The National Foundation will-offer patient aid to juvenile and adolescent arthritis patients through age 18. Of the 16,000 children likely to seek treatment each year, some 5,000 to 6,000 may need medical care as extensive as that required by paralytic polio patients. Aspirin, hot baths and exercises bring relief. Some new drugs like cortisone may reduce inflammation but cannot be counted on to stort the programmer.


