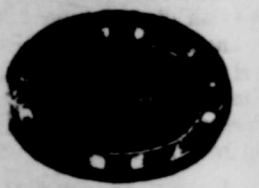

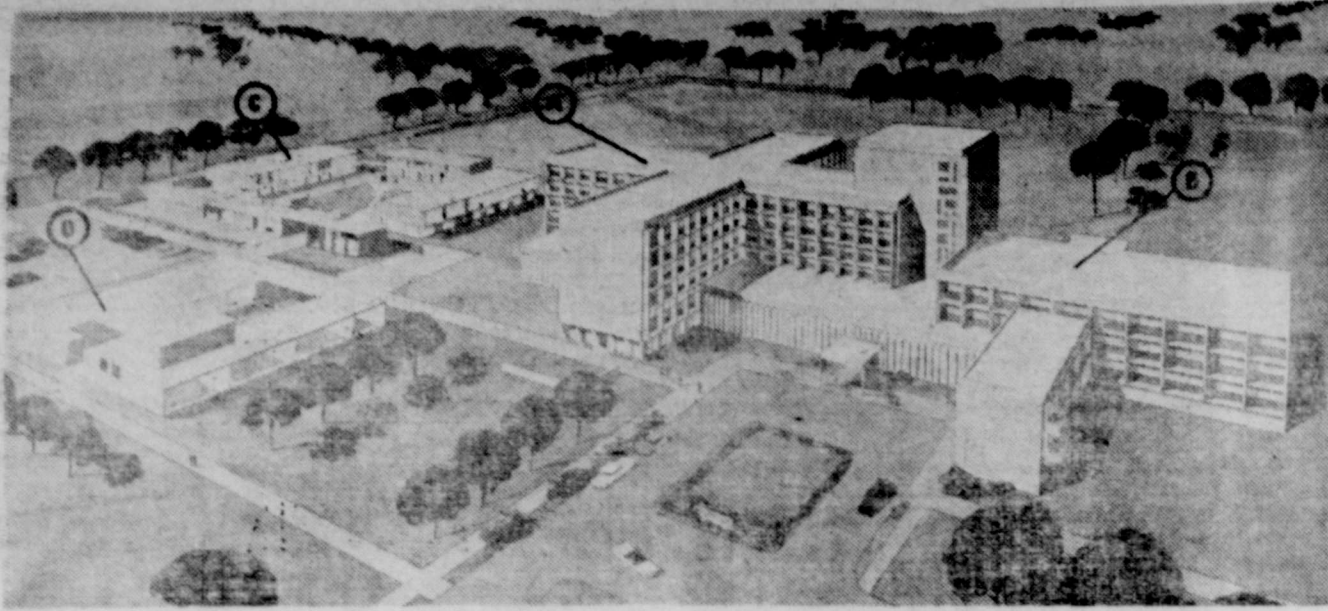

than 80 outstanding medical and business leaders from Texas and four other Southwestern states. Scott and White is a non-profit institution serving the Southwest.

### New Hospital For Southwest Is Announced

Designed as the nation's most modern combined diagnostic clinic and hospital, this \$10,000,000 building project has been announced by the board of the Scott and White Memorial Hospital of Temple, Texas. It will provide 279 beds and facilities for 50,000 clinic and hospital patients annually. An innovation for care of the critically ill will be a special observation unit on each hospital floor. A nursing station will be surrounded by a circle of 12 private rooms, where all patients will be under constant observation within a few steps of the nurses. This, it was said, will improve service for many of the critically ill.

Four hospital bed floors in the shape of a cross (A) and two clinic floors (B) rise above the first two floors and basement, which contain diagnostic and research laboratories, surgical and X-ray departments, rehabilitation therapies and other jointly used facilities. A Nurses Residence (C) will help meet the shortage of nurses in the Southwest by increasing student nurse enrollment from 60 to 85. The structure marked (D) is a future building for educational purposes.

The consulting architects, Elberbe and Company of St. Paul, Minnesota, designed the new Mayo Clinic and specialize in planning combined diagnostic clinic and hospital facilities. Architectural working plans will be prepared by Wyatt C. Hedrick of Fort Worth.

Jay A. Phillips, of Houston, Chairman of the Scott and White Board of Trustees, said that the target date for starting construction is June 1, 1960. "We already have upward of \$1,000,000 and are aiming at raising the balance over the next year and a half. As a non-profit institution Scott and White serves patients from all parts of the Southwest. This new center will be a tremendous benefit in providing people of moderate means throughout our region with a high quality of diagnosis and treatment at a reasonable cost."

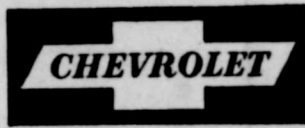
